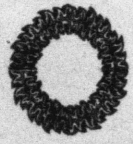

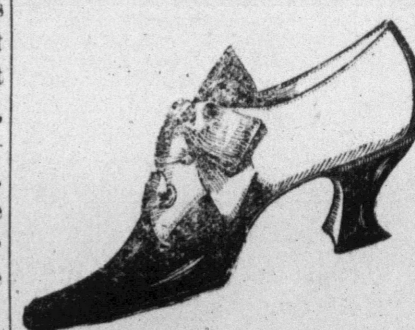
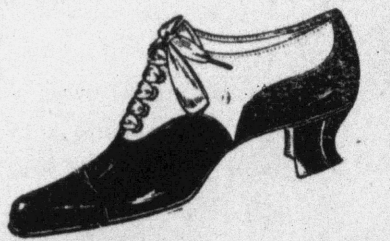

Rockefeller has made good his promise and turned over that \$10,000,000 to higher education. There will be something doing in oil.

In North Carolina none of the play houses are large enough to hold the crowds who want to see Tom Dixon's "Clansman."

"The time is ripe; submit the question of prohibition to the people of North Carolina and I believe it will win by nearly 100,000. I will canvass the state for prohibition."

These were the words of Governor R. B. Glenn in an address before the state convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in Raleigh. There might not just now be altogether so large a majority as the governor predicts, but prohibition is one of the things that is coming sooner or later.

The heart of every true North Carolinian is always made glad at a reminder that the Old North State is making a name for itself. And such reminders are not at all infrequent in these times. In educational progress the state has made giant strides and has written its name where observant people in every state in the union can see it. Just at present its record in insurance is exciting comment and admiration. A Philadelphian has lately been quoted as saying that the progress that North Carolina has made in the establishment of home insurance companies is receiving very general notice and commendation. North Carolina is leading in many things. Let her strive to lead in everything.—Greensboro Telegram.

The President to Pay the Bill.

The officials of the Southern Railway have made the statement that the President is to pay for the train used on his Southern trip, which is to cover 2,000 miles and last ten days. The figures are not revealed, but if the ordinary charge is made, it will cost the President \$5,000 for the train alone and \$60 a day for meals for his party, which would make the cost \$5,600—a pretty heavy bill for a small tour of the country. The President in view of his fight for the enactment of more stringent laws for the regulation of traffic, cannot afford to accept the free use of the train, and if the railroad company just to say that he had paid for it, would make merely a nominal charge it would be a violation of the Interstate Commerce law. So it seems that the President's Southern trip is going to cost him a pretty penny, at all events.—Charlotte Chronicle.

New System of Railroad

The announcement from New York of the election of four new directors of the Norfolk and Southern Railway, made a few days ago, develops the fact that the road has passed into the hands of the same interests that control the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, extending from Morehead City to Goldsboro, a distance of 96 miles.

President Marsden J. Perry, of Providence; Vice-President Frank S. Gannon, of New York, and Director Samuel H. Colt, of Providence, are officials of the Atlantic and North Carolina, and are three of the four members of the new directorate of the Norfolk and Southern.

As the same capitalists control the New Bern, Pamlico and Oriental Railroad, being run northward from New Bern, late developments now indicate a consolidation of all the small railway systems of eastern North Carolina into one system. After the construction of the extension of the N. P. and O., from New Bern to the Southern extension of the N. and S., Norfolk will have a new and complete line to Goldsboro and Morehead City.

Additional strength is given the consolidation plan by the recent sale of the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railway, being constructed from Raleigh to Washington, N. C., which is said to have been acquired by parties in sympathy with Mr. Perry and his friends. If this report is correct the completion of this line may give Norfolk an entire new railway to Raleigh, as it would be undoubtedly the purposes of the new owners to connect all their properties.

The Virginian Pilot learns by another dispatch from Raleigh that a most positive denial is made that the Atlantic Coast Line or the Standard Oil Company have anything to do with the new road, and that it is the intention of the new management to have an independent line in Eastern Carolina.—Norfolk Virginian-Pilot.

