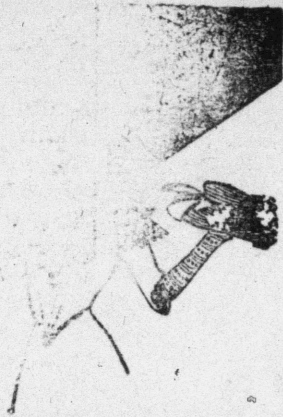

#### Robber Gets Twenty Years

Suffolk, Va., Oct. 17—"Bill" Hargrove, the negro that was implicated in a series of robberies at Ernie and Gates, N. C., about 25 miles from here several weeks ago, was tried before Circuit Judge Geo. W. Ward and given 20 years in the state penitentiary.

It will be remembered that the morning after the robbery at Ernie station Hurricane Branch and his bloodhounds were telegraphed for. The local sleuth went down and in a short while his dogs struck the trail; they ran down into a swamp where the negro Hargrove was found. While the dog was at the negro he passed by Brown who ordered him to stop, which he did not do. A bullet from the detective's revolver brought the man to the ground seriously injured. A large amount of the booty was found on his person and he was carried to the county jail where he was kept until he got well and to wait for trial, which came off last week.

There was another negro caught with this one and also given 20 years in the penitentiary. On account of the place of trial being in a remote part of the county this negro's name could not be learned.

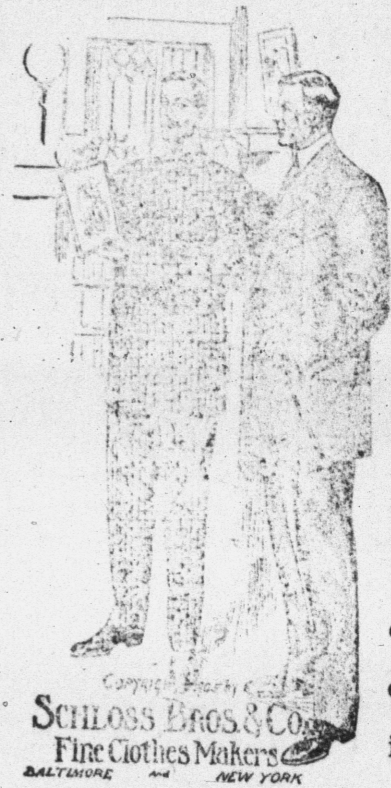

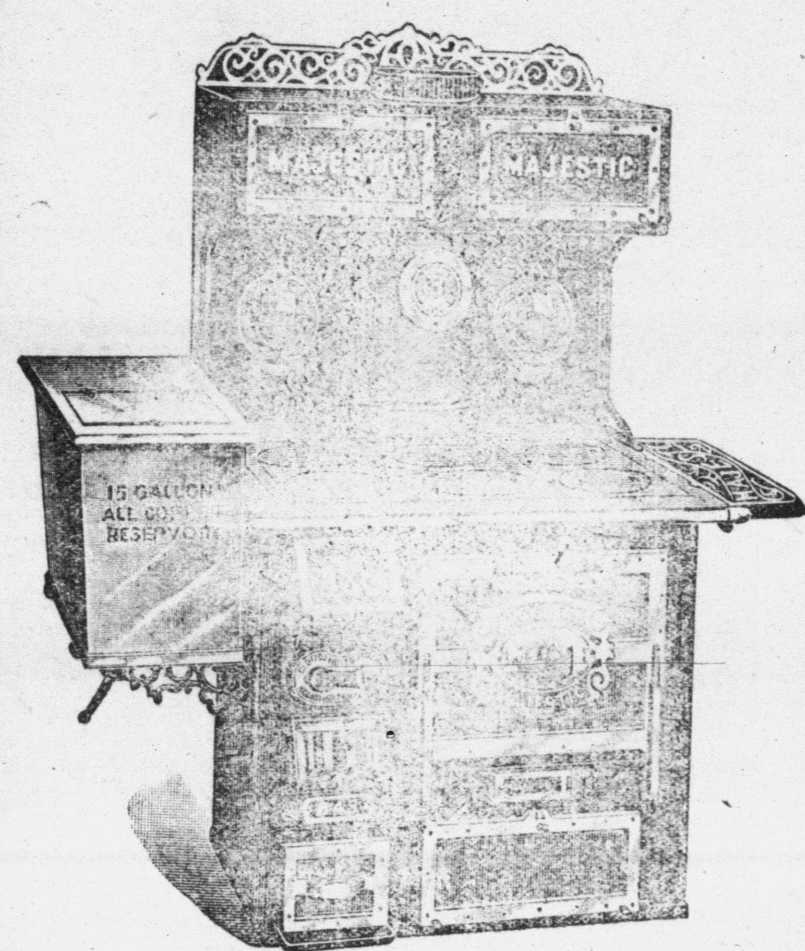

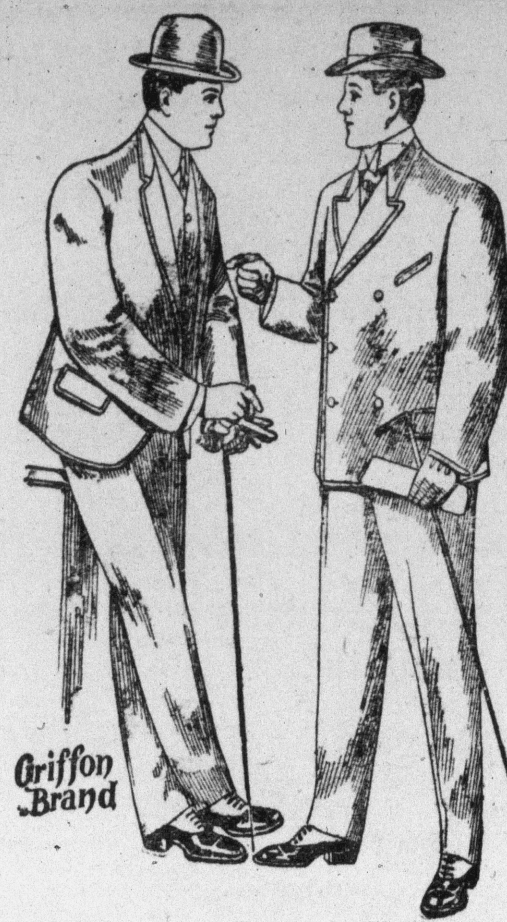
