STRICKEN WHILE PRAYING.

Elder Q. A. Burroughs Dies in Midst of Funeral Services.
A death under very sad and peculiar circumstances occurred in Chicod township Friday. Ernest Dixon, aged 21 years and a son of J. C. Dixon, died Wednesday night at Whitsett Institute where he was attending school. The remains accompanied by Walter Dixon and L. E. Trent, the former a brother of the deceased, were brought to Greenville on Thursday evening's train and taken out to the home of Mr. Dixon in Chicod township. Friday morning Mr. Dixon sent for Elder Q. A. Burroughs, a minister of the Free Will Baptist church, to conduct the funeral.
The funeral service began about noon at the home of Mr. Dixon, and while Elder Burroughs was kneeling in prayer and had nearly finished his supplication, he ceased speaking audibly and began making a rumbling sound as if trying to speak further. Those present went to his aid and found that he was speechless and helpless. He was removed to a bed and died about an hour after being stricken. It is supposed his death was due to the breaking of a blood vessel. The occurrence was a shock to all present.

Three negro sailors off the schooner Berwind, were on Thursday taken to Wilmington in shackles. They had mutinied while at sea and murdered the four white officers of the vessel, throwing their bodies overboard.
Ex-Sheriff Frank Williams, of Davie county, lost or was robbed of \$370 at the Forsyth fair at Winston last Thursday. The money was in 10 and \$20 bills. The sheriff carried this in an envelope on the inside pocket of his coat. He was getting ready to return home when he felt in his pocket and the money was missing. He has no idea how it got away, but it was probably stolen by a pickpocket.

A Negro Honored.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 12.—The funeral of Amos Rucker, an antebellum negro, took place here this afternoon. He was a member of Camp Walker, United Confederate Veterans, which followed the body to the grave as an honorary escort. General Clement A. Vans, commander of the United Confederate Veterans officiated at the funeral and among the pall bearers were former Governor Allen D. Candler, General A. J. West, Judge W. Lowndes Calhoun, Dr. Amos Fox and R. S. Osborne.
Rucker followed his master "Sandy" Rucker, through the Civil War in the Thirty-third Georgia infantry and has been a familiar figure at Confederate reunions for years.

In London recently a magistrate refused to issue a summons on complaint of a woman that another woman had called her a "Jap." The magistrate held that it was not an insult to be called a Jap. Wonder how he would rule on such epithets as "old Hessian" which some of the women at the cross-roads used to call each other.—Morning Star.

The custom followed by the alumni of the University in meeting every year for a banquet or other coming together is one that should obtain throughout every county in the state. It is by these annual meetings that the spirit of the University may be kept alive and great good will proceed therefrom. At small expense each county in North Carolina could, through its alumni, maintain a scholarship at the University to be given to some worthy and ambitious young man. Ninety such students, entirely representative and picked as they would be for their worth and character, would constitute a force whose influence would prove incalculable.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Family of 9 Dead in a Day.
At Cambridge, Ill., last week, Mrs. Clarence Markham killed her seven children and then killed herself. The woman's husband, when he heard of the tragedy, went to his barn and hanged himself, and to make death doubly sure sent a bullet through his brain. Thus the whole family of nine was wiped out in one day.

What is Fame?

In the "Hall of Fame" elections in New York a few days ago James Russell Lowell, John Greenleaf Whittier and William Tecumseh Sherman were elected, while Oliver Wendell Holmes, Edgar Allan Poe and James Fenimore Cooper were defeated. We suppose there is no fixed criterion of greatness, and if there were there could be no infallible tribunal. But if it is difficult to understand by what process of thought Lowell and Whittier take rank as authors or as men above Oliver Wendell Holmes and Fenimore Cooper. It is easy to understand why Poe, the greatest genius of them all, ranked by critics in Europe as the greatest of American poets, and now recognized everywhere as the inventor of the most widely read class of present day literature—the short story—is left out. Poe was a Southern man. That's all that need be said on that score, but the other is hard to understand; though we frankly confess that it is neither necessary nor important to understand these Hall of Fame elections in New York or elsewhere, Fenimore Cooper was scarcely greater than William Gilmore Simms, but, then, Simms was a Southerner, and his name as a consequence, was not even considered. But, while, of course, we can no more predict who is going to live and who die than the electors of the Hall of Fame can, it is safe to say that outside of New England one hundred of Cooper's books are bought and read today to one of Lowell's, while the Autocrat series of Holmes is likely to be read and The Chambered Nautilus memorized long after the time when Lowell and Whittier will have to depend on such artificial devices as the Hall of Fame to keep them alive.

As for General William Tecumseh Sherman—well, if being remembered is the test, his name was well chosen. General William Tecumseh, you know, was the man who said: "War is Hell," and gave such a convincing demonstration of it. He will be remembered in the South, and it is well to put his statue in the Hall of Fame so that the people may see the face of the man whose conduct was calmly characterized by General Lee as "the act of a savage."—Charlotte Observer.