The negro calling himself "Prophet George," whom some of the papers humor by printing his silly predictions, must be trying to cut off the attendance at the Raleigh fair when the president comes. He says that one thousand people will be lost between New Bern and Raleigh before Oct. 30th. There is no other time this month when so many people will be on the road at once as during the fair. But no one need be frightened at what the prophet says.

We see that another Weldon fair is advertised, and it reminds us that Greenville and other towns on this branch of the Coast Line are in danger of being imposed on again by the one train on this road being made to serve as an excursion train and wait on the fair until late every night. The people ought to rise up right now and ask the railroad not to put this imposition on them.

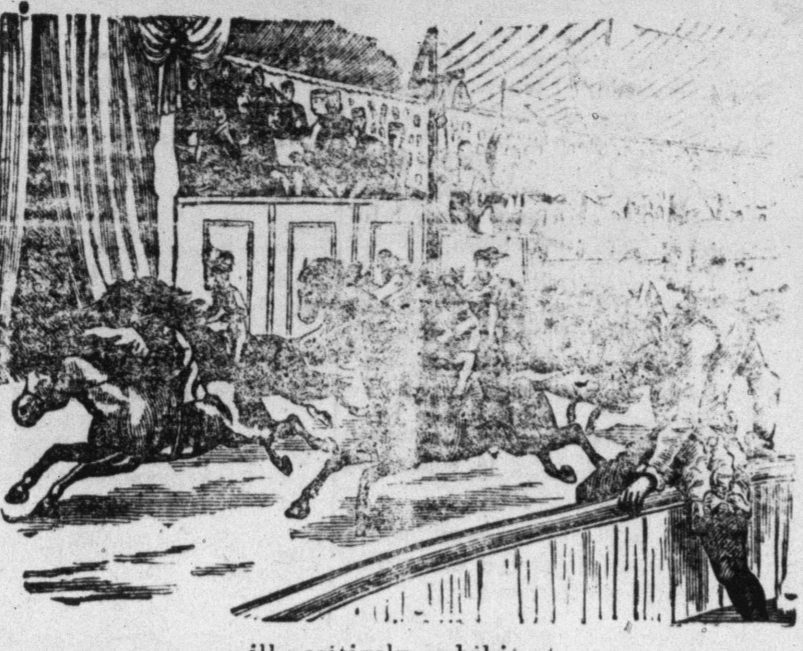

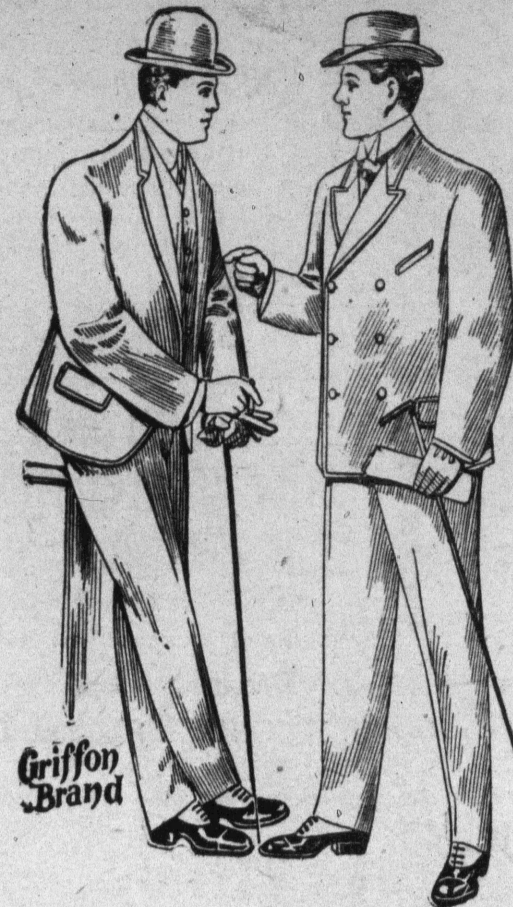
