Popular Young Lady Summoned From Earth.

Though she had lingered at death's door for several days and the end was not unexpected, the announcement this morning that Miss Myrtle Wilson was dead brought sadness to many hearts. Besides the parents she leaves three brothers and three sisters to mourn their loss. These are W. R., Frank and Eugene Wilson, Mrs. Ollen Warren, Jr., and Misses Nannie and Lillie Wilson.

The funeral will take place Wednesday, services being held in the Baptist church and the interment in Cherry Hill cemetery.

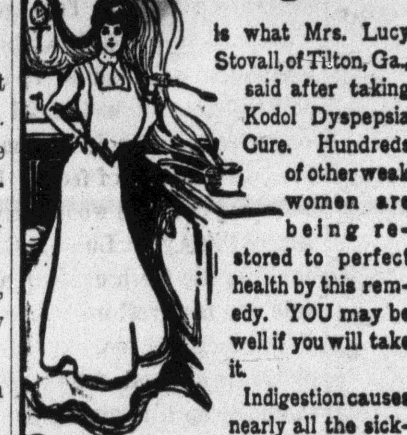

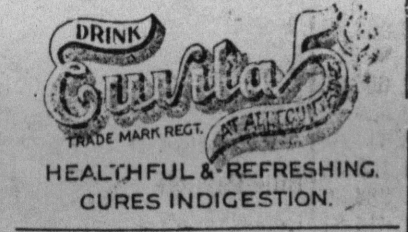
