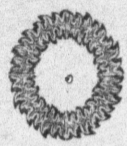

LIGHT PRICES REDUCED

Plant is Prospering and Consumers are Given the Benefit.

The price of electric current for use in domestic and business houses has been reduced from 12 cents per kilowatt to 10 cents. The patronage of the municipal plant has so increased that the water and light commissioners, at their monthly meeting Wednesday night, found that this reduction could with safety be made. It speaks well for a plant that has been in operation only a few months, and the reduction in price means a considerable saving to the consumer. For instance: those who have heretofore used 20 kilowatts per month at a cost of \$2.40 will hereafter get the same service for \$2, those using 10 kilowatts at \$1.20 now getting it for \$1, and so on for whatever quantity the customer uses. At this low rate of 10 cents per kilowatt the number of customers will no doubt be further increased.

The Durham Herald gives as a reason for the president making such a short stay in some of the towns on his Southern trip, that he is to pay his way and therefore his time is limited.

Wednesday's regular issue of the Charlotte Observer was back to its normal size, 10 pages, and that just ten days after the union printers strike. The News and Chronical have done as well. Pretty good record.

The Supreme court has decided that Tom Dewey, the New Bern bank cashier embezzler, can not have a new trial, but must serve the six year penitentiary sentence passed upon him by the lower court. So he will at least get part of what he deserves.

A Door of Opportunity.

There are thousands of young men in the South who are looking for profitable employment and no opening is so wide for these or so quickly remunerative as the printing business. Printing is enormously increasing in the South, as industrial development goes on. The manufacturing all require much job printing and those who operate them require newspapers. In either of these printing fields the forces necessary to carry on the business are short of the demand. This shortage is due, (1) to increasing demand and (2) to the influence of the Typographical Union in limiting the number of apprentices who would learn the trade. The proper start is to learn one of the departments of the trade. There is ready demand for linotypers, pressmen, stereotypers, compositors and in other departments of the work. Any of these trades will not only ensure a way by which a living may always be had, but a really generous income may be made over and above a living. In addition to this; the opportunity for proprietorship and even larger success is as well open to those who have the talent and executive ability as in other channels of work.

Of the distinguished people of the world and especially of this country a very large proportion began life as printers. It was so one hundred years ago and it is so still. It was so when Benjamin Franklin was minister to France and it is so today when Whitlaw Reid is minister to England.—Charlotte Observer.

To Form Socialist Party.

An effort is to be made to form a socialist party in this state. A state convention is to be held in Greensboro on the 11th of this month. It is claimed by the promoters that the prospects are good for a large attendance. The attempt will be made to effect a thorough organization of the party in this state. Eugene V. Debs the socialist candidate for president last year, is expected to be present, with other leading socialists of the national party.

We bet you Marion Butler finds that business of some kind compels him to be in Greensboro on that day, and while there, of course, he will try to make a deal with the socialists, if there are enough present to get up a negotiation with. In the state election in 1904 the socialists polled 109 votes out of the total of 206,134 cast by all parties. This vote was for W. A. Pegram, candidate for governor. This party had only one more candidate in the field, J. C. Lindsay for lieutenant governor, who received 106 votes. So there

does not seem to be much cause for fear on the part of the democrats that their party will be greatly weakened by the organization of the socialists. If Marion Butler should succeed in making a deal he will not add greatly to the strength of the Pop-Rep combination.—Wilmington Messenger.

Overwhelmingly Defeated

It seems strange to us in Iredell where we have had the stock law for so long, that there are sections of the State, especially in eastern North Carolina, where opposition to the stock law is very strong. About one fourth of Moore county is under stock law and an election was held Tuesday to pass on the question of putting the remainder of the county under law. The proposition was overwhelmingly defeated and the denizens of Moore will continue to fence their crops against cattle rather than fence the cattle from the crops. While the campaign was going on the Moore county papers were filled with communications for and against the stock law—mostly against. The old argument, that it is contrary to nature, an outrage and a crime, to prohibit cattle running on the range was used with powerful force. It has been 26 years since the stock law was passed for Iredell. It was not voted in; it could not have been at that time nor for many years afterward. But a member of the Legislature of 1879 was petitioned to pass the law for Iredell and he put it through. It was his first term in the Legislature and his last. He did his county a good service, although his efforts were not generally appreciated at the time. Fact is there was much bad blood and many threats, but no effort was made to repeal the law, everybody got used to it and now we wonder how we would do without it. The Moore county folks, if they had kept quiet, might have prevailed on some member of the Legislature to pass the stock law for them. This is hardly probable now since the election shows such a strong sentiment against the law.—Statesville Land mark.

Another Daily Train

"It really looks like something is about to be done. We have been informed that petitions are now being circulated among the towns on this branch of the Atlantic Coast Line with a view of securing another daily train. That is a move in the right direction and if the towns work together we believe the additional train will be secured. THE REFLECTOR has been hammering on this proposition a long time and hopes soon to see it accomplished."—Greenville REFLECTOR.

Now for a long pull, a strong pull and a pull all together of Kinston business men to co-operate with the business men in other towns along the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and note the results. It will be remembered that the officials of the company did not refuse the committee from Kinston, outright, when a request was made for this double daily service on the A. C. L., and if the business interests show a united front and furnish the company good reasons why the extra service should be established there is little doubt it will be.

These good reasons are apparent to every business man along the line and properly presented to the company officials will accomplish the desired purpose. Let the business men of this city and all co-operate for the establishment of this extra train service and we believe it will be done.—Kinston Free Press.
