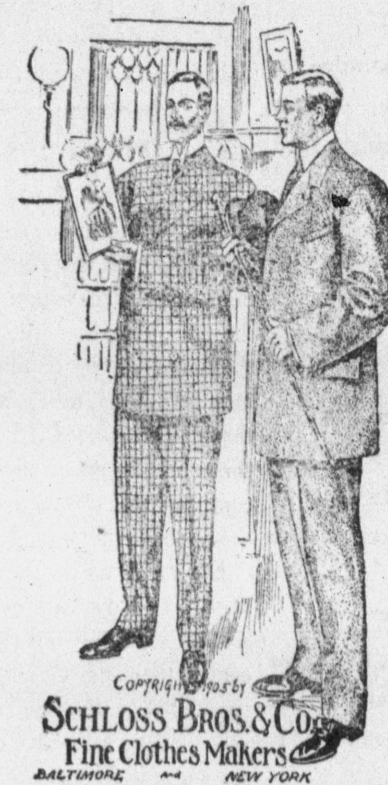

The North Carolinians of ability who have gone to New York have "made good." That is a city that coddles nobody and helps no man until he shows he has brains and can help himself. The young man who goes there must realize that he must make his own way or be lost in the thousands who are struggling for success. Where one young man rises above the waves many fail and are lost sight of. It is particularly true in New York, that there is a "survival of the fittest"—of the men who have the capacity to meet and conquer the obstacles in the way.

The nomination of Mr. James W. Osborne as District Attorney by the Democratic organization in New York city is the strongest testimony of the high place he has won in the Democratic party in that Democratic metropolis. He enjoys a large practice—it brings him an income of nearly fifty thousand dollars, so it is said—and as Assistant District Attorney made reputation by his brilliant conduct of some of the most important cases that have attracted the attention of the whole country. He will make a campaign that will show his resourcefulness. His chief opponent, Mr. William Travers Jerome, is a man of strong individuality, ability of high order, and as District Attorney has won an honorable position. In him Mr. Osborne has a foeman worthy of his steel.—Raleigh News and Observer.

A Strange Threat.

Policy holders in one of the "big three" life insurance companies are receiving with their notices of premiums due a little pamphlet signed by the president, in which he warns that any "unjust insurance law" that may be passed and any statement that may be uttered reflecting against the management or methods of the company will affect the interest of every policy holder.

Evidently he is perfectly serious about it, but in view of the unsavory secrets which he and the other officers of the "Big Three" have been compelled to disclose before the investigating committee in New York, his suggestion that the policy holder lie still and let the robbing go on unchecked is rather curious.

To those who pay his \$100,000 a year salary and furnish him with campaign contributions, lobby funds and other little luxuries, he imputes such a low order of intelligence that after going on the stand and admitting that he has been deceiving them for years, he coolly addresses to them the threat that if they don't keep quiet they may be hurt worse than they have been.

If there is anybody who wants the companies reformed, it is the policy holders. They are the investors, the owners. They are the ones whose welfare and the welfare of whose wives and children depend upon the wisdom and economy with which the affairs of the companies are administered.

They know, as well as the president knows, that there will have to be a tooth pulling in the companies, and that it is going to hurt all over; but they also know that they will be vastly better off when the tooth is out.—Philadelphia North American.

### BRUSSELS AND TAPESTRY.

The Difference Between These Two Carpets Explained.

By placing a brussels and tapestry carpet side by side a clearness and sharpness are noticed about the brussels carpet which are absent from the tapestry. In the latter there is a mistiness about the colors, and the pattern lacks that sharpness and delicacy which characterize the former. This is due to the process of manufacture. A brussels is a yarn dyed, and a tapestry may be described as a printed fabric, but the printing is done upon the yarn before the process of weaving.

The whole method of manufacture is most ingenious. In the making of a five frame brussels no fewer than 1,380 ends of face yarns are required for the weaving of one piece of standard quality, each frame consisting of 256 bobbins, and 256 ends only can come to the face at each pick of the pattern. Therefore 1,024 ends of yarn are hidden in the body of the fabric. There are many qualities of tapestry, but in the production of the standard quality only 216 ends of face yarn are required instead of 1,380, which shows at once that the brussels carpet has the great advantage of being thicker, softer and altogether a more durable cloth apart from other advantages which it possesses. There is a limitation in the number of colors used in a brussels. In tapestry there is no limit. In the brussels the whole of the colors used show a more or less striped appearance at the back of the fabric.

