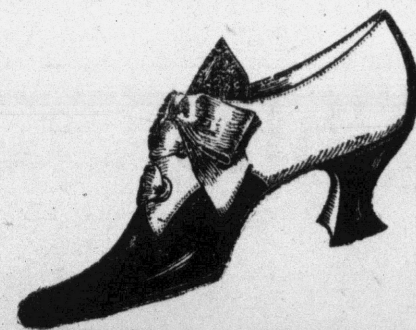

SAKHALIN A TRUMP FOR JAPAN.

Russian Officials and the Press Admit That the Occupation of the Island Gives Something to Throw Into the Scales With the Sword.

St. Petersburg, July 10.—With the Japanese flag looted for the first time on Russian soil after eighteen months of war, the importance of the landing on the island of Sakhalin is generally admitted, both in newspaper comment and in circles. Complete occupation of the island is regarded as a foregone conclusion.

The Novoe Vremya voices the general sentiment in holding that control of Sakhalin puts a powerful lever in the possession of Japanese diplomacy which finally has something tangible in its hands to throw on the scales with the sword in the coming conference.

There is a divergency of opinion with regard to the effect it will have on the negotiations at Washington, some of the irreconcilables declaring that it makes peace at the present juncture more impossible than before, as Japan will be able to demand the cessation of the island and a heavy indemnity as well, at which terms of peace will be too costly; but the more prevalent view is that Japan has now in her hands enough trumps to take the game.

The attack on the island certainly dissipates one of the hopes of the peace advocates, who have been suggesting that its voluntary cession might be an offset, with Port Arthur and Chinese railroad, against the payment of a large part, or all, of a monetary indemnity.

No further report on the landing operations has been received.

M. Muraviev, the Russian ambassador at Rome and one of the peace plenipotentiaries, has arrived in St. Petersburg and called upon Foreign Minister Lamsdorff yesterday. His sailing arrangements have not been perfected, as they are dependent upon the date of his audience with the Emperor, which will probably take place Tuesday. His suite has been completed by the selection of two secretaries from the Foreign office.

The Novoe Vremya joins in the press chorus against M. Muraviev, saying it is hard to tell how good a diplomat he will prove, as he certainly was not a success at The Hague. The paper says that Baron Rosen, the other plenipotentiary, on the contrary, is a successful diplomatist and has been socially successful.

The county commissioners this afternoon revoked the order made last Monday instructing Sheriff Alsbaugh to arrange for a public hanging of J. W. Hammons, convicted of killing his wife. The execution will be in the county jail and will be private.

NOTED DESPERADO CAPTURED.

A Fugitive From Justice For Three Years Sketches His Atrocious Crime.

Waynesville, N. C. July 9.—After successfully eluding the authority of this State for over three years, Fletcher Hopkins, murderer and desperado, has been captured and in a few days will be safe in Haywood county jail. His young son, implicated in the same crime was arrested with him.

Hopkins' arrest has been effected at Bristol, Tenn., and Sheriff Nolan, of Haywood county, left yesterday for Nashville Tenn., to secure requisition papers, from whence he goes to Bristol for his prisoners.

Hopkins' crime was peculiarly atrocious. In the winter of 1902 he shot and killed Mack Kilby, a prominent young mountaineer of the Big Creek section of this county 15 miles west of Waynesville. The boy aided in the crime. Taking with him his son and a Miss Sutton, he struck out across the mountains for Tennessee and was lost to view until his arrest in Bristol. It is not known whether the woman was found with the Hopkins.

According to those familiar with the circumstances, the killing grew out of the whipping of Hopkins' son by Kilby. The boy with others, was poaching on Kilby's land and they were ordered off by Kilby. They declined to go and young Hopkins was very abusive. Kilby gave the lad a spanking. Hopkins, who had been living in Washington State for some time, was apprised of the affair by his wife, and boarding a train came, straight to North Carolina and Haywood county. Going immediately to Kilby's home with his son he called Kilby out and the father and son shot Kilby to death. A woman in the neighborhood witnessed the crime.

When he fled with the woman and boy Hopkins left a wife and another son at his home in Big Creek township. He is known among his neighbors hereabouts as a quarrelsome vindictive, rough mountaineer—in short, a bad man. Kilby was a quiet, peaceable citizen of good family.

Big Creek, the scene of the crime, is the wildest, most inaccessible section of the State. There is general satisfaction around here over the capture of Hopkins, whose unsavory record as a bully is so well known, and where sentiment is strong against him.
