SUPERIOR COURT.

September Term in Session.

The grand jury on Saturday afternoon made the following report to the court:

We the Grand Jury for the term beg leave to report; that we have acted on all bills coming before us and reported the same to the court; that we have no other bills to be acted on.

That we have visited the county home for the poor, and that we found the premises in an excellent condition. We called on the keepers' wife and asked permission to visit the room of each inmate, which was complied with and we proceeded to inspect each room and see each inmate. Of each we asked these questions: "Do you get plenty of food and clothing and have comfortable quarters?" To which all answered in affirmative, save two, and these two said "plenty such as it is."

But there are two inmates we wish to call attention to. One a girl about fourteen years of age old, an idiot in deplorable condition. She is unable to walk or talk and must be kept in a chair tied during the day, she is in a room with a feeble woman not less than seventy years of age, and herself in a helpless condition, but conditions make it necessary for her to wait on this child, both night and day, such as putting her to bed and dressing her. The other is an insane girl confined in a room closed in with shutters and iron bars, in which she can not be comfortable during cold weather. We recommend that these two girls, inmates be arranged for in some other way. We are of opinion that Mr. Hardy deserves credit for the way the home is kept.

Also, we have visited the convict camp and found it in good condition. The health of the prisoners is good. And we believe that the camp is properly ordered and kept.

We have visited the county jail and found that it is kept in splendid condition, and that the prisoners are well cared for. We have inspected the court house and found that the building needs some little attention in the way of repairs to the walls, floors, shutters, etc. Also, we recommend that a desk be bought for the clerk's office that his business may be more conveniently transacted to both the clerk and the public.

A PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR. \$50.00 REWARD

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Whereas, official information has been received at this department that William Williams murdered Lawrence Hopkins, of Pitt county, and whereas, it appears that the said William Williams has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him.

Now, therefore, I, R. B. Glenn, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my Proclamation, offering a reward of Fifty Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said William Williams to the sheriff of Pitt county at the Court-house in Greenville and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our City of Raleigh, the 14th day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and five and in the one hundred and 29th year of our American Independence.

The price of diamonds is steadily advancing, and we would advise our North Carolina editorial brethren that now is the time to lay in their winter supply. —Durham Sun

How many can you buy with a load of wood?

Mr. Rockefeller's announcement of his goodness followed quickly by two advances in the price of oil. Those who have changed from kerosene to electricity are not caught by it.

Now that the charge is admitted, President Roosevelt does not seem in such a hurry to talk as he was to enter a denial to Judge Parker's charge made near the close of the last campaign that the big corporations were large contributors to the Republican campaign fund.

"The Clansman," Rev. Thomas Dixon's famous book which he has dramatised, was given its initial performance in Norfolk on Friday night and is pronounced a great success. The audience received it with great enthusiasm and it is pronounced the best play on the American stage today.

If there is any set of men in North Carolina that every Democrat should want to see landed in jail, it is the corrupt revenue doodles. In every campaign none are more active in using their position corruptly in an effort to defeat the Democrat party. Yet we see that ex Gov. Aycock is to be one of the counsel to try to clear the crowd recently indicted by the Federal court at Greensboro. There ought to be instances when fees will not secure the services of some lawyers.

Did Mr. Roosevelt know?

If what John A. McCall, president of the New York Life, did in contributing the funds of his company for political purposes was wrong, then isn't Cornelius N. If he knew of the methods that were employed in raising funds for carrying on the Republican campaign, and it is not unreasonable to suppose that he did, then he is just as guilty of the shameful act as Mr. McCall, Mr. Bliss or Mr. Cortelyou. If Mr. Roosevelt was ignorant of these methods at the time, then he certainly can no longer enter that plea. Now that he knows what has been going on what is he going to say? Will he denounce the evil practices as other honest men have done, or will he sit silent and allow the people to think what they please. INOCULATED SEED OF NITROGEN GATHERING CROPS.

