The Fourth President to Visit North Carolina

The visit of President Roosevelt to the State fair today recalls the visits of James K. Polk, James Buchanan and Andrew Johnson.

President Buchanan visited the State in 1859. He was met and welcomed at Weldon by Governor Ellis, and other prominent citizens.

The run from Weldon to Raleigh, which is now easily made in two and a half hours, required more than half a day for this train. By the way, the conductor in charge of this special was Captain J. B. Timberlake, who served the same railroad in this position for half a century and is still living in Raleigh, an honored and beloved citizen. The first stop of consequence after leaving Weldon was at Franklinton, where a crowd had assembled.

In his remarks a Franklinton President Buchanan was enthusiastically cheered when he said: "Let us swear by the memory of our fathers that we will resist any attempt to tear a star from the constellation of states of which this union is composed, and let the man be exonerated for all time who shall attempt to break up this glorious confederacy."

A happy incident occurred at Huntersville, a station near the present Neuse depot. When the train stopped there a score of fresh, pretty, country girls were waiting to catch a glimpse of the president.

"The train is behind time and the president cannot stop," said the conductor. "Yes, but I'll take time," cried the bachelor president as he sprang from the platform and began kissing the blushing maidens, some of whom are now grandmothers in that community. —Weldon News.

United States Officers Die in the Philippines.

Washington, Oct. 18.—The death of two well known Americans is reported from the Philippines. Third Lieut. Charles A. Thorp, assistant supply officer of the Philippine constabulary, died in camp at Connelismar of typhoid fever. He was 29 years and a member of a prominent family at Stockton, Cal. First Lieut. McConnell, of the 9th infantry, died at Wilhem, Tayabas Province, of acute peritonitis. He served in the Spanish-American war. He leaves a young wife at Corning, Cal.

### THE PRESIDENTS TRIP

First Stop of President's Train.

Asheland, Va., October 18.—The president's train made its first stop at Fredericksburg at 10:05 o'clock this morning. A crowd gathered around the president's car. He came out on the platform and made a short address. He was notified here of the death of Governor Glenn's brother. The Governor's bereavement will cause a change in the plans of the president's entertainment at Raleigh. Instead of taking breakfast at the Governor's mansion in Raleigh, the president will breakfast on the train and stay there until the time to leave for the State Chamber and the fair grounds. Although no stops are scheduled the country people turned out at every crossing. Below Fredericksburg, on a little mound in a particularly wild looking section, where only red shirted moonshiners might be expected to be seen, stood a man in Price Albert coat and plug which he raised and waved as the train passed. In Hanover county, at North Ann river a group of young ladies, dressed in white, stood beside the track. One was mounted on a horse and waved a large American flag.

Cyclone Wipes Out Town.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 18.—A cyclone swept over Bond county this morning. The town of Serenito, Ill., is reported wiped out and at least four persons are known to have been killed.

Russian Battleship Refloated.

Tokio, Oct. 18.—The Russian battleship Pobieda, which was sunk by the Japanese in the harbor of Port Arthur during the bombardment that took place on Nov. 29th and 30th last, was refloated this morning. The Pobieda was a vessel of 12,700 tons.

Tank Sprung a Leak.

A large tank car filled with oil for the Standard Oil Co., sprung a leak while waiting at the depot to be drawn off in to the storage tanks. Oil spurted from the car in a large stream and people run with buckets and other handy vessels to catch it.

W. A. Spratlin and Jack Glenn, traveling salesmen, fought with pistols over a game of cards at Tochuha, Miss. Both men were killed.

The North Carolina Pine Association, controlling all the big lumber mills in Eastern Virginia and North Carolina, at a meeting in Norfolk ratified the plan to take the lumber interests of South Carolina into the organization.

President Roosevelt has issued a proclamation prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition to San Domingo.

Two British officers have been captured by bandits in Morocco and held for ransom.

### STATE NEWS.

Safe robbers raided the town of Advance Saturday night. They rolled safes out of buildings and blew them open with dynamite but never found much money.

A special from LaGrange to the Raleigh News and Observer says that Charles Rany, a young negro, was lynched in Greene county for attempted assault upon a white lady.

There were 32 people to leave here on the early special train this morning for the Raleigh fair.

Sweet potatoes are going at 50 cents per bushel now. The crop is large and fine.

Dr. L. E. Hoffer, the colored physician here, and Naomi Holland were married Tuesday night.

