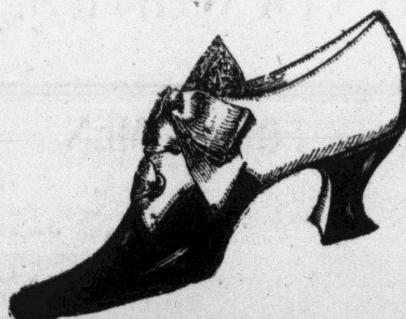
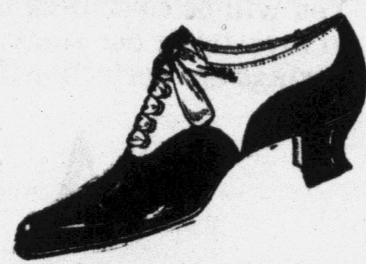

SHOT INTO HOUSE.

Also Room Occupied by Solicitor Ward and Hon. W. M. Bond. Seven or Eight Arrests Have Been Made.

Elizabeth City, July 13—A story has reached here from Columbia, in Tyrrel county, which states that early Wednesday morning a room in the hotel there occupied by Solicitor Ward and Hon. W. M. Bond was attacked by a number of men interested in the illicit sale of liquor. It is also stated that about 2 o'clock that same morning Mayor Woodley's residence was fired into by the same crowd of the weapons used being rifles and pistols. Several window panes were broken, it is said, but no one was hurt. These facts are given by a party who arrived at Edenton tonight, coming from Columbia.

No details of the affair father than the above can be gathered at this time. It is reported that the liquor men were trying to revenge themselves on Ward and the mayor for something they claimed these gentlemen had done to them. It is thought that the crowd were composed of blind tiger men who had been run down and prosecuted by Solicitor Ward, and who were out on bail. Seven or eight of the number, white and black, have been arrested. Our informant, however, is unable to give their names.

John Wilson Captured.

Charlotte, N. C., July 13.—John Wilson, the negro who is charged with the murder of Henry Maxwell several weeks ago, has been located and is now in jail at High Point. Sheriff Wallace this afternoon received a telegram from High Point stating that Wilson had been captured, and would be held until an officer arrived. An officer will leave in the morning for High Point and will return tomorrow afternoon with his prisoner. Since the tragedy Wilson has been making himself scarce around these parts.

North Carolina Boys in England

Marion N. C., July 13.—Mrs. R. L. Gilkey, formerly of Washington, N. C., died here yesterday after an illness covering some weeks. She was a devoted wife and consecrated Christian, and her death casts a gloom over the whole community.

This Great Country.

According to the estimate of the Census bureau the United States has gained more than 6,000,000 in population since 1890. To be exact the figures are 82,518,900 against 76,303,000. It is believed that this is a very conservative estimate considering the great volume of immigration during the past five-year period.

Instituting comparisons, we find that there is but one civilized nation on the globe which has a greater population than ours, and that is Russia. China is not considered. Russia has 130,000,000 people, the German empire 56,000,000, Austro-Hungary 47,000,000, Great Britain 42,000,000, France 38,000,000, Spain 18,000,000. Within three and a half centuries the English tongue has come to be the dominating language of the world. More persons now speak it than any other civilized tongue. For this the world may look large to the United States. England has had very little to do with it. We have been teaching an emigration of nearly a century to speak a language of adoption and through them have brought it more and more into the out-of-the-way places. There is some little glory in the fact that the United States and not Eng-

land is responsible for the spread of the English tongue.

Benjamin Franklin said in 1776 that the population of the United States would double every 25 years. The estimate was kept for three quarters of a century, but is not now maintained. At present rate, the population doubles every 30 years, which in 1930 means 150,000,000, and 300,000,000 in 1960. Whether this increase would be at all desirable remains to be seen. Most of those living will not be here when the country reaches 300,000,000 mark. What will happen in those days cannot be prognosticated. We of the present will have to leave those of the future to solve their problems for themselves.—Ex.

The Time to Learn.

Whether or not the mind ceases to be creative at about forty, certain it is that the mind's most active period is between birth and thirty or thirty five. That is the period of acquiring ideas, for broadening and deepening the knowledge of the factors in one's life game, whatever it may be. Every hour counts, for every hour power that could be stored up for use after forty is going to waste.

The big real successes of the world have, most of them, been made after forty—many of them as late as sixty, a few as late as seventy. But in each case it was by the use of power stored before forty.