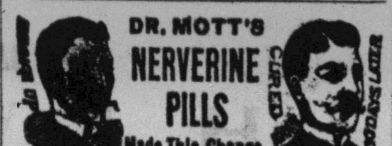

PAUL JONES.

His Last Years Were Not of Poverty and Obscurity.

Even Hanchette, the French naval authority, speaks of John Paul Jones as having died in great wretchedness, obscure and poor. It is such outrageous perversions of truth that I have felt impelled to meet and combat.

After the war of the Revolution Jones was received in London with the greatest distinction. The Army and Navy club delighted to honor him. Burke and Fox were his familiars. Horace Walpole was his intimate friend. To them all he was "dear Paul." The only act of "piracy" ever alleged against him was his descent upon Selkirk castle, whence some of his men, failing to find Lord Selkirk, carried away the family plate. Learning of the pillage, Jones, immediately after getting back to Brest, purchased it out of his own pocket and returned it to Lady Selkirk with a letter of apology. The Selkirks thenceforward were among his most ardent admirers.

In his last illness the king of France sent daily to ask for his health. Had he lived a week longer he would have been admiral of France. The French assembly rose upon its feet and stood uncovered while the resolution of respect was being passed. He left a large sum of money to his two surviving sisters. He died the ranking officer of the American navy. Three weeks after his death letters came from Washington and Jefferson placing our marine interests in Europe in his hands and authorizing him to organize an expedition to go after the Barbary pirates. He stood in the relation of a son to Franklin, of a brother to Jefferson, possessing the fullest confidence of the Father of His Country. Whenever he appears upon the written page we see not only a naval commander, but a statesman, his writing, in its calm wisdom and crystal lucidity, reminding us of the writing of Abraham Lincoln.

Personally he was the most captivating of men, handsome and gentle. When he came back from his wonderful sea fight the Duchess of Orleans lodged him in the Palais Royal. The king made him a chevalier of France. Paris went wild. In the court, in the highest French society, he was literally "a howling swell," though he himself did none of the "howling." There is not a blot on his escutcheon.—Henry Watterson in Louisville Courier-Journal.

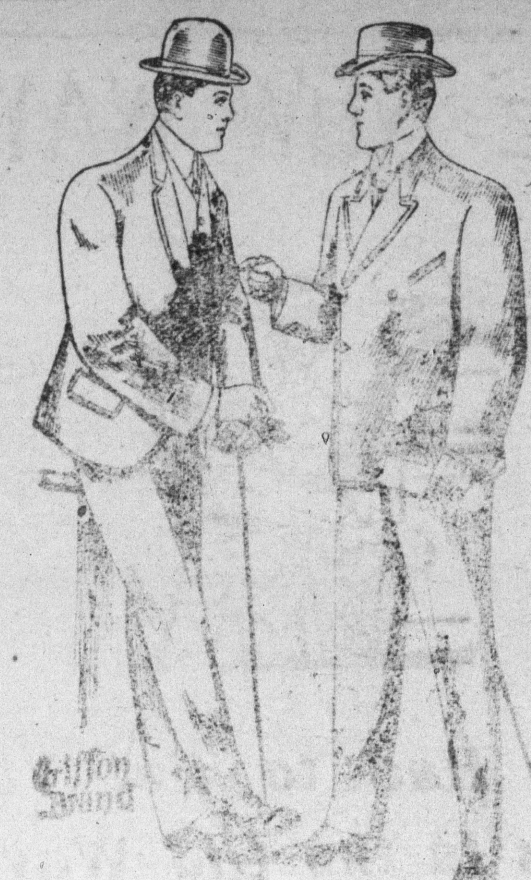

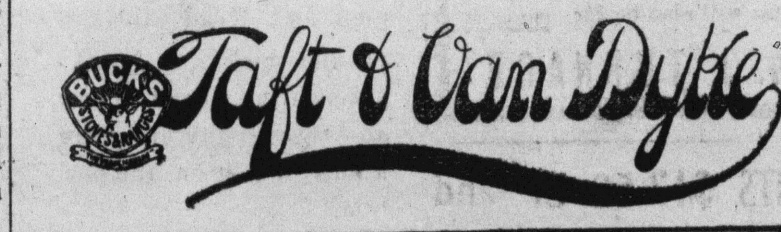

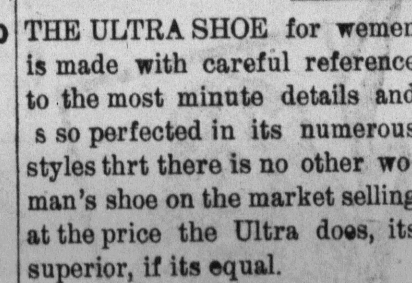
