PEACE TERMS REACHED.

Japanese and Russian Envoys Reach an Agreement That Will End the War.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 29 — Peace between Russia and Japan was practically concluded at this morning's session of the peace conference. In the final struggle the Russians achieved the victory. For the sake of peace, the Japanese, with a magnanimity worthy of their heroic achievements in this war, met the ultimatum of the Czar and abandoned their demands not only for reimbursements for the cost of the war, but for the purchase of the northern half of Sakhalin. Russia at the same time agreeing to division of the island. The Japanese also withdraw articles 10 and 11 of the peace conditions as originally proposed (demand for the surrender of the interned warships and limitation of the Russian naval power in the Far East).

The official account of this afternoon's meeting was given by Mr. Sato on his arrival at the hotel. It is as follows:

"In the afternoon session of August 29, the conference has discussed the details of the treaty of peace. It has been decided to entrust the drafting of the clauses to privy councillors DeMartens and Mr. Dennison, legal adviser of the Foreign Office of Japan, with instructions to finish the work as soon as possible."

The following statement was issued by Mr. Sato on behalf of the Japanese plenipotentiaries:

"The questions of the final disposition of the Island of Sakhalin and the reimbursement to Japan of her war expenses have from the first been issues on which absolute divergence of views existed. The difference of opinion upon these points—not one but both—have frequently threatened the existence of the conference. But his majesty, the Emperor of Japan, responding to the dictates of humanity and civilization, has, in a spirit of perfect conciliation and in the interest of peace, authorized his plenipotentiaries to waive the question of reimbursement of war expenses and has consented to a division of Sakhalin upon terms which are mutually acceptable, thus making it possible to bring the important work of the conference to a successful issue."

BUSINESS MEN PROTEST.

Will Not Submit to Advance in Telephone Rates.

It having become current that the Home Telephone & Telegraph Company would advance the rate on telephones in Greenville, as soon as the improvements now being made to the plant are completed, the price being \$1 per month higher than heretofore charged, the business men are taking action not to submit to the advance. A committee was today taking around an agreement for the business men to sign to the effect that they will let their telephones be taken out rather than submit to the advance in rate.

Weather Too Wet.

The Weekly Crop Bulletin for the week ending Monday, August 28, 1905, says of conditions in North Carolina:

In general the weather has been too wet for the best growth of crops; the week has been cloudy and in many places rain has fallen every day. Cotton has been injured to a considerable extent by the rains, bottom land corn has been drowned and the land badly washed. On the other hand the rain and sunshine in many places proved very beneficial to most crops, especially corn, but as many farmers still had their hay and fodder cut and cured, the week was in that respect unfavorable. The average temperature of the week for the State was only about one degree below the average. In many places the farmers are ready to plow for wheat, and while a great deal of land has been broken, it has been too wet for plowing to become general.

To Prosecute Lynchers.

Governor Glenn has requested Solicitor L. I. Moore to go to New Bern and make a most thorough and full examination to the end that the perpetrators of the lynching there, Sunday morning, be brought to justice. Solicitor Moore is now in New Bern investigating the matter.

Cotton Condition Mixed

Washington, Aug. 29 — The Weather Bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions says:

In some northeastern counties of Texas, in Arkansas and in portions of Mississippi, Alabama, and Georgia, improvement in the condition of cotton is indicated and in Oklahoma and Indian Territories and Missouri the crop is in fair to good condition; elsewhere cotton has not made favorable progress. Complaints of shedding are received from every state, of rust from the eastern districts, of premature opening from Texas, Arkansas, and North Carolina, and of rotting of bolls in South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi. The bolls are opening rapidly generally throughout the belt and picking is in progress in all but the northerly districts.

A Correction.

Japan is about to take water instead of cash.

As the Equitable has asked for an investigation it may be forthcoming.

If the mosquito scare grows much larger people will have to be permitted to carry weapons to defend themselves.

A Paris newspaper arose with the suggestion that Rockefeller come forward and pay the indemnity for Russia. The oil magnate is not hurrying to respond. It would cause too sudden a rise in the price of oil to make so large a sum.

The lynching at New Bern is receiving just condemnation throughout the state. Death was no worse punishment than the negro deserved for the crime, as his intention was to commit murder, but the manner of his execution by a mob was adding another crime as bad as the one he had committed.

Two years ago the safe of the treasurer of Yadkin county was robbed of about \$8,000. The treasurer appealed to the legislature for relief and an act was passed submitting to a vote of the people of the county the question of the county losing half of the amount and the treasurer half. The election was recently held and the proposition defeated. This means that public officials are responsible for the safety of funds in their hands and it is their duty to keep such funds where robbers cannot reach them.

Almost every day some business man speaks to us about the need of a co-operative spirit in Greenville to work for the advancement of the town. All admit that a chamber of commerce or board of trade could accomplish much in this direction. THE REFLECTOR likes to hear the business men talk about these things but would much rather see them taking action. There are many things right now that could be brought about to help the business interests of the town if there was an organized effort behind them. As long as we go on without action there cannot be much progress.

The man who can sit for two hours at a theatrical performance and stand on his feet for the same length of time at a political speaking sometimes finds himself unable to spend half that much time discussing ways and means to advance the interests of his town.—Winston Sentinel.

The finding of a pot of old Spanish gold coins on Sullivan's Island near Charleston, recently believed to be a part of the buried treasures of the notorious Capt. William Kid, has excited the islanders and many people are now digging up the soil, in hunt for other portions of the hidden money.

CHINESE EMBROIDERY.

Resplendent With Pearls, Coral, Beads and Gold Thread.

