COUNTY MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Board of Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners were in regular monthly session on the first Monday. S. M. Jones, the new member appointed to succeed J. W. Page, deceased, was present and entered upon the duties of the office.

Orders amounting as follows were drawn on the treasurer: For paupers \$157.75; county home \$174.20; superintendent of health \$25; tax lists \$201; bridges and ferries \$107.66; conveying prisoners and insane \$52.70; roads \$337.78; jail \$160.10; court house \$4.25; witness tickets \$3.55; coroner \$54.69; books and stationery \$50.75; attorney \$50; register of deeds \$23.95; commissioners \$27.70; stock land territory \$167.55.

A petition from the Greenville tobacco board of trade was presented asking that convicts working the public roads in the county be assigned to the roads adjacent to the town of Greenville for the next 90 days. It was agreed that the road force work two weeks more in Farmville township, then on dam near Bethel for two or three weeks, and then the request of the tobacco board of trade will be complied with.

W. J. Hemby was elected constable of Contentnea township to fill the vacancy caused by the death of F. B. Tucker.

Flora Williams and Delphia Heath were added to pauper list, each to receive \$1 per month.

Jesse Cannon and W. B. Quarterly were appointed to buy enough 24-inch tiling for six crossings over Fork swamp.

The clerk of the board was ordered to advertise in THE REFLECTOR the sale of the insolvent tax lists for the years 1903 and 1904 to the highest bidder.

For the purpose of better working the roads between Carlina and Bethel townships, it was ordered that the hands on the lands of Sam Edwards, Louis Highsmith, G. G. and R. D. Whitehurst be under the control of the board of road supervisors of Bethel township.

Four petitions of public roads were presented: One in Contentnea township from the west end of road N. 41 to the town of Ayden; one in Swift Creek township from John Venters' across Fork swamp; one in Chicod township from near J. H. Stokes' to B. C. Evans'; one in Beaver Dam township from the Plank road near Warren's chapel to the Nichols road near the residence of Mrs. Louisa Nichols.

Jurors for September court were drawn.

Boys Hurt by a Fall.

Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. William M. Russ met with a painful accident yesterday afternoon about 6:30 by falling from the second story of a house on West Peace street.

Richard, the older of the two, was severely bruised, but the physician does not think that his injuries will prove serious.

The boys were playing in a house Judge Russ is having built on the rear of his lot, corner of Blount and Peace streets. They were in the second story walking on some loose planks. The smaller boy stepped on the end of one of the boards and his little brother, Richard, seeing his peril, tried to save him. Both fell to the ground, striking the debris left by the carpenters. Richard was bruised from head to foot and stunned. A physician was quickly called and the little fellow carefully examined. He has a large bruise and swollen place on his back and is suffering much pain. No bones appear to have been fractured, and the doctor does not think that he sustained any internal injuries.

The younger boy had some bruises and was shocked by the fall, but his injuries are not at all serious.—Raleigh Post.

Wires Damaged by Lightning.

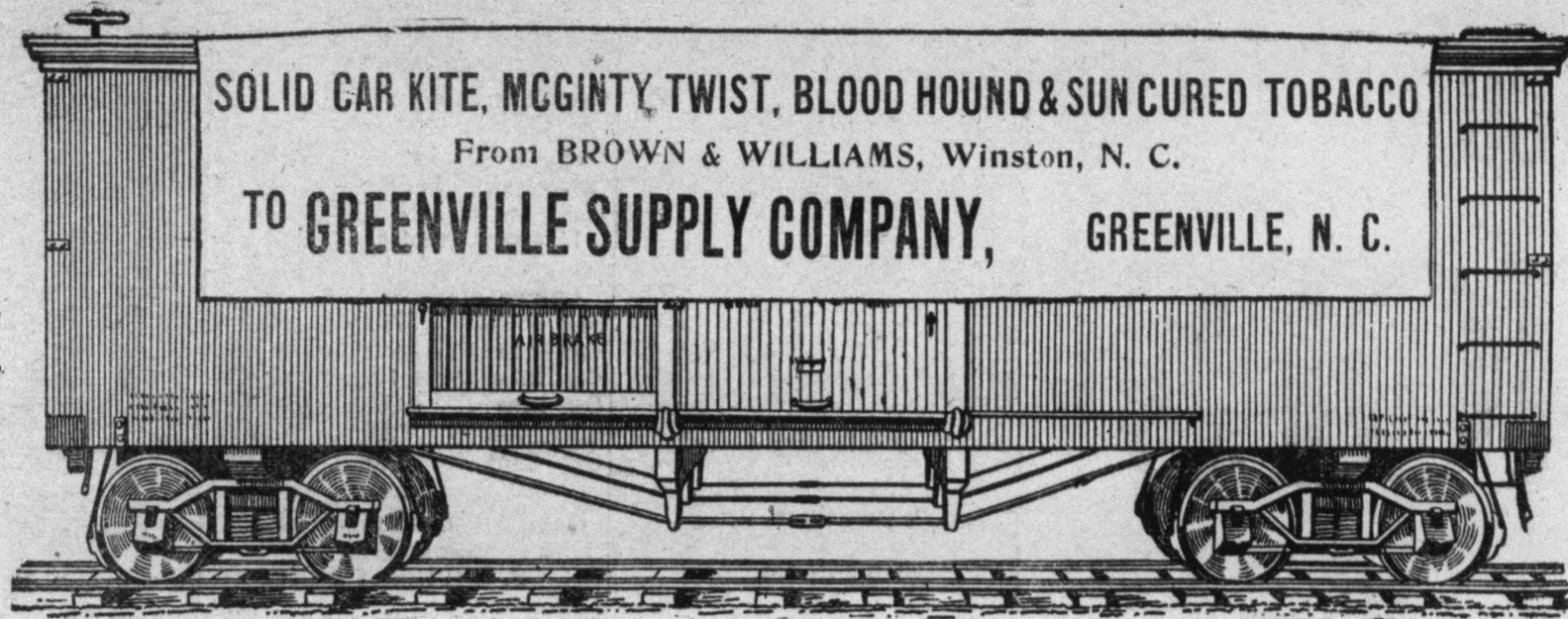

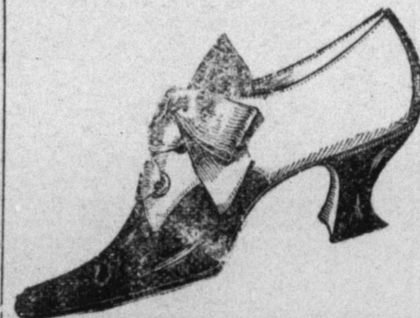
