The light of the Daily Tarheel at Greensboro seems to have been snuffed out.

The weather does not get cooler just because the keeper of the bureau predicts that it will.

We told you something else would happen. Look at that assault in Durham on a judge.

Durham wants a new jail. Looks like it will be needed if things get much worse up there.

Governor Douglas is getting enough of it and says he will not stand for re election.

Every now and then a lot of cotton goes up in smoke. At Johnston, S. C., a warehouse containing a thousand bales was destroyed by fire.

It is a dull week in Salisbury in which a murder or two does not occur or somebody get killed on the railroad.

Marshall Field pays tax on \$40,000,000 and don't make any kick. Well, we would not kick either if we had that much money.

Raleigh is preparing an elaborate reception for President Roosevelt when he comes Oct. 19th, and the whole state will help her in it.

Mayor Woodward says if he was drunk in Toledo, he did not know it. It might have been that he was so drunk he could not remember it.

With yellow fever already existing on the South, and cholera breaking out in Germany and threatening the North, it looks like Uncle Sam is beset with evils on both sides.

Bishop Potter's subway tavern in New York has met failure and gone back to a common saloon. Another verification of the statement that religion and whiskey won't mix.

Two foremen of the government printing office have been dismissed for giving testimony adverse to their superiors whose acts were being investigated. That is usually the way of it, shut off the light as much as possible.

One of the most outrageous occurrences in North Carolina was an assault made by ex-mayor McCown, of Durham, on Judge George Ward, who was holding court in Durham. A negro who had killed a nephew of McCown had been convicted of manslaughter, the verdict of the jury carrying with it a recommendation for mercy. Judge Ward sentenced the negro to fifteen months on the roads. McCown thought the sentence too light and went to the judge's boarding house after court and asked him to change the sentence. Upon Judge Ward declining to do this McCown assaulted him. Judge Ward had McCown arraigned on a bench warrant, citing him to answer for contempt of court. This trial resulted in McCown being sentenced to thirty days in the county jail and fined \$200. Things have reached a pretty pass when a judge is assaulted for discharging his duty as he sees it.

Atlanta's mayor has not resigned yet, but he ought to.

In Cabarrus county a guard has been fined \$25 for punishing a convict. We are glad to hear of this. Convicts should be treated humane, and all guards who fail to realize this fact should be severely punished themselves.

The number of attempts recently made to wreck trains on the Southern railway has a serious aspect and is likely to make people feel fearful when they travel. If the parties attempting these wrecks can be caught they will make good subjects for a hemp necktie.

Charlotte is the most active building and loan city in the state. As a result there are now 317 buildings in course of construction in that city. It has been a desire of THE REFLECTOR for many years that Greenville have a good building and loan association, and we yet hope to see that hope realized.

**Too Much Politics.**

Not only county but state politics and the names of prospective candidates for the higher offices are being discussed. In some quarters even gubernatorial candidates for 1908 have been named. Here are some of them, Ex Congressman Bellamy, of New Hanover; Judge Cook, of Franklin; Congressman Pugh, of Johnston, and Capt. T. W. Mason, of Northampton. All these are good men, but it is too early to bring out candidates for our next governor. Governor Glenn has more than three years to serve yet. And right here we wish to say that the people of North Carolina talk politics too much for their own good. An election is hardly over before they begin to discuss the question as to who shall be candidates for the offices at the next election. The candidates themselves are largely responsible for this. There is one man in Moore county who has about reared a family in office, who begins to work for his own re-election by the time the ballots are counted out. The citizens of the county should discourage such business as this. It is injurious to our best interests. Too much political agitation upsets business and keeps things in a turmoil.—Sanford Express.

**Fear of Doctors.**

The ignorance of some of the people of the lower classes in New Orleans has had its effect in making difficult the full application of the rules and regulations in the yellow fever epidemic. One physician, for example, was almost mobbed by some Italians to whom he endeavored to give some hypodermic injections. He only saved his life by giving himself this same treatment. This fear of the doctors appears in every such panic. When smallpox is prevalent there is no way to get people to be vaccinated except by compulsion. People who turn bath tubs into receptacles for coal are not easily induced to undergo treatment which is new and mysterious. Their fear arises through superstition and ignorance. They must be cured against their will.—Boston Herald.

The Corporation Commission reports total incomes listed for taxation at over two and a half million, an increase over last year of nearly three hundred thousand dollars.

The Pilot Mountain Courier says editorially that it has been taken to task "for not publishing a few items of which he knows." Then follows an explanation: "In the first place, we carry no life insurance nor own no square in the cemetery, and are running no account with the undertakers, therefore we are in no shape for publishing everything we see and hear." These do be good reasons.—Winston Journal.

Whereas, official information has been received at this department that William Williams murdered Lawrence Hopkins, of Pitt county, and whereas, it appears that the said William Williams has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him.

Now, therefore, I, R. B. Glenn, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my Proclamation, offering a reward of Fifty Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said William Williams to the sheriff of Pitt county at the Court-house in Greenville and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens, to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.
