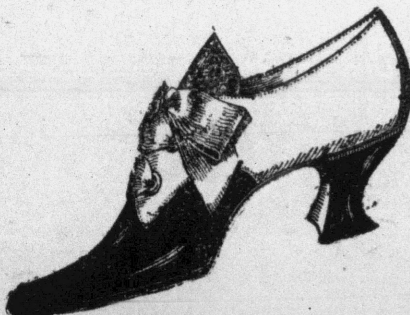

### SIX YEARS FOR DEWEY.

The Long Deadlock in the Jury Room was Broken at Half Past Four O'Clock Yesterday Afternoon.

New Bern, N. C. July 8.—The jury in the Thos. W. Dewey case, the defaulting cashier of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of this city, rendered their verdict of guilty this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock after being out for two days and nights.

The defendant and his attorneys were in open court. Judge E. B. Jones before passing sentence on the prisoner congratulated the attorneys for the State and the defendant for the manner in which they had argued their case. He said it was one of the hardest fought battles that he had ever witnessed during his career on the bench.

Judge Jones stated to the defendant that he sympathized with him and his family in his downfall, but that he had a duty to perform to the State of North Carolina as well as to the defendant. He then passed sentence, condemning the prisoner to six years in the penitentiary. The defendant's attorneys then served notice on the State of an appeal to the Supreme court, which convenes in Raleigh in September. A bond of \$40,000 was required of the defendant which was immediately given, signed by Chas. Dewey, E. B. Dewey, F. K. Borden and E. B. Borden, Jr., of Goldsboro.

The defendant returned to his home in Goldsboro on the evening train.

### Coast Line Sued.

Wilmington, N. C., July 8.—In behalf of the local association of truckers at Grists, a large strawberry shipping point near Chadburn, Attorneys Rountree and Carr, of this city, today instituted suit in the New Hanover Superior Court against the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company for the recovery of \$13,709.89, the plaintiffs having refused to accept the settlement offered by Armour for berries not shipped from May first to fourth, inclusive, and having elected to sue the Atlantic Coast Line rather than Armour for the losses not only from May first to fourth, but also for the fifth and sixth. The suit is in the name of Dan Hester, trustee, secretary of the local association in Grists, but the losses represent shipments by a number of growers during the period mentioned in the complaint. The number of crates is 5,498, and the plaintiffs allege that the valuation placed on them by the Armour people was entirely too small, notwithstanding the fact that the large majority of growers in other sections accepted it.

### B. L. Duke Responsible.

New York, July 8.—An order obtained by Brodie L. Duke vacating a warrant of attachment obtained against his property by Herriman Norden and others, cotton brokers, was today reversed by the appellate division of the Supreme court.

The case, which was first heard about the time of the marriage of Mr. Duke, which attracted considerable attention, hinged solely on the authority of one Braumham, a secretary of Mr. Duke, to give orders by telegraph which resulted in the sale of 2,000 bales of March cotton.

The relation of Braumham to Duke was admitted by counsel for the latter, and, under these circumstances, the Appellate Division is unanimously of the opinion that his acts as agent for Mr. Duke involved responsibility by the latter.

### FOUR NEWSPAPERS SUED

The Charlotte Observer, The Charlotte Chronicle, The Raleigh Times, The Greenville, S. C. News.

In yesterday morning's News and Observer, a telegram was printed under the Charlotte date line telling that Editor A. J. McKelway, of the Presbyterian Standard, had filed a suit against the Charlotte Observer and Editor Caldwell of that paper, for alleged libellous statements recently appearing in that paper in a signed article by Editor Caldwell on the editorial page.

It is learned that not alone is the Charlotte Observer and Editor Caldwell to be sued, but that each paper republishing the article is to be given the choice to either publish a full retraction or stand suit, and that all the suits will be for heavy damages.

The suit against the Charlotte Observer is for \$50,000 and that against Editor Caldwell personally is for \$25,000. The Charlotte Observer has recently become incorporated as the Observer Publishing Company, with J. P. Caldwell and D. A. Tompkins holding all the stock except one share.

The other papers to be sued are the Raleigh Evening Times, of Raleigh, for \$25,000; the Charlotte Chronicle, of Charlotte, for \$25,000, and the Greenville, S. C. News for \$25,000. In the case of the Greenville News the article from the Charlotte Observer is its entirety, with comments reflecting severely upon Dr. McKelway.

In accordance with the law of North Carolina the London libel law, concerning publications held to be libellous, a demand has been made or will be made to the papers in North Carolina that a full apology and retraction be made of the article and statements published and republished, or that the suits will be started. It is expected that the cases against the Charlotte papers will be tried at the fall term of the Superior court.—News and Observer.

### The Porch Collapsed.

Wilmington, N. C., July 8.—While a large crowd of ladies and gentlemen were thronged on a porch of the Seashore Hotel at Wrightsville Beach during a heavy thunder storm late tonight, the rain washed some of the pillars from under the porch and it collapsed, precipitating a score or more of the young people to the sand six feet below.

It is thought that no one was seriously hurt, though one or two ladies fainted during the intense excitement which prevailed. The collapse was near the ball room, where a large number of couples were participating in the regular week-end dance. After the excitement was over the dance was resumed.

