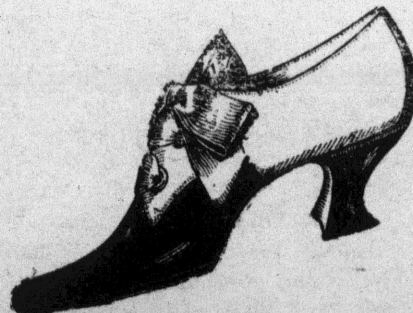

Mr. Frank Conner Dead.

Wilson, N. B., July 19.—Mr. Frank Conner, of Mineral, Va., is dead. The deceased was a brother of Judge Conner, who returned from his bedside Saturday night, thinking the patient much improved. Mr. Conner was an editor and at the time of his death conducted a sprightly paper called the Mineral Mirror. He was also active in politics in that section and was president of the Willard club, advocating Mr. Willard for Governor of Virginia. The deceased leaves a wife and two brothers and three sisters and many old time friends around here, who will deeply regret to hear of his death.

Two Boys Disappear.

Elizabeth City, N. C., July 18.—Richard and James Smith, aged 12 and 9 years respectively, have disappeared from the house of Mrs. James Whedbee where they had been given a home Wednesday, and their whereabouts are unknown, though some believe that they have gone to Norfolk where their father James Smith lives. The boys were punished for failure to perform a task assigned them by their mother, and later locked in a room. They escaped from this apartment by means of the window, and no one here appears to have seen them since.

Drowned in Tar River.

Tarboro, N. C., July 19.—Ed Lewis, fifty-five years of age, was drowned in Tar river just above the county bridge, early this morning. Lewis, who had been working on a raft of wood, attempted to swim across the river and is supposed to have been seized with cramps or stricken with heart failure, when within a few feet of the opposite shore. The body was not recovered until this afternoon.

Raleigh, N. C., July 18.—The Post Dater Company, of Wilmington, is chartered with an authorized capital of \$50,000 of which \$10,000 is paid in. The incorporators are Thomas R. and James F. Post, Thomas Wilson and John S. Armstrong. The company will manufacture detachable antograph daters and other inventions.

Bread and Brains.

The public school is not to be regarded as a "private snap."

The public school is—or ought to be—a public concern operated for the benefit of the public.

The latter is the conception of an Iowa educator and publicist—Capt. E. Miller, superintendent of schools of Keokuk county, who is making the schools of his county really public.

He does this by enlisting the schools in the work of the community. For instance:

Miller got a jeweler at the county seat to offer a prize to the school girl in the county who would make the best loaf of bread and bring it to a county exhibition out of school work.

Immediately bread making was advanced to a fine art in Keokuk county. Mothers were consulted. Hundreds of girls got busy.

Each school district had an exhibition and the best loaves were selected for the county exhibition.

The result?

The homes of the county never had such bread on their tables generally. Scientific bread making worked wonders. The contest did for the villages and farms what the cooking school does for the city—only more.

Girls who had never before given a thought to bread making saw in it a worthy accomplishment. Some of them have subscribed for cooking magazines and have bought cook books. They are preparing to make themselves good house keepers.

And, not least of all—

The public schools of the county have become linked fast to the homes of the county.

Mr. Miller has done a like thing in offering prizes to the boys for the best corn, etc., and has them studying along the lines of scientific agriculture.

And withal the schools themselves have been greatly improved—not by the study of fads but facts.

This educator has pulled himself out of the worn rut of pedagogics. He has vitalized the schools: He has made them what they should be ideally—live centers of communal life and progress.—Ex.

Worth a Thought.

In this workaday age, how many of the simple sweet things of life are crowded out; each life is too busy with his or her duties to have time for them, and this perhaps is more applicable to America than other countries.

There is a beautiful thought that some one has written that in the mountains of Tyrol, at the close of the day the women and children go out and sing. ORDINANCE.

Cut Down and Remove the Weeds and Grass About Your Premises

CHAPTER II. SECTION I.

Every occupant of a lot on any street shall keep the sidewalk clean and clear of weeds, grass and other rank vegetation as far as such lots extend. If any rubbish, dirt, ashes or any thing be placed or left without lawful authority, upon such sidewalk or in the gutters or streets adjacent thereto, the occupant of such lot shall remove the same. If after written notice by the Chief of Police, or Street Commissioners, requiring him to remove the things prohibited by this ordinance, he shall fail for twenty-four hours to remove the same, he shall be fined five dollars for each day thereafter it may so remain.

You are given 10 days from this date to comply with the commands of this ordinance, a failure to do so will subject you to the penalty therein imposed. F. M. Wooten, Mayor.
