

### HEAVY LOSS TO JAPAN.

#### Togo's Flag Ship Destroyed.

Tokio, Japan, Sept. 12.—The battleship Mikasa sank at Sasebo early yesterday. Six hundred men were lost. Admiral Toga was not on board.

The sudden sinking of the battleship, Vice Admiral Togo's flagship in the battle of the Sea of Japan, is thought by many to be connected with the dissatisfaction in Japan over the peace terms. As yet the exact cause of the disaster is not known, nor will it be known for some time.

Government officers were ordered to make an investigation at once and are trying to build up a chain of facts that will explain the reason for the as yet unexplained catastrophe.

The battleship was at Sasebo. At midnight on September 10 the fire was discovered near her main mast. The fire companies of the vessels in the harbor and the firemen from ashore, many of whom were subsequently lost, went to her assistance.

Although desperate efforts were made to check the flames they spread rapidly after the lower magazine exploded with a mighty roar. The missing men number six hundred.

The Mikasa was a first class battleship of 15,200 tons displacement. She was built in England and was launched in 1902. The battleship was 400 feet long, had a speed of over 18 knots and carried a crew of 935 officers and men. She was heavily armored and carried four 12 inch guns, four 6 inch guns twenty 12 pound, and a number of smaller rapid fire guns. She had four submerged torpedo tubes.

#### The School There is a Credit to the State.

The seaside hotels are retiring to winter quarters. Most of them had big summer business.

North Carolina people are waking up to the idea that they can do business at home and not send all the money to enrich other states. If you don't believe this just look at what the insurance companies of the state are doing.

Some papers are having a little controversy over the age and origin of the saying "Public office is a public trust." It matters not how old the saying is, or how true it ought to be, too many people who get office regard it as a private snap.

The action of the people at High Point will make bum shows cautious how they visit that town. An audience was in the opera house witnessing a performance that was found so intolerable that the people arose in a body and forbid the manager of the opera house turning over a cent of the receipts to the show crowd. At the same time they did not ask for a refund of the money, but had it turned over to a charitable institution. If more bum shows on the road were treated in the same way there would be less imposition on the public.

**Showed Him the Door.**

Mr. Roosevelt is being severely criticized because of his removal of Public Printer Palmer by telegraph. The president is not noted for courtesy in showing folks the door. When he wants them to go, he shows them his number nines. That is very effective, though not very considerate. Sometimes he is right and sometimes he is wrong. In this instance, public opinion is much divided. He declares that Palmer's purchase of seventy-two Lanston-Monotype machines was "mal administration" "but no corruption." He gives Palmer a grand bounce who had done nothing half as bad as Morton whom he praised to the skies. The "square deal" is often administered, but a man who is Roosevelt's personal friend rarely feels his number nine, however richly he deserves it, for the President is as blind to the glaring faults of his friends as he is unrelenting in his punishment of others who make the slightest departure from what he regards the correct path.—News and Observer.

The contract for feeding and housing the men engaged in digging the Panama Canal has been let to an Omaha man. He is to build ten hotels along the line of the canal, and 120 commissary camps, to supply and transport all food stuffs, and this he binds himself to do for \$50,000,000.

**Company to Develop Trucking Interests.**

A very extensive movement for the development of eastern North Carolina, which is a great trucking region has been begun by the granting of a charter by the state, to the Carolina Trucking Development Company, with half a million dollars capital stock, with headquarters at Wilmington. The company is given authority to bring in immigrants, operate steamers, also to build and operate trolley roads, highways, all sorts of manufactures, and to generally promote the interests of that rich region, part of which is now the strawberry center of the United States. The eyes of railway people are turned to this section, and more roads are being pushed into it than anywhere else in North Carolina, work being now in progress on no less than five and surveys for two more being under way.

Senator Tillman is to be congratulated. Senator McLaurin has decided to head the movement to abolish the dispensary. Tillman always plays in good luck.—News and Observer.

