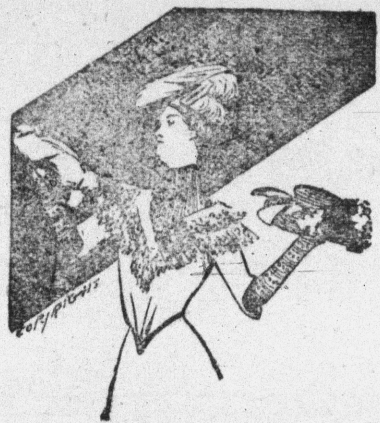

BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATIONS.

Recently some observations have been given in this column concerning building and loan associations. Insurance Commissioner Young, under whose department passes the work of building and loan associations in the state, has recently made the statement that the number of such institutions is increasing.
