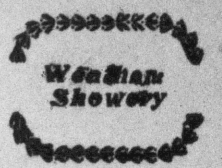

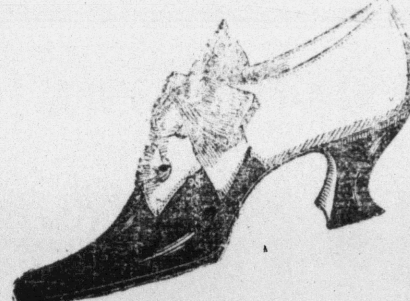

THE TEAM AT SUFFOLK.

A Warm Double Header.

When the team drew up at Suffolk Monday at noon the clouds from the leaden sky were shedding bitter tears. There was no "trio" to meet us, and through the falling rain to the Nausemond hotel we trudged; a hotel with the European plan, a plan that feeds a hungry base ball team on bitter expectation.

After the noonday meal we went out to view the weather, and still the sky was overcast, and still the clouds were letting their rain drops fall, and soon we saw stealing across the frank, smiling countenance of Suffolk's genial manager a semblance of the expression that adorns the "mug" of the dead brakeman who is far from his protecting roof with no ticket in his "jaws."

We wonder this face lost its smile, for the Monday's game could not be played, it was raining too much.

So the afternoon was spent after the dictates of each man's fancy.

One Suffolk man played lamb and "skinned" old "Bull" in the pool room. In Greenville, "Bull" thought he was a bargain counter novelty, but with this man he was like the kid who fell from the box car; notice it.

Others of us treated our rustic eyes to the city sights until we were tired, others drank black and variously colored cows until we were broke, and manager Flanagan would lend us no money, and Bert James went to the postoffice sixteen times by actual count, between 3:50 and 6 o'clock. He thought the waves at Wrightsville were beating the shores with messengers for him.

The afternoon soon beat on to supper time, and shortly afterward we retired to rest ourselves for the battles of the next day. Manager Flanagan had arranged a double header, one at 10:30, another at 1:30.

The morning game began with Greenville at the bat. Bert James led off with a pretty single, and was sacrificed to second by Turner E. then John Ivey plunked one to the right garden for a single and it looked good for Greenville, but Eskridge hit to pitcher and was out to first, Turner J. went out in the same manner from second to first and the jig was up for test time. Suffolk came up, with blood in its eye, but the first two went out by strikes from Turner E. to Thompson F. who by the way caught a hustling good game, the third man, Barret patted the horsehide for a double tonight, but the next man hit to Turner J. on short and you know the rest. From then on it was "nothing doing" until the inning. Then Suffolk landed two on an error by Thompson at first, and a hit to right that Lipscomb could not find in the grass. It was lost in the knee high grass and the two men loafed home.

And still it was "nothing doing" for Greenville until the eighth, when Turner E. reached first, stole second and third, and scored on hit by Turner J. Suffolk in her half of the eighth did nothing, then our half of the ninth came, and we scored three, making the score four to two. In their ninth Turner E. who had been pitching a winning game was a little wild and gave way to Thompson, but this was not enough to fill the hole we were in, and they scored the two men whom Turner had given free passes.

At the end of the tenth it was still four and four, and the game was called to allow the players to rest.

theonesided umpiring of A. P. Ely. He gave Suffolk everything he could and Greenville just as little as possible, a one handed catch by Turner J. and a long running catch of Eskridge in left. Thompson F. caught a good game, and had them scared to try for second.

Hulcher the left handed "Brownie" who faced us at Kinston in the one to nothing game was in the box for Suffolk, and would have been beaten but for the hard luck of our team, and the decisions against us. It was a good game. Now for the afternoon game. It was a regular slaughter. For nine innings we pounded out hit after hit. Revel who pitched the five to nothing game at Greenville was on the firing line for Suffolk and "Bull" was for us. After a few innings had been played the tall, limping form of Mr. Revel was led a bruised and bleeding mass, out to the tall grass to rest, and Eskins took his place, but they all looked a like to the Greenville team and he too was sent to the tall timbers, and a third man was brought in to stem the tide, but all in vain, for we had our batting clothes on today.

For nine innings "Bull" teased and played with them, and finally wearying of the sport he tossed one over to see if they could hit anything, and the batter drew back with all his strength and hit that ball for a drive to the centerfield fence, where it repeated the trick of its sister ball in the morning and left itself in the grass, allowing the batter to make the circuit the only time they reached the third sack.

Although the game was onesided it was not devoid of interest, for we made pretty plays, double plays, and played fancy ball. Eskridge and Bert made a double, and Turner J. threw to Bert, and he threw to Turner E. for another, and we made still another when "Bull" threw to first, and then Turner E. threw to third cutting off a man there, and the outfield was something to be proud of, all of them were in the game. Turner J. made another one hand stab that was grand stand, and Bert took one that looked like a goner.

"Bull" Thompson struck out ten of their men, and their three pitchers struck out one of ours.

Today was a good day's work, for with a good umpire we should have won the first game. The afternoon umpire was Mr. Buckenridge, an ex-captain of the Washington Nationals, and he was a good one.

Few Men Know Their Own Clothes.

"A few days ago," said Mr. W. T. George, of St. Louis, "I walked into an establishment where I had left a suit of clothes to be cleaned, my reason for going in person being that I had lost the ticket given when the clothes were left, and as I knew the proprietor I thought it would not be difficult to get my garments. In this I made a big mistake, and it was only by doing some very persuasive talking that I succeeded.
