Sales for month of September 2,841,726 pounds at an average price of \$6.98. Sales for month of August 1,645,439 pounds at an average of \$6.57. This makes the total sales for the two months since the market opened 4,487,165 pounds.

The sales for September this year were nearly a million pounds more than in the same month last year.

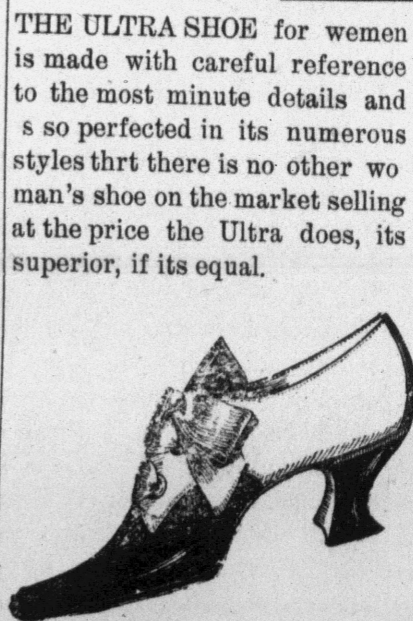

Maryland is to vote on a constitutional amendment restricting negro suffrage in the coming November election. All the states will yet see that it is best to come to this.

The president on his tour through this state will stop five minutes in Durham, and the Herald says that is as long as anybody wants to see him.

The agitation is on again about annulling the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad to the Howland Improvement Co. We fail to see the good to be accomplished by this.

The Raleigh whiskeyites are having a hard time trying to find the necessary one-third of the voters to call an election on the question of reopening saloons in the city. Under these circumstances we fail to see what they base their hopes upon to get a majority to carry the election if it should be held.

The Regulars.

They are the people who do things. They can be found every day of the week and every hour of the day. From the beginning of the world until now the people who have been reliable and trustworthy and forceful are those who are regular, and who do not fly off at every tangent and ride every hobby that comes along. Take them in politics and they are the factors that count. Those who bolt the moment they think their claims ignored are light weights and carry no influence. It is the regular, steady, unchanging, sturdy men who move things. They are not always pleased with the way things are run, but they have too much principle to kick out of the traces because they cannot have their way. Take them in the church and the same thing is true. They are not so good that they lose confidence in their brethren and move up to a holier realm. They are simply sinners, saved by grace, but sinners still. They are not blown about by every wind of doctrine, but they are stable and substantial in all their ways. They are not creatures of impulse but men of deep and abiding conviction. The others make the noise but these men do the work. On their broad shoulders the church burdens rest. They are well-rounded and complete. In a word, they are regular, and their regularity is the force that saves society from going to pieces.—Charity and Children.

The Dignity of the Farmer.

Time has been when a man did not particularly expect an honored seat because he was a farmer; and in some places and among certain classes perhaps he might not expect it now; but, speaking broadly, a dignity attaches to the profession of the farmer that has never been known before. We say "profession of the farmer," for we believe that his high and noble calling entitles him to a distinction among the professions. Never before, perhaps, has the farmer's influence and importance been so well understood. The Charlotte Observer in an editorial article gives this striking paragraph: "It will not do to deery the men who come from the soil. All of us came from it directly or at most through a few generations not far removed. It is true to say that the towns and cities must, if they exist, be recruited from it constantly, and equally true and true that very much of the best brain and energy of our cities, in industrial pursuit, commerce and the professions is recruited immediately from it."—Scotland Neck Commonwealt.

Better Coast Line Facilities.

The Free Press would join the Greenville REFLECTOR in asking for another train on the Weldon-Kinston branch of the Coast Line. The needs of people along that line ought to be consulted, and the requirements of both freight and passenger traffic demand a better service than these people are now getting.

There should be an extra fast mixed train leaving Weldon in the early morning and making Kinston early enough to enable passengers therefrom to take the 10:22 west bound train on the A. & N. C., and returning leaving Kinston after the 4:45 eastbound A. & N. C. train has arrived. This would enable passengers to get in and out with much greater ease than can be done at present, and such a change would greatly facilitate business of all kinds. This train should carry mail, and this again would be a great convenience.

This innovation on the part of the Coast Line, while providing the public a far superior service to that enjoyed at present, would be a business builder for the road, and it would doubtless soon pay the company well, even should it not do so now. However a railroad is a "quasi-public" corporation, and the rights and interests of the public demand recognition at all events.—Kinston Free Press.

Canada, Our Most Important Neighbor.

