### J. C. COBB.

The subject of this sketch was born in this (Pitt) county in 1822, and was therefore at the time of his death, which occurred Sunday morning, the eighth inst., eighty-three years old.

In his early boyhood he was always industrious, painstaking and methodical, and whatever he undertook to do he did well. He was therefore always employed. He loved work and found his greatest pleasure in fulfilling and discharging the duties that came to him throughout his entire life.

When he was about twenty-one years old he bought a piece of land which was nearly all in the woods, paying for it with his promise at some future time and thus began life. By thrift and economy he soon paid for this and purchased more, until in a few years he had bought and paid for a large tract of land which is today one of the best farms in the county.

A few years ago the writer of this sketch had the pleasure of riding with him from his home eight miles in the country to Greenville and his recitation of his early beginning in life and reminiscences of the olden times were indeed most interesting. He said when he was first married he worked all day on his cleared land and at night he would grub and get in new land or split rails until eleven or twelve o'clock, and in this way in a few years he had cleared and fenced a good large farm. He told of the rigid economy that he practiced at this time, the simple, plain life that he lived and how he and his boys labored, stunted and economized to pay for this land and get a start in life.

As time went on under his system of work the land was all paid for and he built a store on his farm and stocked it with general merchandise. The people of the section knew and appreciated his qualities and gave him their patronage, therefore the mercantile business soon became a profitable addition to his other occupations.

Mr. R. J. Cobb, a large stockholder and cashier of the Greenville Banking and Trust company, was placed in charge of the store and the other boys worked and co-operated in every way possible to the advancement of the business of J. C. Cobb & Sons. As his investments proved profitable he bought real estate and notwithstanding the fact that as his children grew up and started off in life for themselves, he gave liberally to each of them, yet at the time of his death he owned one of the largest estates in the county.

The life of this man should be an inspiration to all who knew him. Starting life poor in this world's goods, yet by the practice of honesty and frugality, with industry and common sense, he made by his own efforts a very comfortable living and died leaving a valuable estate. He was literally the architect of his own fortune. He carved from the primal forest with his own hands the foundation stone of his vast estate, and lived to a ripe old age, enjoying the fruits of his labors, the highest confidence and esteem of his fellow man, and dying left to his large family of children the priceless heritage of an unblemished character and an honored name.

In his last lingering illness he suffered uncomplainingly, and the fidelity of his children in this ordeal, their ministrations to his comfort was a beautiful manifestation of the love and veneration they bore their father. O. L. JOYNER.

**Tobaccoists Aroused.**

Measures designed to array the tobacco trades of the South against the combination of insurance companies known as the Southeastern Tariff Association were taken Saturday afternoon at a largely attended meeting of the board of governors of the Tobacco Association of the United States, held in Richmond, Va., The Times-Dispatch says:

It is alleged by tobacco men that the tariff association not only demands exorbitant rates, but treats its patrons with scant and decidedly unsatisfactory consideration. The grievance is one of long standing, and results now in a circular letter from the president of the tobacco association to the heads of all the trades holding membership in the general body. This circular, among other things, calls for a "protest" against the "present operations" of the combination.

The fight, which has smoldered along for some time now shows signs of breaking forth in earnest, and the war will be to the knife. The first step to be taken by the Tobacco Association will be the introduction of bills in the legislatures of the states in which the insurance combination does business. These bills will be designed to curb the operations of the alleged trust. The first one will be presented to the legislature of Virginia at the next session.

It is not a surprising piece of news that the daily papers publish about Wadesboro, that several young men were staggering drunk on the streets of that town as the first day's result of granting license to seven persons to retail liquor there. That they were sons of men who voted for bar rooms gives no comfort to any good man. The awful thing about it is, that somebody has made it easier instead of harder for these young men to set their feet upon their mothers' hearts and lay fast hold upon the ways of ruin —Gastonia Gazette.