### Price Of A Woman's Virtue.

Greensboro, N. C., July 8.—Chief of Police Nealey this morning received a telegram from Washington, stating that W. P. Moore, who is wanted on the charge of seduction under promise of marriage to Lena Yow, had been arrested at the nation's capital and would be held until advices were received. Chief Nealey started Officer Rhea to Washington, but just as the train was about to pull out the officer was advised by relatives of Moore's that the case had been compromised. It is learned that relatives of Moore offered the family \$100 but they held out for \$150, which was paid. Moore is well known here, for some time manager of the Singer Manufacturing Company's office in this city. The case has attracted much notice here, owing to the prominence of the parties concerned.

### Mr. Dockery's Condition

Asheville, N. C. July 8.—Engineer Chandler was injured at Black Mountain this morning and died about 1:45 this afternoon at the Asheville Hospital. Mr. Chandler was between two cars repairing an air pipe when he was caught between the bumpers. There was no one present at the time, and when the engineer was found he was unconscious. The remains were taken in charge by the lodge of Knights of Pythias of which the deceased was a member.

### Cigarettes in Car Load

W. M. Carter, vice-president of the Wells Whitehead Tobacco Company of Wilson, manufacturer of Carolina Brights cigarettes, spent yesterday in Raleigh. Mr. Carter says that his company has just shipped a solid car load of cigarettes to one firm in Richmond and that this is the first shipment of this character ever made to the American trade by any manufacturer.

Mr. Carter says that the Wells Whitehead Company has increased its business over sixty per cent. over last year, and that prospects are that this great increase will steadily continue.—News and Observer.

### Five Years for Mrs. Smith

Richmond, Va., July 8.—Mrs. Estelle Smith, of Manchester, Va., charged with beating to death her five-year-old son, Ralph, was today found guilty of voluntary manslaughter. The jury fixed the penalty of five years in the penitentiary. An appeal will be taken. The case was submitted without argument because of the indisposition of commonwealth's Attorney Page.

## EDITORS HAVE A GREAT GATHERING

[Editorial Correspondence.]

Kenilworth Inn, Biltmore, N. C.

July 8th, 1905.

The joint meeting of the press associations of North Carolina and Virginia has been a pronounced success from every standpoint. Between business sessions the editors have had one continuous round of pleasure and it was not until a late hour last night that the festivities came to a close and good-byes began to be said preparatory to turning faces homeward. Most of the members left on early trains this morning, a few remaining over to enjoy the mountains a short while longer.

I should have mentioned in my former letter that on Wednesday night Dr. B. F. Dixon, as the representative of Governor Glenn who could not be here in person, delivered a charming and witty address welcoming the Virginia editors to North Carolina. This was appropriately responded to by J. H. Lindsay, of Charlottesville, Va.

Thursday morning both associations elected officers, transacted routine business and heard several interesting addresses and essays. R. M. Phillips, of the Raleigh Post, was made president of the North Carolina association, a most excellent selection. J. B. Skerrill was again elected secretary and treasurer, his services in that important position being really indispensable.

Thursday afternoon was occupied in the drive through the magnificent Biltmore estate. Mr. Vanderbilt invited the editors over and threw his private roads open which took them immediately by the mansion and through the floral gardens, a privilege not allowed the public. He also entertained them with luncheon at his dairy, both himself and Mrs. Vanderbilt being present. The most novel thing about this entertainment was that the tables were spread in the passage ways between the stalls occupied by the cattle. This feature did not favorably impress quite a number of those present, and after viewing the fine Jerseys they quietly withdrew without partaking of the refreshments. We are inclined to the belief, however, that it was the novelty of it that Mr. Vanderbilt had in mind in the arrangement, and that he had no idea of classing the editors and their wives and daughters with "the common herd."

The presence of himself and wife would indicate this view. Still while it did not meet the approval of some of his guests, they simply withdrew without any show of discourtesy.

Thursday night there was an elaborate banquet at Kenilworth Inn tendered by the citizens of Asheville. This was a spread royal, and was a "feast of reason" as well as for the inner man. W. B. Copeland was toastmaster and there were brilliant responses to toasts by editors of both states.

Friday the editors accepted the invitation of the citizens of Waynesville and spent the day as the guests of that beautiful town. They went up by special train and were royally received and entertained. Dinner was served at White Sulphur Springs hotel, and as many as conveyances could be provided

for enjoyed a drive to Eagle's Nest, the summit of Junaluska mountain, where the scenery is surpassingly beautiful and the view extends for 60 miles. The writer feels under special obligations to Attorney General R. D. Gilmer, whose home is at Waynesville, for personal courtesies shown him.

The editorial party returned to Biltmore in the evening and at night a smoker was tendered the men at Kenilworth and the ladies were entertained at a card party. A feature of the smoker was the presentation by the editors to J. H. Ward, district passenger agent of the Southern railway, of an elegant Elks fob as an expression of their appreciation of his many courtesies during this meeting. The presentation speech was made by J. H. Lindsay, of Virginia. At the card party Miss Hennie Ragsdale, of Greenville, tried for the first honors but lost in the "cut" for the prize, Mrs. Brown, of Virginia, being the winner.

At midnight a number of ladies and gentlemen gathered on the broad portico of the inn and led by J. H. Caine, of Asheville, sang a number of familiar songs. And thus closed the most delightful gathering of editors ever held in North Carolina. D. J. W.
