WANT MONUMENT ERECTED.

Efforts to be Made to Have North Carolina Railroad Directors Decide on Place for Memorial to Calvin N. Graves

Greensboro, July 11.—There is a movement on foot to have the board of directors of the North Carolina Railroad Company at their meeting here Thursday take some definite action in regard to the placing of the monument which is to be erected to the memory of Calvin N. Graves. Several years ago money was donated for the erection of a monument to this man, who, in the Legislature as speaker of the House of Representatives, cast the deciding vote which made the road possible. The reason the monument has not been erected is that the board cannot agree upon a location, several cities and towns along the road clamoring for it. Greensboro people think the monument ought to be erected here, the terminus of the road, and place where the last spike was driven. There is a green plat east of the depot, on South Elm street, which would be an excellent location for the memorial to the man. The board of directors will hold their last meeting here Thursday. At that time the new board, yet to be named, will take their places. The old board will have a meeting and take their final adjournment, when the new board will meet and organize. There are eight directors on the part of the State and four on the part of the private stockholder.

FIRED ON THEIR OFFICERS.

Firing Squad at Libau Turned Rifles on Officers Instead of Condemned Mutineers, Killing Twelve.

London, July 11.—The Morning Post, from private sources, gives an account of the recent outbreak at Libau, according to which the first naval mutiny led to 23 men being condemned to death. The attempt to carry out the sentences of death provoked still more serious signs of mutiny, whereupon the port commander ordered the executions to be stopped and applied to St. Petersburg for instructions. The government replied that all the mutineers must be shot and a shooting party was formed, but when the order to fire was given the firing squad turned and fired on the officers instead of on condemned mutineers and a dozen officers fell dead. Other troops, including Cossacks, the account says, were summoned, and a serious conflict developed, in which between 20 and 30 Cossacks were killed before the mutiny was quelled.

Smallpox in State.

The Bulletin of the State Board of Health just issued states that there was smallpox in seventy-eight counties during the past twelve months, with a total 7,377 cases of which 3,636 were white, but with only 30 deaths, of which 13 were white. The disease has greatly increased, but is decidedly less fatal, though it may assume a fatal type at any time, Scotland county led in number of cases, having 3,350, nearly half white, Ashe being second with 346.—Raleigh Observer.

Arrested in Norfolk.

Norfolk, Va., July 10.—Walter Grady, about thirty-three years of age is under arrest here for the authorities for the Johnson county North Carolina, where he is charged with attempted assault on Miss Len Godwin a young woman about eighteen years of age, whose brother, R. L. Godwin, traced the accused to Norfolk. Sheriff Ellington of Johnston county will tonight carry Grady to Smithfield, N. C., for trial, the accused having agreed to return without extradition papers. He denies his guilt.

On Friday Grady was at Kenly and took a daughter of Mr. Godwin to ride. The young lady is a cousin of Grady's wife, this city. The young lady's brother-in-law drove along the road behind the couple and finally saw the buggy stop. The brother-in-law soon appeared on the scene and caught Grady trying to assault the young lady, so it is reported. Grady came on home and the young lady went home with her brother-in-law and swore out a warrant for Grady's arrest.

Another Case of Graft.

Secretary Cheatham, of the Cotton Growers' Association, seems to have made out his case. When he said there was a leak in the statistical bureau of the Agricultural Department, the statement was not mere hot air. We are not aware that any characterized it as hot air, but Secretary Wilson was apparently as little prepared to accept the statement as was the head of the Postoffice Department when he denounced as "hot air" the charge that there was crookedness in his department. That charge turned out to be true and the indications now are that there was no mistake about the leak. Secretary Wilson entered upon an investigation just to avoid the very appearance of evil, feeling fully satisfied in his own mind that there was an evil to be discovered. There was something admirable in his confidence in the methods of the bureau of statistics and in the incorruptibility of those who had charge of the work and it is a pity to learn that such confidence had been abused.

At this writing the report of the secret service agents has not reached the public, but it promises to produce a genuine sensation. Enough is known to justify the inference that it is an ugly case of graft. The Washington Post says the report will show that not only were the "figures relative to the cotton crop manipulated for the purpose of affecting the market at different times, but that they were given out in advance by Edwin S. Holmes, associate statistician, for use in a speculative way by a broker in New York." Holmes has been suspended. Others may be involved indirectly. It seems that Holmes, although working for a small government salary, has become a man of wealth in a short time and the inference is that he did so by get-rich-quick methods. He has brought discredit upon the government crop reports, but he seems to have done it in a way that was very profitable to him. Those reports are very valuable to the country, if accurate and reliable, otherwise they are worthless. It is best that the truth in regard to crops be ascertained and given to the

public at stated intervals, but the whole business of gathering crop statistics had better be suspended than to have such use made of the information as Mr. Holmes seems to have made.—Danville, Va., Bee.

Carrie Nation Prefers a King.

President Roosevelt and the Republican party were scored by Carrie Nation in an address delivered in Lyons Hall, Evanston. She said: "Theodore Roosevelt missed his calling; he ought to have been a butcher," she said, and later added: "If we have such an affliction as that Roosevelt family for another four years a monarchy in this country would be heaven."

The speaker began her address with a violent denunciation of the Republican party, which she charged with being responsible for the existence of saloons in the country.

"There is not a saloon but what is protected by the Republican party," she said: "When I started out on my career of annihilation I had a vision I dreamed that I passed along a road by the side of which stood two tables. On each of these tables a large serpent was coiled, but one of the reptiles was headless. The other struck and hissed at me as I passed by, but I succeeded in avoiding it. That serpent was the Republican party, the other the Democratic party. The Republican party was responsible for the founding of saloons in Kansas and it protected them when founded. The Democratic party would do the same if it had the power."—New York American.
