AFTER ANOTHER TRAIN.

Petitions in Circulation are Being Generally Signed.

Nearly 10,000 Perished.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 8.—The steamer Tartar which arrived last night from the Orient, brought news from Shanghai that the loss of life among the natives of the islands at the mouth of the Yangtze river as a result of the typhoon at the beginning of September was tremendous. The North China Daily News, of Shanghai, says:

"To the east of Tabagming, two islands, one called Yawoshwa, the other Sni-shonsha, distant about twenty miles from Wosubf, have suffered much from the typhoon, nearly all the inhabitants having been swept away. The islands have only been inhabited for a short time, comparatively speaking, as they are of recent formation and are not much above high water mark."

It is reported that nearly 10,000 people have been drowned on these two islands and the smaller islands adjacent. Tamagming itself has not suffered much, being well above the high water mark."

BATTLE WITH NEGRO MANIAC.

Attacks Officer With Two Knives and is Terribly Beaten.

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 8.—William Lee, a crazy negro, arrested last night at Ocean View by County Constable John Hays, is quiet this morning after a stormy night of raving in the Norfolk county jail. Lee shows badly, his head being a mass of cuts and wounds, inflicted by the officer's blackjack in the struggle in which the two men engaged, Lee being armed with two butcher knives with which he sought the officer's life.

Dr. Morgan, the jail physician, in dressing the man's wounds, found a fractured skull and cuts that required fifty stitches of the needle to close. After a resting spell at the jail, Lee will be examined by a commission of lunacy, and be returned to the colored insane asylum at Petersburg, from which he was paroled.

The Services at the Episcopal.

The sermons Bishop Strange is delivering at the Episcopal church this week for instruction on the great fundamental principles of Christianity are full of live interest as well as of strong value and helpfulness. On Sunday night he preached on "Salvation" showing that, according to Holy Scripture, it is not insurance against fire and future punishment but a most real rescue from sin itself and a restoration to holiness and God-likeness. Sorrow and suffering, here and hereafter, are the result of sin, and when by the power of God sin is removed there can be no condemnation. Salvation is the lifting of man's sinful nature out of its fallen condition and restoring it to the image and likeness of God.

Last night the Bishop preached on "Repentance." Repentance, he said, was a change of attitude toward God and man—a change of mind, a change of conduct, and a change of will. It was turning away from sin in humiliation and sorrow and turning toward God in love, faith and hope.

The subject of tonight's sermon is "Faith."

Negro Mob Lynches Negro.

Bainbridge, Ga., Oct. 8.—News has just reached Bainbridge of the lynching of a negro to day, eight miles west of here, by a mob of his own race. The negro had criminally assaulted a negro girl and had attempted to assault another, who cut him in the breast. The negro was strung up to a tree and riddled with bullets. None of the mob were apprehended.

This means that on the average an Englishman eats two times more than is necessary or even proper. And the English are not much bigger eaters than are we.

The performance is foolish from the standpoint of pleasure alone; from the standpoint of health it is ruinous. Publicity has ruined one of the finest trades in the world. It used to be a great thing to become an exceedingly rich man. There was a period, even, when many earnest publicists were exercised lest the young American should forsake his birthright's ambition to be president for the sake of becoming the richest man on earth. But that danger, is quite passed. Who, now, would take the place of the richest man of the time?

Great wealth does not even bring distinction. On the contrary, it is hopelessly commonplace. The first Astor's million-dollar fortune dazzled. Rockefeller accumulated a thousand millions and thereby made the Midas calling merely ridiculous.

The early plutocrats were invested with mystery. They infused the imagination with suggestions of a splendid and magical ability. Modern inquisitiveness has forever dispelled the magic. Now we see very plainly a poor, melancholy old man with all the shabby paraphernalia of his art pitilessly exposed. A reporter stands at his elbow and says: "You will observe that the rabbit which he is about to produce from the hat is concealed in the skirts of his long coat. I will presently tell you where and how he got both the coat and the rabbit. I call your attention to the fact that this goblet which he used in turning water into wine, has a false bottom."

How can the conjurer retain the respect of the audience under such conditions? Possibly there are a few nearsighted persons on the lower end of Manhattan Island and in other spots who will continue to worship the calf after the gilding has been scrubbed off and the cast-iron ribs disclosed; but there was never less danger of the cult becoming popular.—Saturday Evening Post

The Right Course

The Department of Justice in Washington is standing right behind Judge Boyd in the excellent work he is doing in North Carolina in punishing law breakers. It is announced that D. M. Arey, the wealthy distiller who was sentenced to a term of imprisonment in jail in addition to being fined about \$25,000 for violating internal revenue laws, must pay the fine and also go to jail. Strong efforts were made to have the fine remitted and also to secure a pardon for the defendant on the ground of alleged ill health, but to no avail. He will have to take his medicine just as prescribed by Judge Boyd and there is no longer any hope of interference on the part of the authorities at Washington. It is to be hoped that the position taken by the Department of Justice in this instance is an indication that the same course will be pursued in all such matters in the future. There has been too much of this outside interference in the past for the good of Federal laws in this State. If his superiors will back him up in what he does Judge Boyd will do some effective work in this district and the result in a very short time will be marvelous.—Charlotte News.

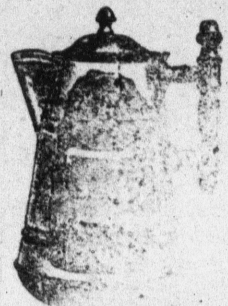