"Putz" is the name given to a richly embroidered square of silk worn as a badge on the breast and back of a dark colored pelisse by civil and military officials of China, as well as by their wives. Every square embroidered "putz," being indicative of rank, belongs to either the civil or military order, the two great social categories of the Chinese empire. In the former, naming them in proper order, a stork, gold pheasant, wild goose, crane, silver pheasant, egret, partridge, quail and blue jay are exclusively depicted, mostly standing upon a rock in the midst of waves and looking toward the sun. Each of these symbols is confined to one of the nine grades of the upper ten. In the second division quadrupeds alone are allowed. They include in proper rotation the ch'lin, or unicorn; lion, leopard, tiger, bear, and tiger cat. The coloring is also specified by the strict sumptuary laws of the country.

A beautiful specimen of this embroidery recently on view in London was about the size of a large meat plate and was resplendent with pearls, coral beads and gold thread. It displayed a stork, wrought with seed pearls of a good size and flying toward a fiery wafer in coral, standing for the sun. Rocks, clouds or waves, deftly simulated by a few streaks of gold thread and cunning stitches in floss silk, occupied the background, while on the brimlike border, between a double line of gold passing, couched with red silk, were arranged in a circle pearl bats, tortoisies and other symbols of longevity, brightened up with coral eyes, riveted on the sun. No fewer than 40,000 bored pearls were used in this rare sample, intended for a mandarin's robe.

Clouds and running water constantly appear on the embroidered robes of the grandees of the far east. The way these mysterious waves are made to run straight or across helps to tell approximately the date of the work. Apparent trifles are of the highest importance. The director general of the Yellow river, for instance, could not don at random a robe bearing an outburst of water escaping from a breach above the level of the surrounding country. It would be considered by the superstitious a bad omen or a warning against a want of power in the officer to control the most ungovernable river of the empire. He is, therefore, bound to display on his garments calm, limpid water, made to glide horizontally.

Good Business.
A story is told of a man in an Arkansas town who, in addition to his being president of the local board of aldermen, was also the proprietor of the best hotel in the place.

It appears that a visitor from the east one day remarked to this man that the town might be made a good deal healthier if a certain large swamp near by were drained.

"W-a-a-l," drawled the politician and hotel man, "all my boarders says the same thing. In my persuasion as president of the board of aldermen I'd shorely advocate the improvement in a minute if it warn't for my son."
"Why," exclaimed the easterner in surprise, "why should your son object?"
"W-a-a-l, stranger," replied the Arkansas man, "he runs the drug store."—Harper's Weekly.

The Largest Book and Map.
The largest book in the world is in the British museum. It is an atlas measuring 5 feet 10 inches by 3 feet 2 inches and weighing close upon two hundredweight. The largest map in the world is the Ordnance survey map of England, which covers over 108,000 sheets. In its preparation it cost £200,000 a year for twenty years. The scale varies from ten feet to one-tenth of an inch to the mile. The details are so minute that maps having a scale of twenty-five inches "show every hedge, fence, wall, building and even every isolated tree in the country. The plans indicate not only the exact shape of every building, but every porch, area, doorstep, lamp post, railway and fire plug."

He Knew the Artists.
When the late King Charles of Wurttemberg was yet crown prince and he was ordered to become engaged to the Russian Grand Duchess Olga he was shown a portrait of her. After regarding it intently he exclaimed: "How daintily they have flattered her! The hair is too abundant, the eyes are too brilliant and the complexion too dainty." The courtiers asked in astonishment, "But does your royal highness know the grand duchess?" "I do not know her," was the reply, "but I know the court painters."

"Ah, I thought so! That men who write must consult their condition I have no doubt. Now, tell me, when can you write best?"
"When I am alone," the editor replied.

EMOTIONALISM.

With Some It is as Intoxicating as Strong Drink.

"Yes, in my opinion it is quite possible for a man to become intoxicated in moments of great excitement, and sometimes a man will become just as drunk as he would if he emptied the contents of a gallon jug," said the observant man, "though it is, from my observation, very rare to find a man who will lose control of his legs in cases of the sort. Crowds, with the excitement that go along with these gatherings, the noise and hurry and all that kind of thing, will make some men drunk just as readily as liquor. We have known the same condition to be brought about by great heights or distances, in the dizziness experienced, for instance, by some persons in reaching the top of high buildings. Seasickness, in my judgment, is drunkenness. Have you ever stood close to a railroad track while a passenger train whirled by at full speed? If you have you can understand fully what I am trying to tell you. The noise and swift motion of the train intoxicated you for the moment, and for the time being you are just about as drunk as you can be. Rapidly moving street cars will have the same effect on some persons. The temperament of the person of course has much to do with the degree of drunkenness resulting from these conditions. The crowd is probably the most prolific source of drunkenness of the kind I have reference to. Few persons can escape some sort of intoxication in a crowd. The most sedate persons imaginable will show the symptoms, and you will find the condition to exist, no matter what the character of the gathering. Crowds in the streets will cause it. We find it in the ballroom. Church gatherings are not exempt. I have seen preachers, noted for their sedate, courtly and dignified bearing, drunk with the excitement and fine emotionalism of some big religious gathering. No doubt almost every man can recall many instances of the form of intoxication I have been discussing."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

Duration of Digestion.

The times of digestion of different foods are about as follows on an average: Milk, rice, about an hour or less; whipped eggs, barley soup, salmon, trout, about one and one-half hours; peas and fish, about two hours or more; sago, one and three-quarters hours; barley, boiled milk, raw eggs, cabbage with vinegar, soup with fat and bread, about two hours; raw milk (Riche), baked eggs, ox liver, two and one-fourth hours; lamb, beans, potatoes, cabbage, hash, two and one-half hours; boiled eggs, beefsteak, white bread, ham, beef, fish, mutton, three hours; pork, poultry, veal, brown bread, four hours; salt pork, hard boiled eggs, five hours.—Russell's "Strength and Diet."
