TOWN MATTERS.

Aldermen Have a Busy Session.
The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session, Thursday night, six of the members being present.
I. A. Sugg appeared before the board regarding damage claimed to have been sustained by L. H. Allen from driving into a ditch near the factory of the American Tobacco Co., on Tenth street, on the night of August 19th. Consideration of the matter was deferred to the next regular meeting of the board.
S. T. White in behalf of the Red Men asked that the board permit a street carnival to be held here in October under the auspices of the Red Men and fire department. By a vote of 5 to 1 the carnival was permitted to come, free of tax.
The finance committee reported that \$3,000 had been borrowed to meet incidental expenses of the town until taxes can be collected.
The street committee reported that because of scarcity of hands not much work had been done lately but the streets were in passable condition.
A bit of merriment was caused when Alderman Moye stated he had been requested by a citizen of the town to ask the board to enact an ordinance that would prevent driving on the streets faster than 20 miles an hour. This served to call attention to the fact that the ordinance prohibiting driving on the streets faster than 8 miles an hour is daily violated, and the mayor said more diligence would be exercised to stop this.
The lights and wells committee reported that drinking and watering fountains had been put up.
The market committee reported that an additional stall in the market house had been rented. It was also stated that complaint had been made of the uncleanly condition of the market house and the chief of police was instructed to make daily inspection and have the cause of complaint removed.
At this stage Alderman Carr asked to be excused from the meeting. As he walked out Alderman Moye remarked that he did not see why Alderman Carr should be excused, as the latter had no wife to demand his attention. "But he is trying to get one," replied Mayor Wooten, and there was another laugh.
The cemetery committee reported inability to do much work because of scarcity of funds.
The reports of the several officers for the past month were read. The report of the dispensary showed sales during August amounting to \$4,799.70. The report of the superintendent of the water and light plants showed an increase of nineteen light customers and nine water customers during August, making an increase in income of about \$75.
License to conduct restaurants was granted to Charlie Bright, E. L. Weathering, Joe Forbes and S. J. Nobles.
The official bonds of the treasurer, dispensary manager and dispensary commissioners were presented and accepted.
The duty of building inspector for the town was placed upon the chief of the fire department and his salary was increased to \$20 per month.
D. D. Overton was elected assistant chief of the fire department without competition.
Orders were drawn on the treasurer for current expenses and to make a payment on fire hose purchased, the total amounting to \$1,603.40.

Eleven Cent Minimum.
Asheville, N. C., Sept. 7.—At 10:15 o'clock tonight the executive committee of the Southern Cotton Association, after an executive session of two hours, made known the report of the committee on the minimum price of cotton, which had been adopted. The report is as follows:
"Your committee realizing the unusually strong statistical position of cotton, recommend a minimum price of 11 cent basis in middling uplands at home market throughout the cotton belt."
(Signed.) "E. D. Smith, chairman; H. G. Brooks, secretary."
The report was announced by President Jordan publicly.
It was a compromise as the far South element was said to be strongly in favor of twelve cents and the Carolinas wanted ten cents. The report has met general approval and the spirits of the members are very high.

Let Parents Co operate.

They can do this in no better way than through co operation with the teachers in their efforts to advance the pupils. What the teachers can do for the child really amounts to very little unless the parent has a keen interest in the child's success and heartily co operates with the teacher in his efforts to instruct and advance the child. If a teacher assigns to the child a task at school, the parent is very unwise to encourage the child to regard it lightly. If the parent has criticisms to make concerning the teacher's work and management he will injure the teacher's influence very much by speaking out such criticisms in the presence of the child. To get the best results possible for the time and money invested in the effort to educate children, there must be hearty and complete co operation between parent and teacher; and every parent can do this much in the work of educating the child.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.