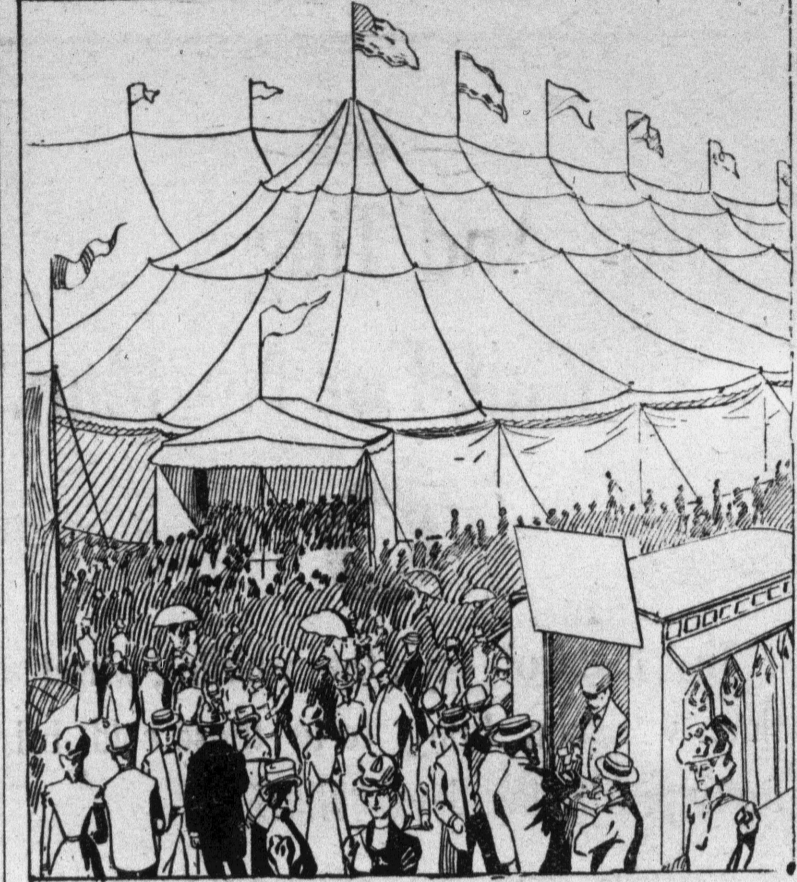

How One Major General Was Made During the Civil War.

During the civil war General Butterfield was sent to Washington to discuss a certain plan of army operations with President Lincoln. When he appeared at the White House Senator Sumner was with the president. In "A Biographical Memorial of General Daniel Butterfield" the conversation between the senator and the president is given.

"Mr. President," said the senator, "you have issued an order which has relieved General Saxton from the command in front of Charleston and placed General Gillmore in command. General Saxton is very highly thought of, and I am much interested in him. He has a natural feeling of pride that the ranking officer should command. General Saxton is of higher rank than General Gillmore. He is perfectly willing that General Gillmore should carry out all plans and operations and does not desire to interfere with them at all, but with the pride and spirit of the old army officers he simply desires, and his friends desire with him, that the ranking officer should command. It will not interfere with General Gillmore in carrying out the operations."

"You say, Mr. Senator, that they are both brigadier generals?"

"Yes, but General Saxton is the ranking officer."

"Will it be entirely satisfactory to you, Mr. Senator, and all our friends and to General Saxton if the ranking officer is in command?"

"Perfectly so, Mr. President."

"Very well," said Mr. Lincoln, "I will arrange it. I will have General Gillmore made a major general."

It was hard to keep from laughing at the quick response and the prompt action of the president in taking the senator upon his proposition and thus meeting it. Mr. Sumner bade the president good morning and retired.

"No longer able to repress the emotion the interview had caused," writes General Butterfield, "I laughed and remarked, 'Mr. President, is that the way major generals are made?'"

