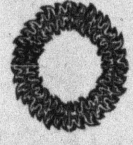

The grand total of all property is \$7,457,314.

As compared with last year this list shows an increase of 28 white polls and 49 colored. The aggregate increase of real and personal property by whites is \$157,939 and by colored \$16,495. Increase in corporations \$144,485, a total increase of \$318,919. The value of cotton shows about 1,100 bales, while last year there were only about 300 bales. The increase in solvent credits this year is \$78,150 and in money on hand \$26,897.

**Tremendous Sale.**

Today the tobacco market had the largest sale of any day since the new season opened, in fact it is seldom larger at any time during the year. All five of the warehouses were nearly full and the aggregate run between 200,000 and 250,000 pounds. The tobacco brought in is very common and does not sell at a high figure, but the price is good considering the quality. Several neighboring counties were represented on the market today.

The president took a plunger in a submarine boat last week, and now he has brought Japan and Russia to terms he feels like trying a flying machine.

All over the civilized world there is gratification at the end of hostilities between Japan and Russia. But the folks will want something else exciting to take place in less than a month.

Regardless of what men of different political views might think of him on other matters, the part President Roosevelt took in bringing to completion the peace negotiations between Japan and Russia receives the admiration of every one. He made a master stroke at an opportune time and deserves congratulation upon the result.

News from Raleigh is to the effect that the governor is greatly harassed ever the many applications for pardon that pour in upon him by every mail. This might be avoided if the state had a pardoning board and this matter taken off the shoulders of the governor. Since the 1st of January of the present year there have been 4,578 cases of typhoid fever in Philadelphia, attended by 454 deaths—a mortality of about 10 per cent. It will surprise the average citizen to know that the fatality from yellow fever is so little in excess of that from typhoid. And again, yellow fever ends with frost while typhoid fever has all seasons for its own. There is little difference after all, and that in favor of yellow fever.—Charlotte Observer.

**THE SNAKY OCTOPUS.**

How It Feels to Be Clutched by This Marine Monster.

My first experience of the octopus, writes Frank T. Bullen in "Creatures of the Sea," was in a little bay in Stewart Island, New Zealand. A small river flowed into this bay, notable for its fine flounders, and the crew of the ship in which I was then a sailor soon discovered that the easiest way of catching them was to wade about on the fine sandy bed with bare feet, the water being only up to mid-thigh, and when they felt the flat body wriggling under their soles to tread firmly and stoop, groping in the sand until they had the flounder safe between finger and thumb. Then they would raise him and put him in the bag strapped across their shoulders.

By and by we discovered that the nearer the sea the finer the flounders, and so one sunny afternoon I was wading in the bay near the mouth of the rivulet and picking up some fine specimens. Suddenly I trod upon something like a blob of jelly. Fearing a sting, I made to step off, only to feel both my legs gripped in several places by something that clung as if it would eat into the flesh.

I stooped and felt a long, whip-like tentacle twisted around my right leg. I tore it off and felt a nausea which made me quite giddy. But no sooner had I removed one snaky thing than another held me and another and another. The water was shallow, but I began to feel as if I must be dragged down, drowned and devoured by this horrible thing. Fortunately I retained some presence of mind, and, drawing my sheath knife, I reached down cautiously to where I felt the main body of the thing, and, avoiding my bare feet, I stabbed steadily into the central part of the beast. I was successful, for presently I felt the clutch of the tentacles around my legs relax, I saw the water stained with sepia, and I smelled the odor of stale musk, which all cuttlefish emit when disturbed.

I felt quite certain that had I been laid hold of in water out of my depth by one of these creatures only a miracle could have saved me from drowning.

**The Reserved Seat.**  
The train was crowded, with the exception of one seat. This had been refused to various people, the lady who occupied one-half of it telling every one who tried to sit down that "this seat is reserved." Finally a little girl entered, followed by an elderly woman—her grandmother. The child called her grandmother to take the seat, but the imaginary owner objected, saying as before, "This seat is reserved." The eyes of the child were black, and they lighted up with indignation. She turned on the selfish woman and said in a voice loud enough to be heard through the car: "I don't care if it is reserved. It isn't fair to preserve a seat when my grandmother has to stand. Besides, every one says my grandmother is a wonderfully well preserved lady, so she's just going to sit down here!" And she did, to the enjoyment of every one in the car save the woman who sat beside her.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

**A Singular Product of Hawaii.**

One of the most singular products of Hawaii is a vitreous lava known as "Pele's hair." It is a silky, filamentous substance, olive green or yellowish brown in color, soft but brittle. It has been thought to be produced by the wind catching the fiery spray thrown up from the great crater of Kilauea (which the Hawaiians long since personified as the fire goddess Pele), but the real cause of the lava forming into such soft, silky fibers is believed to be the gas and steam escaping through the lava. Nearly all the native birds of Hawaii use it as a nest building material.

