Bernard in Norfolk.

Norfolk, Va., July 6. Claude M. Bernard, ex United States district attorney, of eastern North Carolina, and a well known lawyer of that state, who mysteriously disappeared from Wilmington immediately after the Dockery tragedy at Raleigh, with the circumstances of which his name has been associated and against whom there now pends in the state courts of his native state an action for \$20,000 damages for the alleged betrayal of a young daughter of a greer, arrived here today. He came on the Washington boat from Old Point Comfort and spent several hours here, leaving at noon for eastern Carolina, where he intimated he would have a conference with his lawyers. In an interview he discussed with a reluctance and considerable embarrassment the charges of gross immorality against him. He was decidedly reticent. He declined to admit or deny guilt or discuss at length any of the details. He referred to the shooting of John Dockery in a pathetic manner and denounced the act. He appeared anxious as to the condition of Dockery and hoped that he would recover. As to where he came from or where he is bound for the fact that he was here did not disclose. Save the admission that he spent last night and the day before at Old Point, he declined to discuss his itinerary, past or future. Bernard bore the effects of crucial anxiety and despite his statements to the contrary, there were conspicuous evident marks of an awful strain.

CAROLINA-VIRGINIA EDITORS.

[Editorial Correspondent.]

Kenilworth Inn, Asheville, N. C.

July 5, 1905

The joint meeting of the editors of North Carolina and Virginia at Asheville has done much to more firmly cement the friendly relations existing between the two States. Its conception was a happy one, and its fulfillment has even surpassed expectations. Though I have been a member of the North Carolina Press Association more than a quarter of a century, I have never seen a better and more interesting session than this. The attendance of North Carolina editors is unusually large and there are about a hundred here from Virginia, while many ladies from both states are present.

Asheville is surpassing herself in cordiality to the editors and every thing is being done for their pleasure. Mayor Barnard's address of welcome was fully in keeping with this spirit. He said that of many conventions Asheville had entertained the city had never felt more honored than by this gathering of North Carolina and Virginia editors. Responses to the welcome were made for Virginia by C. D. Denit, of Salem, and for North Carolina by H. A. London, of Pittsboro.

Following these addresses and one by W. S. Copeland, of Richmond, all of which were brilliant and witty, the North Carolina association took up its regular business program: The first day's session consisted of several essays and addresses that were exceedingly interesting and beneficial to the members.

In addition to the business of the two associations, the editors have found much in the way of pleasure and more is yet in store for them. Tuesday afternoon they were given a special trip to Riverside Park to witness games by Indians, which was a novel scene. This afternoon they had a trolley ride over the city and a lunch out at Swatnana Country Club. Tonight there was a complimentary German in the elegant ball room of Kenilworth Inn. Tomorrow afternoon the Vanderbilt estate will be open to them for a drive and Mr. Vanderbilt will entertain them with a lunch at his dairy house. At night there will be a banquet at Kenilworth and Friday a trip to Waynesville and entertainment by the people of that progressive town.