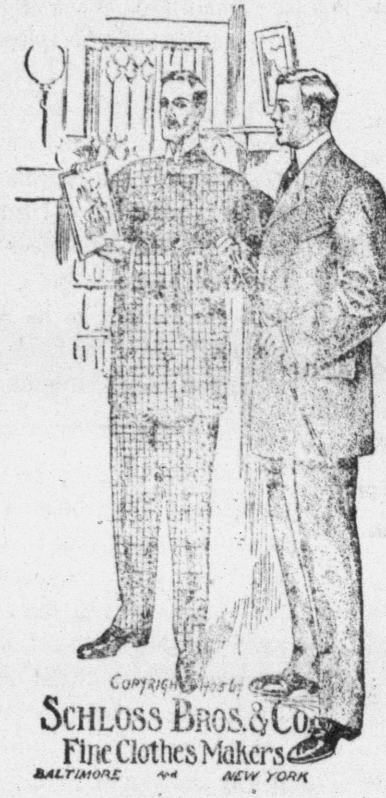

Maybe this is the reason: Those people who wait so late to go to the theatre are more anxious to be seen than to see the play.

Today North Carolina sees the president, and the president will get a better idea of North Carolina. We trust neither will be disappointed.

THE REFLECTOR is not getting big, but will inform the brethren that we are ahead of them in one respect. King Edward has become a subscriber to this paper.

North Carolina loses a good man in the death of Gen. James D. Glenn, which occurred in Raleigh Tuesday night. He was brother and private secretary of Governor Glenn. He had served his state well.

The dispatching of several warships to Martinique, in the French West Indies, to deal with the Venezuelan trouble, looks like something may be doing there if Castro does not come down from his high horse.

The graft business strikes down South occasionally. A former book keeper and confidential clerk in the office of the state treasurer of South Carolina has been arrested on a warrant charging him with the theft of bonds to the amount of \$12,500. He should be given a job in the penitentiary.

Two deaths occurred that mean much with events surrounding the state fair. Just as it was about to open a message was handed to President Ashley Horne advising him of the death of his sister. And the day before the arrival of President Roosevelt to be the guest of the state there comes another shock in the death of Governor Glenn's brother. How closely mourning and merriment touch together. While some hearts bow in grief, the great throng moves along unmindful of it.

The death of Gen. Jas. D. Glenn is a real cause of regret. A most admirable, chivalrous, splendid gentleman. As adjutant of the North Carolina troops he was beloved. In truth and fact an all round man. His death occurring at this particular hour, is a sad, sad calamity. The people of North Carolina expected and had a right to expect something of Gov. Glenn, brother of Gen. Glenn, today, something that he will never have an opportunity to perform again. And Gov. Glenn realized and appreciated the expectation, was equal to the occasion and would have done the honor of the occasion of the visit of President Roosevelt and wife to the state fair in such a manner as all North Carolina would have said well done, and been proud of her chief executive. The visit of President Roosevelt and his wife as the guests of the governor representing so brilliantly as he does, the betterment of the country, would have been an event in the state's history as future generations would have pointed to with pleasurable pride. But God's ways are not our ways, and His ways are past finding out. The mantle of sorrow and mourning will hang upon the page of history today will record. It is one of the mysteries of God's providence.

The two traveling men who fought each other to death with pistols, over a game of cards in a Mississippi town, saved the county the trouble and expense of a murder trial.

John Charles McNeill, a special writer on the staff of the Charlotte Observer, has been awarded the Patterson loving cup offered to the North Carolinian producing the most notable literary work during the year. Mr. McNeill is a genius with his pen, and we are glad this honor has fallen to a newspaper man. The cup is valued at \$500.

It has ever been true, at least since the days of the Master, that the fickle populace, which one day shouts "Hosanna" is as likely as not the next to cry "Crucify him!" Komura has found it so. When he left Japan to negotiate with the plenipotentiaries of Russia he was acclaimed by all the people. When he arrived at Tokio Monday, it was found necessary to guard the streets through which he passed by troops, police and gendarmes, to protect him from the wrath of the people. The incident was not new in its kind, but whenever one of the kind occurs it is suggestive.—Charlotte Observer.

Good roads are the best possible investment in any community. There is not an interest that is not benefited by such improvements. It makes all sorts of farm products more valuable by making markets more accessible. Land located on good roads obviously becomes more valuable as residence property, for it may be more easily and pleasantly reached.

Considering the importance of good roads, it is of vital moment that object lessons in their building should be well taught. For this reason none but the most skillful engineers and the most conscientious contractors should be employed in building model roads. If the improvement proves good and permanent, it will soon convince the taxpayers that more such roads are desirable, and development in that line will follow. Should the model road prove defective, it would be a serious setback to the cause.

