The week does not begin with auspicious weather for the Raleigh fair.

The bunting that the towns have put up for the president to look at as he passes through is calculated to get wet.

The czar of Russia and the emperor of Japan have signed the peace treaty papers, and that puts an end to the war.

There have been intimations that the revenue investigations were only intended to put on a bit of white-wash. The matter all being postponed gives color to this impression.

Thomas Dixon's "The Clansman" was presented to an immense audience in Columbia, S. C., Saturday night. In response to repeated calls Mr. Dixon came before the curtain for a short talk. When he appeared he was hissed by a bunch of Eastern traveling men who were in the audience. He silenced them and at the same time received a burst of applause when he said "You had your scalawags with you in those dark days, and you have them yet." That was enough to silence them.

Convicts Worked Over Time.

News comes from Wadesboro of a remarkable case of mistake in the sentence and punishment of three negroes. The county of Anson has just paid them sixty dollars apiece for working them six months over time on the chain gang. These three men were convicted at the September term, 1904, of Richmond county Superior court of some offence and sentenced to twelve months on the Anson county chain gang. They were taken to Anson county immediately and turned over to the superintendent of the convict camp. Later in the term of court the presiding judge reduced the men's sentences to six months, but the Anson county officers were never notified of the fact, so they kept the men at work road building for a whole year. They made claim against the county for a dollar and a quarter a day for their over time, but finally compromised their cases for ten dollars a month. We reckon they got good pay for their labor. They were clothed, fed and housed during the six months and now get sixty dollars in a lump sum—less what their lawyer charged them. Had they been working on their own hook for the last six months they would not have near so much money to show for their labor. But, on the other hand, it looks pretty hard for a man to be compelled, through somebody's negligence, to serve as a convict for six months when he was entitled to be a free man. It is well that this is a mistake which could be so easily corrected.—Wilmington Messenger.

Says the Greensboro Industrial News, in speaking of Governor Douglas, of Massachusetts: "A shoemaker should stick to his last." Advice like that is nothing less than irony to the Philadelphia shoemaker who was arrested a few days ago for having two wives. His first wife had him put in jail for sticking to his last.—Wilmington Star.

The Holston Convention of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, in session at Bristol, Tenn., unanimously adopted a resolution commending President Roosevelt's efforts in behalf of peace between Japan and Russia. The resolution says the president has wrought well for the greater civilization, and the betterment of mankind.

While laying off for the duck season to open Mr. Grover Cleveland poked the women suffragists with a magazine article telling why women should not be allowed to vote. Miss Susan B. Anthony made faces at him in a characteristic reply and now the somewhat a-mewsing announcement is made that Mrs. Catt, the Kansas woman suffragist, has her back up and is making passes at the duck hunter. We just expected the thing would wind up in a catastrophe.—Wilmington Star.

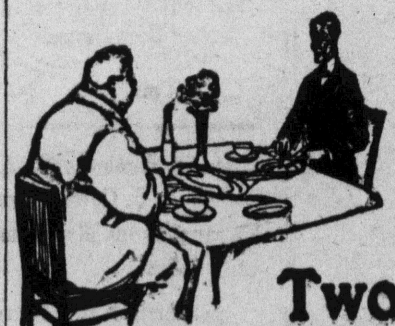

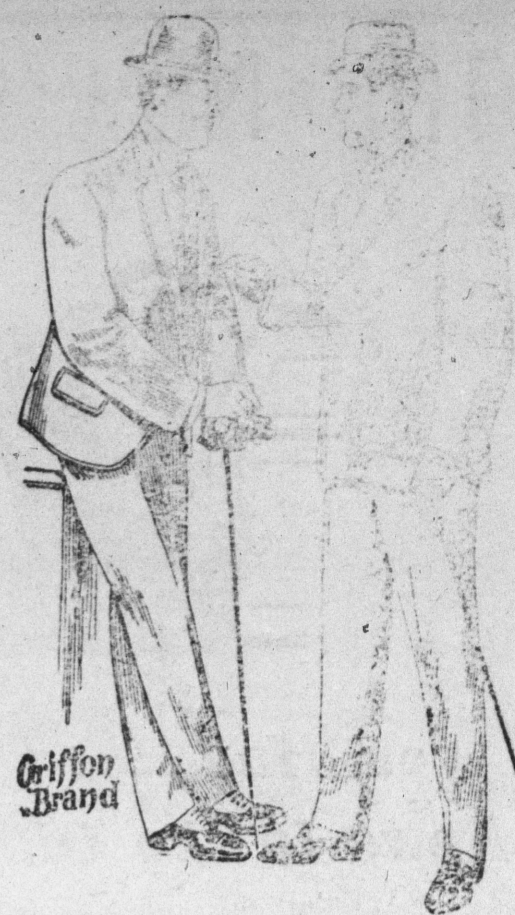
