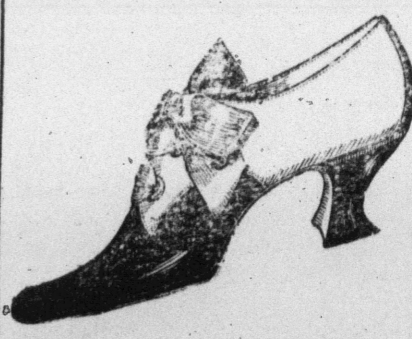

There are so many towns trying to get a stop-over from the president when he comes to North Carolina

A meeting has been called in Washington City November 8th looking to a change in the date of presidential inaugurations. There ought to be a change, no doubt about that.

Mr. Cortelyou, who as chairman of the Republican campaign committee received the large sums contributed by the insurance companies, is not saying anything about returning the money, though there have been several intimations that it should be paid back.

Is Greenville going to do anything toward getting another daily train on this branch of the Coast Line? There will be no better time to get it than now, but it is not coming unless the effort is made. The business of the town suffers every day transportation facilities remain as they are.

Greensboro hotels are putting in white dining room servants and finds that the change is doing well. It is said many other hotels throughout the state are making the same change. The reason assigned is that colored help is becoming so unreliable that no other course was left. When the negro finds himself ousted from the jobs he formerly held he can lay the blame on his own worthlessness and unreliability.

JUDGE JONES TO RESIGN?

The Raleigh News and Observer of Wednesday had the following:

There is a persistent rumor that Judge Erastus B. Jones, of Winston Salem, will resign his position as Superior court judge and return to the practice of the law in Winston-Salem. In that connection the Caswell Democrat says:

"We cannot fail to call the Governor's attention who appoints his successor, to the facts that the only reliable Democratic counties in the district are Caswell and Rockingham and one of these deserve the place. To bear and carry out all good Democratic precedents immediately upon the resignation of Judge Jones Governor Glenn would tender same to Col. A. E. Henderson, of our county, who ran in only four votes of a nomination."

The REFLECTOR showed the fore going to Judge E. B. Jones, who is presiding at the present term of Pitt Superior court, and questioned him regarding the report. He said this was not the first time the report had been made, but it was wholly without his authority as he had never intimated the least idea of resigning.

Speaking further Judge Jones said the nomination for the judgeship came to him as a surprise and without solicitation, and that while it necessitated his giving up a good law practice and being kept from home much of his time, both of which were against his inclinations, the honor coming to him as it did he felt it his duty to accept it, and since entering upon the duties of judge had performed them to the best of his ability.

The REFLECTOR is glad that Judge Jones has no inclination to resign. North Carolina needs just such men on the Bench as he is. This is the

first court he has held in Pitt county and no judge has made a more favorable impression on our people. He fills his position with dignity and honor and conducts the court in a business like way. He is firm yet reasonable in his rulings, imposes the penalty of the law where he thinks an offense demands it and is merciful when he thinks mercy is merited. He is an able and upright judge.

The Landmark stated in its last issue that the North Carolina companies did not sell insurance any cheaper than the Northern companies but that they promised better returns. This was an error. The Greensboro companies sell certain forms of policies cheaper than the same policy can be bought in the Northern companies, the difference being something like \$4 to \$5 on the \$1,000. Other forms of policies are sold at the same rates. We maintain, however, that all forms of insurance are sold too high. The investigations of the life companies show this. We are informed that the cost is on account of the mortality basis fixed by the actuaries, which is too high, and that if the mortality tables were reduced to a more correct basis insurance could be sold cheaper.—Statesville Landmark.

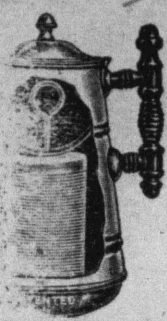