## The Tree of the Most Rapid Growth.

The eucalyptus, a genus of myrtaceae, grows to a greater height in a shorter time than is the case with any other known tree. The eucalyptus has increased its height by as much as twenty-four feet in the short space of three months and attains rapidly both a great height and a large circumference. These trees form the preponderant and most characteristic vegetation of the Australian forest, where they are famed for their great heights, usually ranging from 200 feet to 400 feet, while one has been recorded as having attained nearly 500 feet, with a circumference of 81 feet. An oak tree in three years grows 2 feet 10 1/2 inches; a larch, 3 feet 7 1/2 inches; an elm, 8 feet 3 inches; a beech, 1 foot 8 inches; a poplar, 6 feet; a willow, 9 feet 3 inches. An elm attains full growth in 150 years and lives to 500 or 600. Ash is full grown in 100 years, while it takes 200 years for oak and mahogany to reach full height.

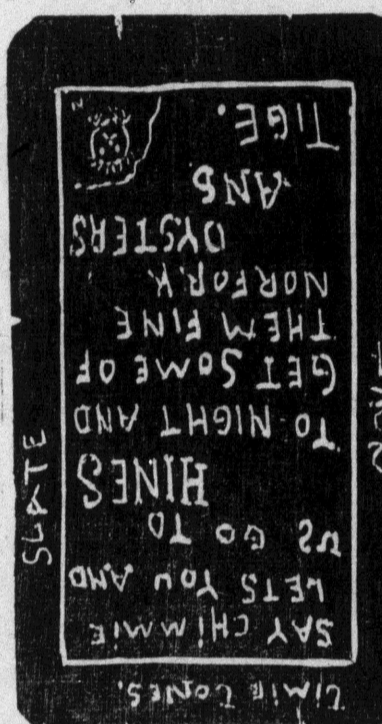

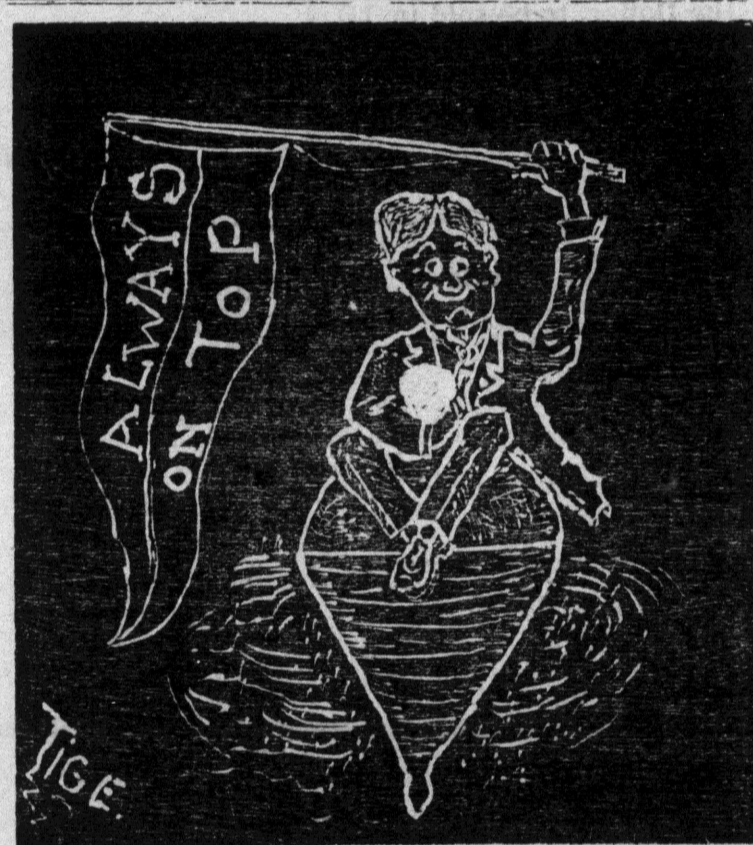