In a tapestry they do not show at the back at all. This fact is made use of by householders in purchasing carpets, this being about the only way the average person can tell the difference between them. In order to pass off tapestry as brussels some ingenious makers have resorted to the striping in a regular manner of the backs of the former. The striping effect in the latter is broken and irregular. A casual observation of the clearly defined character of a brussels pattern should enable a buyer to distinguish between the two fabrics.

Accordingly if a man goes out and leaves something behind him which his wife knows he will want she does not call him to turn or look back, but takes or sends it after him, and if some great emergency obliges him to look back he will not then proceed on the business he was about to transact."

### THE TOWER OF SILENCE.

Groesome Burial Place of the Parsees of Bombay.

High above Bombay, on the freest and most airy spot of the city and 300 feet above the level of the sea, is situated the most peculiar cemetery in the world—the burial place of the Parsees. It is called the Tower of Silence.

These Towers of Silence are found everywhere in Persia, where the corpse, placed under the open sky, is dried by the sun and dissolved by the rain. But in Bombay, where the burial place is limited and where death and misery invite vultures in greatest numbers, the dissolution is considerably hastened by these carrion eaters.

The tower itself consists of a stone wall thirty feet high, forming a circle about 300 feet in diameter—a roofless tower. The floor, made of cement, is an inclined plane, terminating in a deep and wide well. It is divided into three concentric circles, within which are standing side by side the low, open sarcophagi. These circles are connected by wide drain gutters, leading to the wall in the center of the building. The men are laid in the outer, the women in the middle and children in the inner circle.

The whole inner construction reminds one of the inside of a classical amphitheater, only that in this tower the players—the corpses and the vultures—occupy the place of the spectators, while the center—the arena—is occupied by the wall, fifty feet in diameter.

Having entered the iron door leading into the tower, the khandas immediately strip the corpse of all clothing, for Zoroaster has said, "Naked thou comest into the world, and naked shalt thou depart therefrom." The body is then placed in one of the vacant sarcophagi.

In a few minutes the place is covered with vultures, which in the course of an hour devour every vestige of flesh on the fresh corpse, while the blood finds its way through the drain canals down into the wall. The skeleton only remains, as smoothly picked as though it had been cleaned in the chambers of an anatomical institution.

In a few weeks the burning rays of the sun and the heavy rains have dissolved the skeleton and pieces of meal worked it down the wall, where the remaining pieces of bones are further dissolved in a mixture of lime and sulphur, while the blood and fluids are strained through a heavy layer of coal sand and enter the unfilled ground of the Parsees as pure water.

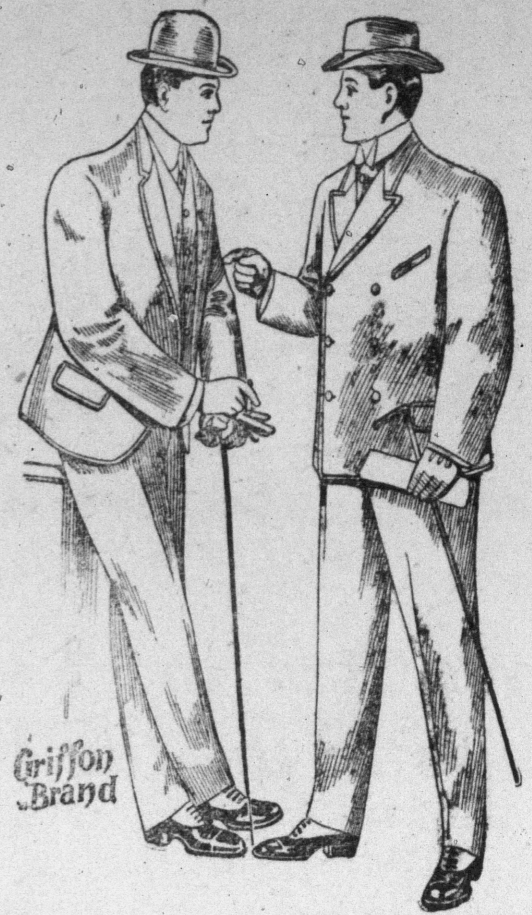