The North Carolina Department of Agriculture will during the month of October distribute among the farmers of the state for experimental purposes, small lots of seed of the following leguminous crops, the seed being in each case ready inoculated with the nitrogen fixing germ and suitable for immediate planting without further treatment. The crops to be experimented with are as follows: Alfalfa, burr, clover, sand vetch and crimson clover.

The samples sent out will suffice to sow a strip of land 4 x 68 feet or one square rod. As a control test, a smaller quantity of the same seed uninoculated will be sent also.

Applications will be received for any one of the above named seeds or for all four kinds, but not more than one sample of one kind will be sent to one applicant. Applicants must enclose with application 20 cents in postage stamps for each kind of seed they desire.

Applicants for these seeds must also send to the undersigned a sample of about one-half pounds of surface soil from the field upon which they propose to sow these seeds. This sample should be made up from lots of soil taken from different parts of the field. The soil sample is required to determine the acidity of soil and amount of nitrogen ready present. The soil samples must be sent post paid.

Applicants must also furnish a description of the field and of the crops grown thereon during the last two years. Experimenters are advised to select dry, clean soil which has this year been in cotton, corn or some hoed crop. Those who wish to take part in this experiment should make prompt application as the supply of seed will be limited.

New York's Lost Children.

The number of children in the course of a year varies considerably.

The largest number of children ever sheltered at the Central Office in the course of a year was in 1892, the year of the Columbian Celebrations, when, during twelve months, more than five thousand six hundred children were under Mrs. Travers' care.

Fully two thirds more children are lost during the summer than during the winter, and at the time of the Italian feast of St. Rocco, celebrated in June, the press of parents waiting on the steps of Police Headquarters is so great that, according to the officer who tends the door, you have to drive them down so you can come up! Indeed, Italians divide with Jews the honors of losing their little ones. About two-thirds of all the children lost may be safely given to these two.

But the "star day" of all the year is the first opening of the public schools, after the summer vacation. Many little ones go to school for the first time, and are too small to find their way home at noon; so the mother doubtless gives the teacher very explicit directions to keep "Ikey" or "Rebecca" until her arrival at noon. Now to the bewildered teacher, all pupils, at first, appear alike, therefore it is not strange that she fails to remember which is "to be kept till called for;" so, when school is out, many little ones find themselves in the street, not only totally ignorant of how to reach home but frequently of where home is located. They wander aimlessly about, sometimes most surprising distances, and finally, tired out and discouraged, they begin to cry. Here some officer takes a hand and, by night, the majority of them will be enjoying the city's hospitality at the Central Office. —Pearson's Magazine for October.

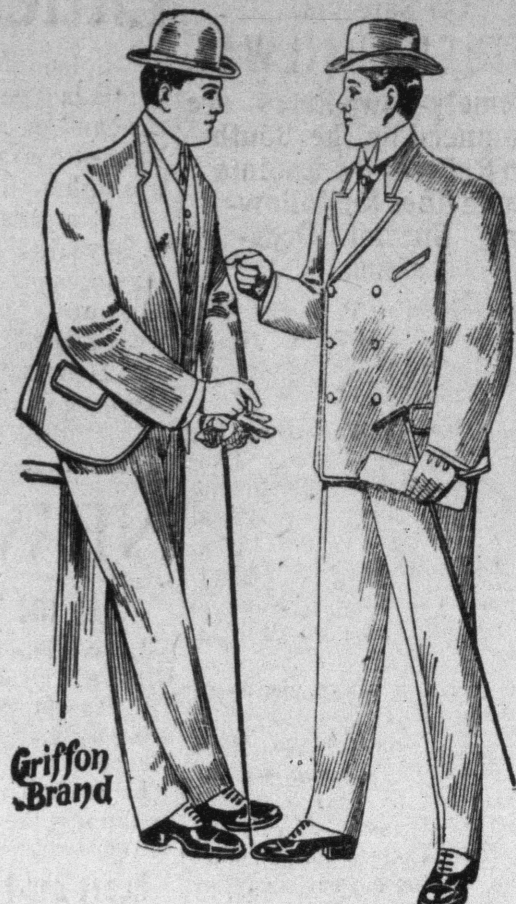
