EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY.

Several Towns Destroyed and Hundreds of People Killed.

Rome, Sept. 8.—All Italy is suffering from terrible depression, because of the news from the south, where one of the worst earthquakes ever experienced occurred today. Although the earthquake was felt all over Calabria and to a certain extent in Sicily, the worst news comes from Pizzo and Monteleone and from eighteen villages, which are said to have been completely destroyed. According to the latest news received, 370 persons have been killed and a great number injured. It is as yet impossible even to estimate the property losses.

The shock was felt at 2:55 o'clock this morning. It lasted for eight ten seconds at Catanzaro and soon thereafter was felt at Massina, Reggio, Monteleone, Martrani, Setafaconi, Piscopio, Triparni, Zammaro, Cessaniti, Naida, Olivadi and other points.

Scenes of indescribable terror ensued. Women aroused from their sleep rushed half clothed into the streets screaming with fear, carrying their babies and dragging along their other children and calling for help on the Madonna and the saints. The men escaped into the open with their families, all calling on their favorite saints for protection. The cafes were taken by assault by the strangely garbed crowd, but as daylight broke with out a repetition of the earthquake the crowd gradually melted away until by eight o'clock the streets had almost assumed their normal appearance except in the ruined villages where the inhabitants had no homes to go to. The general confusion was added to by dreadful cries from the jails, where the prisoners were beside themselves with fright, and in some cases mutilated, but fortunately all the prisoners were kept within bounds.

Troops, engineers and doctors have been hurried to the scenes of disaster to assist in the work of rescue and salvage. The minister of the interior sent \$4,000 for the relief of the destitute, and Minister of Public Works, Ferraris left for Calabria this morning.

Come to think about it, this is not the first time Charlotte has had water trouble. Some years ago it was swimming in the reservoir.

McCown has settled down quietly to his term in jail, Duke has dropped from the headline in the papers, and the folks are ready for something else.

The Federal court in session at Greensboro to investigate revenue irregularities knows what it is doing, but it is not letting the anxious ones on the outside know.

The rioting at home among the Japanese because of dissatisfaction over the outcome of the peace conference, is calculated to make the world believe they are as bad as the Russians.

The county will have good roads when the people make up their minds that they want them and cannot do without them. But they are very slow to recognize what is best in this particular.

There is doubt about it doing any good, but as a carnival is coming any way let everything be done to make it do as little harm as possible. Get all the people to come to town and give the innovation a fair test.

It must be gratifying to Judge Ward to know that every expression of opinion has been on his side of the matter—except the lawyers who were trying to get McCown out of jail. And no doubt it was the fee that prompted them.

The investigation into the cause of the death of the man Nall, who was a patient of the state hospital at Raleigh, makes an ugly showing for the officers of the institution and nurses connected with the case. Brutality of those in authority over inmates of hospitals and prisons has become too common and proper punishment of offences of this kind will have a tendency to check it.

This does not exactly reach the "peepers" but it comes mighty close to it. The city council of Houston, Texas, has enacted an ordinance that reads like this:

"That hereafter any male person in the city of Houston who shall stare at, or make what is commonly called 'goo-goo' eyes at, or in any other manner look at or make remarks to or concerning, or cough or whistle at, or do any other act to attract the attention of any woman or female person upon or traveling the streets of Houston, with the intent or in a manner calculated to annoy, or to attempt to flirt with any such woman or female person, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in the corporation court of the city of Houston, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100."

Such an ordinance as that in some towns would soon have the boys "busted" from paying fines.

There's a Volume of Heart Ache in That Expression.

Some weeks ago, license was issued for the marriage of a couple of Wilkes' good young people. Last week one day, the intended groom brought back the paper and in trembling tones said to the register: "here's them license." The register looked at the paper and remarked: "Why friend, it don't appear like you used the license." "No," replied the intended groom, "She went back on me." And great tears dropped from his eyes as he rushed out of the office. Well, you say it was funny; so it was. But do you know there was real heart-ache, too? "Went back on me." Did you ever think of the volume of heart aches in it? It is not confined to little love matters, but most of life's heart aches are traceable to some one who in some way "went back on me."—Wilkesboro Chronicle.

The Governor's Action Means Much.

If all men knew that a pull or persuasion, or money, or anything they might offer would not save them from the law's demands, the chances are that there would be much less crime. And we are glad that North Carolina has a governor who will not interfere with the decision of courts unless there has been new evidence found or unless there is evidence that the accused and convicted did not have a fair and impartial trial. It means a purer atmosphere—it means less lawlessness.—Fairbrother's Everything.

Governor Glenn has permitted three men to be hanged recently in the face of strong and determined efforts to secure commutation. It the governor persists in this sort of thing it will positively get to be dangerous to kill people in this state.—Statesville Landmark.

As an old farmer friend remarks, a home grown, hand-spanked, bare-footed and hard fisted country boy makes a much better fighter in the battles of life than does the pampered, high-collared, crease trousered youth of our towns and cities whose clothes have always been dusted with a whisk broom instead of a shingle.—Louisburg Times.

Colonel Watterson says that no first-class man can afford to go to Congress for \$5,000, though a great many—possibly not of this class—pay much more to get there. The late Simon Cameron had a wider view. He was accustomed to say that there were only two kinds of men who could afford to be in politics; those who needed the money and those who didn't. It was the endorsement of that view that brought pretty nearly every Pennsylvanian into politics.—Philadelphia Press.

It is interesting to know that the very day the treaty of peace between Russia and Japan was signed was the one hundred and first anniversary of the birth of Governor E. A. Graham, of this State. Historians will recall that Governor Graham, who was secretary of the navy under President Filmore, was instrumental in effecting a treaty with Japan. He arranged for Commodore Matthew C. Perry to go with a fleet to Japan and persuade the nation to open her ports to American ships. That was 1852, and at that time no Christian nation, except the Dutch, was allowed to trade with Japan and even the Dutch were not permitted to dwell in that country. Had Governor Graham lived until last Tuesday he would have been 101 years old.—Charlotte Observer.