Most things in this world cast their shadows ahead. For years it has been a standing joke—though it is a serious matter with the parties involved—that what a jury does for a corporation is a plenty, especially if the corporation is rich and powerful. Jurors are not so much to blame, after all, for they do not have the same chance of judging and knowing, and the attorneys in the case appeal to their prejudice from every standpoint. It has grown to that pass that it looks like people have an idea it is not wrong to steal from a corporation. In any event they are doing it by note, just fleeing them worse than a three card monte gambler. The disclosures made and being made in regard to the big insurance companies in New York show that either the gentlemen do not know it is wrong to steal from them, or the status of the morals is very low. When one man sees another steal with impunity it emboldens him to try it; it spreads and spreads until some of them are sent to the penitentiary, yet it is no easy matter to get one safely inside.—Greensboro Record.

**A USEFUL CIGAR.**

Its Lighting Was the Means of Averting a Serious Panic.

A good story is told of a sea captain who died a number of years ago and who was formerly in command of a ship in which passengers were carried from London to Lisbon. On one occasion the ship caught fire, and the passengers and crew were compelled to take hurriedly to the boats. The captain remained perfectly cool throughout all the confusion and fright of the debarkation, and at last every one except himself was got safely into the boats.

By the time he was ready to follow the passengers were almost wild with fear and excitement. Instead of hurrying down the ladder the captain called out to the sailors to hold on a minute and, taking a cigar from his pocket, coolly lighted it with a bit of burning rope which had fallen from the rigging at his feet. Then he descended with deliberation and gave the order to push off.

"How could you stop to light a cigar at such a moment?" he was asked afterward when some of the passengers were talking over their escape.

"Because," he answered, "I saw that if I did not do something to divert the minds of those in the boat there was likely to be a panic, and, overcrowded as it was, there was danger of the boat being upset. The act took but a moment, but it attracted the attention of everybody. I was not nearly so unconcerned as I seemed to be, but was in reality in a fever of excitement. My little plan succeeded. You all forgot yourselves because you were thinking about my curious behavior, and we got off safely."—London Standard.

**The Ideal Diet.**

Do the real needs of the body demand such quantities of food each day as the ordinary dietary standards call for or as man from his acquired habits has become accustomed to? A slight excess of food beyond the true physiological requirement is no doubt desirable as tending to prevent any danger of under-nutrition, but any great excess must of necessity be detrimental. The ideal diet is that which suffices to meet all the wants of the body—i. e., the maintenance of body weight, nitrogen equilibrium, health, strength, vigor and endurance—and in the period of adolescence to supply material for the growth and development of the tissues of the body. Anything beyond this quantity is just so much of an excess which must inevitably do harm if continued indefinitely and detract in some measure at least from that high degree of efficiency which every enlightened man desires to attain.—Russell H. 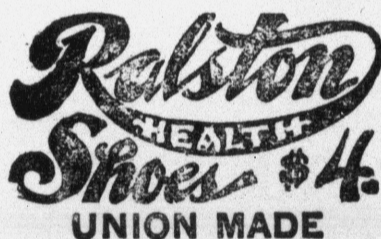

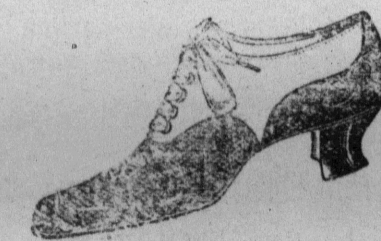

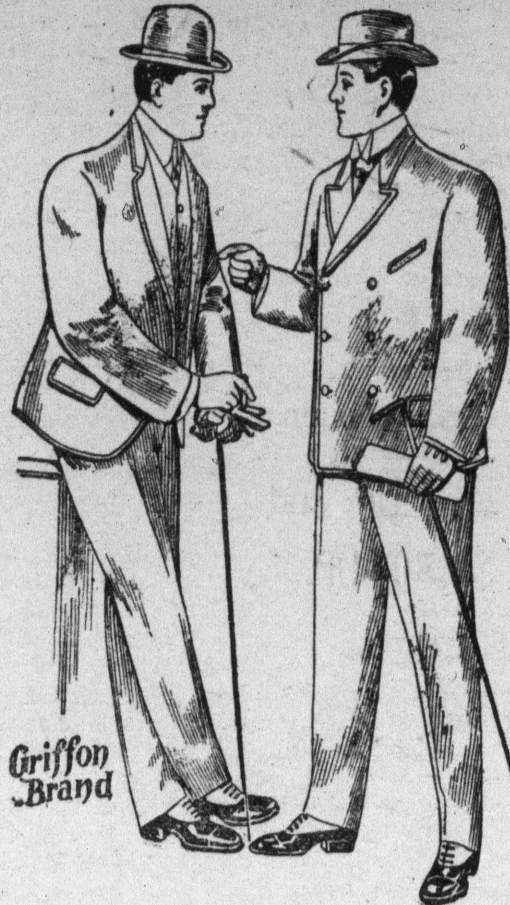
