#### A GOLDSBORO SENSATION.

Dr. J. R. Stockard Sues Dr. D. W. Powell for Alienating His Wife's Affections.

Goldsboro, N. C. July 15.—Goldsboro has a sensation in the way of a suit for seduction. The plaintiff in the case is Dr. J. R. Stockard, a dentist, who came here several years ago from Alamance county. Dr. Dan W. Powell is the defendant in the case and the amount asked for in the civil suit is \$10,000. In the bill of indictment Dr. Stockard, who is a married man with a family, sets forth that the defendant has alienated his wife's affections and has broken up and destroyed the peace and happiness of his home. Counsel for plaintiff, Messrs. Dorch & Barham and Messrs. Aycock & Daniels, have asked that the defendant give a bond in the sum of \$5,000. The law says that the bond can be equal to the amount sued for, but the defendant is not worth that much. He is a young physician who has been doing some practice and conducting a small drug store.

The case has attracted a great deal of attention and has furnished a theme for conversation since the papers were issued for the arrest of Dr. Powell. Dr. Stockard alleges that Dr. Powell has been inmate with his wife for some time and that he (Dr. Stockard) had ordered Dr. Powell to cease his visits to his home and cease his attentions to his wife. The climax in the scandal occurred during the latter part of June, when Mrs. Stockard left here to visit her people in Alamance county, so she said. Instead of going where she said she went to Burlington and stayed three days. She left Burlington and went to Richmond on the 3rd of July and was joined there by Dr. Powell, who had in the meantime closed up his drug store here and left the city. After waiting a week or so and not hearing from his wife, to whom he had written, Dr. Stockard boarded the train last Sunday morning and went to Burlington, where he learned that his wife had taken a check for her baggage to Richmond. Dr. Stockard went on to Richmond and secured the services of a detective to hunt up his wife. He found her Sunday night at the residence of her uncle in Manchester. He says that Dr. Powell had his wife's trunk at his hotel in Richmond. Before bringing his wife home Dr. Stockard says that he learned that Dr. Powell and his wife had been to Louisville, Ky., and that they had returned to Richmond, where Mrs. Stockard was to run a boarding house. Dr. Stockard brought his wife home last Monday night and Dr. Powell arrived on the scene this week.

The preliminary hearing in the civil suit will come up before the clerk of the court on the 3rd of August. Dr. Powell is a young man about 30 years old and unmarried. Mrs. Stockard is a handsome woman and is a mother of three children, the oldest, a daughter being about 15 years of age.

#### RAYMOND BYNUM CASE.

Defendant Submits to Murder in the Second Degree. A Light Sentence Expected.

In the Superior court at Raleigh Saturday, Raymond D. Bynum submitted to murder in the second degree for killing the venerable Jas. H. Alford, his partner in the job printing business during the last holidays.

The defense will be that while he was not actually insane at the time of the killing, he was in such a condition as to negative malice, being entirely deluded of will power by long and excessive use of liquor.

#### A Miraculous Escape.

Spencer, N. C. July 15.—A north-bound freight train, loaded with Georgia peaches, had a miraculous escape from a wreck two miles north of Spencer, this afternoon.

While running at about sixty miles per hour the engine struck a hand car, just before a long bridge across the Yadkin river had been reached, at once derailing the pony trucks of the engine. Engineer Glenn, who was at the throttle, applied the emergency breaks, but the speed was so great that the train and engine, with front wheels off the track, ran across the bridge and continued one-fourth of a mile before it could be stopped.

## THAT BUILDING AND LOAN.

The building and loan plan is one of the best things in the country for those who earn limited salaries. A building and loan association puts a cottage within reach of this class of people, and this class of people are in the majority. This being true it would prove very beneficial to both the people and the association. By small weekly or monthly installments a great many can own their own home. But some will say that if the wage earner dies the house will be put up and sold and the widow loses when she needs it worse. But this can be prevented by carrying a life insurance policy. But some will say they are not able to take out insurance. This can also be done along with the installment of the building and loan premium. If it is not convenient to pay the insurance in a lump sum this can also be paid in small weekly or monthly installments.

We hope our business and organized men will get busy and organize a good building and loan association. It is needed in Greenville and we believe without a doubt that it would prove to be a financial success. What say you, fellow townsmen?

## MR. TOMPKINS ELECTED.

Hen. D. A. Tompkins, of Charlotte, has been elected one of the directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society. This recognition of Mr. Tompkins is not only a compliment to him for his business and industrial integrity, but shows the importance of the South in the business world. This signal honor coming to one of North Carolina's sons inside of her own borders is significant.

Mr. Tompkins is owner and interested in many cotton mills of this and other States. He was one of the founders of the Charlotte Observer, and is now half owner of the Observer, one of the best papers in the South.

## Eliminate Fools, Fanatics and Scoundrels

In the fight which ceaselessly is being waged on the liquor question it would be a great thing if the fools, fanatics and scoundrels could be eliminated. Some of them are to be found in the line up on each side of the liquor question. In this State last week some liquor men tried to kill an unoffending citizen and his family by shooting into his house simply because that citizen had told the officers that an illicit distillery was being operated in his neighborhood. Reports are that in certain portions of Durham county men dare not inform on any illicit distiller for fear of losing property or life. In the town of Loda, Kansas, three saloons were blown up by dynamite last Monday and one hundred thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed and many lives endangered. A liquor fight is frequently a mean one. The criminals on each side of the fight should be hunted down and punished.—News and Observer.
