SUIT FOR DAMAGES.

R. L. Johnson Brings Action Against C. T. Munford

Today a notice was issued by Superior Court Clerk D. C. Moore in an action begun by R. L. Johnson against C. T. Munford, in which the former sues the later for damages. No complaint has been filed, so that the amount of damages to be asked for is not known nor the cause of the action set forth.

Rowers on the streets for the last few days have intimated that such a matter was brewing, and the cause was given as an occurrence which took place last Sunday afternoon, about which we have been able to get the following particulars:

Mr. Munford was out driving with his brother-in-law, Mr. Savage, and as they were going across the bridge they saw several boys, one of them looking to be nearly grown, run off from the end of the bridge. As they ran on this large boy jumped up and tore down a sign Mr. Munford had put up previously to advertise a special sale and dragged it off with him. Seeing this act of wantonness by a boy old enough to know better than to damage the property of other people, angered Mr. Munford at the time and he sprang from his buggy and pursued the boy. He overtook the boy and struck him a few licks with a buggy whip as they ran.

When the boy stepped running Mr. Munford rebuked him for trespassing on his land and damaging his property. He also rebuked the boy as a son of R. L. Johnson, but did not know his name.

Returning to town Mr. Munford went to look for Mr. Johnson to advise him of what had occurred. He failed to find Mr. Johnson then but did find him Monday morning, and told him he had whipped one of his boys for tearing down his sign. Mr. Johnson asked him which boy it was, as the boy had said nothing about it upon going home Sunday evening. Mr. Munford described the boy from his size and appearance, when Mr. Johnson thanked him for what he had done, saying he was glad he had whipped him instead of indicting him.

The matter seemed to end there, and later in the day Monday Johnson went to see Munford about some work he had promised to do for Munford, and no reference was then made to what had occurred Sunday.

This action for damages arising since then would indicate that others had been talking to Mr. Johnson and advised him that he could recover damages from Mr. Munford for striking the boy with a buggy whip. The case will attract much interest.

START AN ICE FACTORY.

We noticed some gentlemen conferring earnestly together, and just imagined from a knowledge of them that it was some enterprise for Greenville that was under discussion, though no questions were asked and there was no butting in the conference. Running over in mind what the enterprise under discussion might be, the very hot weather evoked the wish that it might be an ice factory. Why not? It strikes THE REFLECTOR that Greenville affords a splendid opening for such a plant. There are more ways than one that it could be made profitable. You may not have thought the matter over, but the quantity of ice consumed here is something large. A factory would of course make it cheaper, and this would greatly increase the quantity used. There is no question to our mind but what enough ice would be consumed to keep a plant busy.

If the promoters of such an enterprise could arrange to locate it near the water and light plant and get power and water from the town, it would serve a double good purpose. The factory could operate on a smaller capital, and at the same time it would enable the town to run its power in the day time. By this a day current could be had from the electric plant and the development of enterprises wanting power would quickly result. There are great possibilities in this direction. Think over it, you men with some money.

A Tobacco Leak, Too.

The tobacco growers have a real grievance against the government report as well as the cotton growers. They will find it harder, however, to enlist the country than the cotton growers because in the manufacturing and export world Cotton is King.