It would also seem as if Mr. Roosevelt might find important work for American diplomacy in bringing about closer relations between our selves and the people of the great northern half of this continent. There are many reasons besides those that can be expressed in dollars and cents why the ties between the United States and the Dominion of Canada ought to be close and sympathetic. The most colossal blunder of American statesmanship was the failure of this country, years ago, to acquire the great empty territories lying north of the international boundary line and the Great Lakes, and west of what used to be Canada. This vast region did not belong to Canada any more than it belongs to us; and it could have been acquired from Great Britain for a song when we were nagging her about the Alabama claims. It is too late now, to undo that mistake. Nothing could be further from the truth than the idea that Canada will by some sort of inevitable drift come finally into union with the United States. The drift is all in the other direction. Every year that passes more firmly crystallizes the independent position of the Dominion. There is only one possible means by which the situation can be improved, and that is through the reversal of our tariff policy and the adoption of the principle of reciprocity, or, better still, of commercial union.—From "The Progress of the world," in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for October.

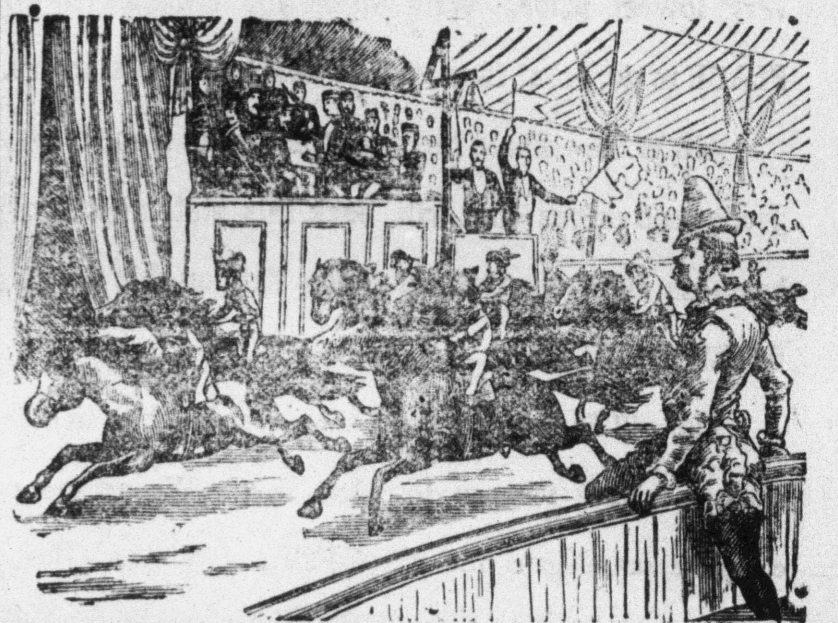

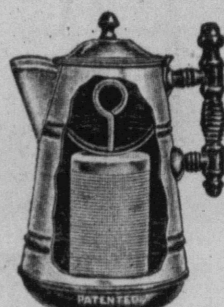

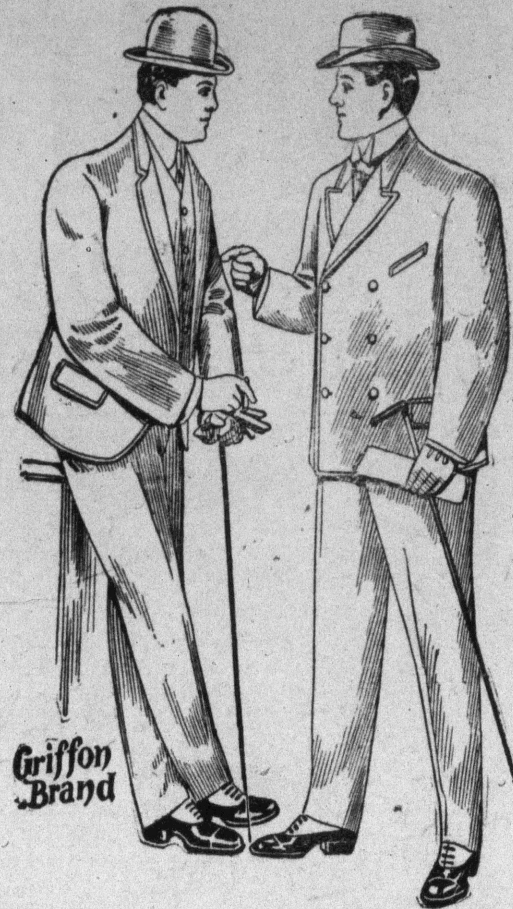