**Brought Back Life.**

The London Lancet recalls a number of remarkable cases of resuscitation from apparent death. One of these was recorded by the late Sir Benjamin Ward Richardson. A medical man had taken 120 grains of chloral. When seen, life seemed to all common observation to be extinct. No pulse or evidence of breathing was perceptible, and it was very difficult to detect the sounds of the heart, while the temperature had sunk to 97 degrees F. The man had been in that condition for some hours. The patient was revived, however, by raising the temperature of the room to 84 degrees and injecting warm milk and water into the stomach, and he made a complete recovery. Slaves of alcohol and narcotics run great risks of this kind.

**Guarding a Secret.**

Two Irishmen had been taken prisoners in 1798. One of them informed the military officer in command of the arresting party that he could make important revelations were it not for his fellow culprit. He dared not do so while the other lived. If the other was put out of the way—that was soon arranged. No sooner was the other man dead than the surviving prisoner quietly remarked: "Now, shoot me as soon as you please. It was he that knew the story, and I knew he'd peach!"

**THE TOWER OF SILENCE.**

Grotesque Burial Place of the Parsees of Bombay.

High above Bombay, on the freest and most airy spot of the city and 300 feet above the level of the sea, is situated the most peculiar cemetery in the world—the burial place of the Parsees. It is called the Tower of Silence.

These Towers of Silence are found everywhere in Persia, where the corpse, placed under the open sky, is dried by the sun and dissolved by the rain. But in Bombay, where the burial place is limited and where death and misery invite vultures in greatest numbers, the dissolution is considerably hastened by these carrion eaters.

The tower itself consists of a stone wall thirty feet high, forming a circle about 300 feet in diameter—a roofless tower. The floor, made of cement, is an inclined plane, terminating in a deep and wide well. It is divided into three concentric circles, within which are standing side by side the low, open sarcophagi. These circles are connected by wide drain gutters, leading to the wall in the center of the building. The men are laid in the outer, the women in the middle and children in the inner circle.

The whole inner construction reminds one of the inside of a classical amphitheater, only that in this tower the players—the corpses and the vultures—occupy the place of the spectators, while the center—the arena—is occupied by the wall, fifty feet in diameter.

Having entered the iron door leading into the tower, the khandias immediately strip the corpse of all clothing, for Zoroaster has said, "Naked thou comest into the world, and naked shalt thou depart therefrom." The body is then placed in one of the vacant sarcophagi.

In a few minutes the place is covered with vultures, which in the course of an hour devour every vestige of flesh on the fresh corpse, while the blood finds its way through the drain canals down into the wall. The skeleton only remains, as smoothly picked as though it had been cleaned in the chambers of an anatomical institution.

In a few weeks the burning rays of the sun and the heavy rains have dissolved the skeleton and piecemeal worked it down the wall, where the remaining pieces of bones are further dissolved in a mixture of lime and sulphur, while the blood and fluids are strained through a heavy layer of coal and sand and enter the unfiled ground of the Parsees as pure water.

It is claimed that this mode of burial is the most cleanly of all methods and, from the standpoint of hygiene, the most safe. Certainly as it is practiced in the land of its origin, where the forces of nature—sun and rain—perform the entire operation, it does not appear at all horrible.—Los Angeles Times.

**Queer Blunders.**

Years ago the British parliament passed a bill for the rebuilding of a jail at Chelmsford. It was decreed that the prisoners should be confined to the old jail while the new one was building. The new one, however, was to be constructed from the materials of the old one. In the reign of King William IV. a statute was passed fixing the punishment at fourteen years' transportation for a particular offense. It added, "Upon conviction one-half thereof shall go to the king and one-half to the informer." Just why the king should be transported for half the term the person who drew the act found it impossible to explain, since he had merely made a ludicrous blunder.

**Saw the Moon Go Round.**

"There is a little boy at my place," said the thin young man, shaking the pepper over his eggs, "a five-year-old that we call Johnny. Johnny had been told that the moon goes around the earth, and the other night he was out making astronomical observations. Pretty soon the little fellow came running in and said: "Oh, mamma, I saw the moon going round the world!" "Did you, dear?" "Yes. I saw it run up past two clouds." "And which way was it going?" "It was going toward the railroad station."

**An Irreducible Fracture.**

"Dr. Splintem, the surgeon," declared the man with the red shingles on his house, "is the most expert man in his profession in the city." "Indeed?" politely asked the man with the iron dog on his lawn. "Yes, sir. Why, there isn't any kind of a fracture that he can't set, and set perfectly." "Is that so?" murmured the man with the iron dog on his lawn. "Now, I wonder if he would be any good at setting a broken egg?"—Judge.

**Nothing Unusual.**
