WAREHOUSE MERGER.

Promotion of Young Man Well Known in Greenville.

A recent issue of the Columbia, S. C., State tells of an organization of an enterprise at Greenville, in that state, in which REFLECTOR readers will feel an interest, from the fact that it is something that comes close to all cotton growing sections, and also because a young man well known here has a prominent place in the organization. The organization is what is known as the Standard Warehouse Company, and its purpose is to have bonded warehouses at convenient places to afford farmers an opportunity of storing and holding their cotton and making them reasonable advances on it. Governor Heyward has been chosen president of the warehouse company and Capt. C. T. Lipscomb is secretary and assistant manager. Capt. Lipscomb is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Lipscomb, of this town, and his friends are glad to know that he has been chosen to such a prominent position.

Roosevelt at His Mother's Birthplace.

Rosewell, Ga. Oct. 20.—President Roosevelt visited the home of his mother this morning, and shook hands with many who knew her when she was Miss Martha Bullock, of Bullock Hall. He made a pilgrimage to the house where her girlhood days were passed, and stepped within the Presbyterian church where she often worshipped and where her father, Maj. Jas. Bullock, dropped dead while teaching a Sunday school class. He then paid his respects to Mrs. William D. Baker, who was one of her bridemaids when she was married to Theodore Roosevelt, and moved North. Bullock Hall stands upon a hill in Rosewell village, a mile and a half from Rosewell station. The president was accompanied by Senator Clay, of Georgia Sheriff Fry, of Cobb county, and Warren Crockett who acted as marshal of the party. Crockett was a member of the president's Rough Riders Regiment, and as soon as the president laid eyes on him he bubbled over with merriment. The pair talked over many amusing incidents of the campaign in Cuba.

It all sounds mighty nice now, but wait until the next national campaign comes along.

Those who did not get to see the president could console themselves by looking at his picture.

In all the speeches of his Southern tour so far the president has not been reported as saying a thing to spoil it.

The press in those towns visited by the president did themselves proud in their excellent reports of the speeches and gatherings.

Greenville does not feel so badly left at being off the line of the president's itinerary. This town entertained George Washington once.

The strongest point about the president's speeches on his trip through North Carolina was the inspiration to higher citizenship. No true man who heard or read what he said can but desire to be a better citizen, a better American.

We have always thought that one section of our road law was very unfair. This is compelling boys under twenty-one years of age to work the road. Why should they be compelled to do one public service and be debarred from exercising the right of citizenship at the ballot box? A boy belongs to his father until he is 21; suppose that father is under 45, and a road hand, the son is 18, and both go and work. Is not that father doing his double share of road duty? It looks that way to us.—Clarkton Express.

A Story of Vigorous Old Age.

Mrs. Betsy Freeman, of Red Bank, N. J., celebrated her 111th year the other day by spanking her son, Willie, a youth of 82 years. This news despatch is sure to revive the story of the tourist in Western North Carolina, who met an old man by the side of the road, crying, and, upon asking him what the matter was, received the information that his father had whipped him. The tourist asked the old man his age and was told it was 79. Furthermore it was explained that his father had whipped him because in a fit of temper he had scrapped with his grandfather. The New Jersey story is pretty fair but pales into insignificance alongside the North Carolina tale.—Winston Journal.

When the Clock Stopped.

A little clock in a jeweler's window in a certain Western town, stopped one day for half an hour at fifteen minutes of nine. School children, noticing the time stopped to play; people hurrying to the train, looking at the clock, began to walk leisurely; professional men, rushing to meet appointments, saw the time and walked slower; business men, after a look at the clock, stopped to chat a minute with one another; working men and women noted the time and lingered a little longer in the sunshine, and all were half an hour late because one small clock had stopped. Never had these people known how much they had depended upon that clock, till it had led them astray. Many are thus unconsciously depending upon the influence of Christians; you may think you have no influence, but you cannot go wrong in one little act without leading others astray.—Baptist Chronicle.

Pertinent Extracts From President's Raleigh Speech.

"North Carolina can rightfully say that she pointed us the way which led to the formation of the new Nation.

"More and more you are giving care and attention to education; and education means the promotion not only of industry, but of that good citizenship which rests upon individual rights and upon the recognition by each individual that he has duties as well as rights.

"The man who fails to be honest and brave both in his political franchise and in his private business contributes to political and social anarchy.

"The prime difference between civilized and uncivilized peoples is that in civilized peoples each generation works not only for its own well-being, but for the well-being of the generations yet unborn, and if we permit the natural resources of this land to be destroyed so that we hand over to our children a heritage diminished in value we thereby prove our unfitness to stand in the forefront of civilized peoples.

"The importance to the Southern people of protecting the Southern mountain forests is obvious. These forests are the best defense against the floods which, in the recent past, have, during a single twelvemonth, destroyed property officially valued at nearly twice it would cost to buy the Southern Appalachian Reserve.

"The position of honor in your parade today is held by the Confederate veterans. They by their deeds reflect credit upon their descendants and upon all Americans, both because they did their duty in war and because they did their duty in peace. Now if the young men, their sons, will not only prove that they possess the same power of fealty to an ideal, but will also show the efficiency in the ranks of industrial life that their fathers, the Confederate veterans, showed that they possessed in the ranks of war, the industrial future of this great and typically American Commonwealth is assured.

"I do not believe in government ownership of anything which can with propriety be left in private hands, and in particular I should most strenuously object to government ownership of railroads. But I believe with equal firmness that it is out of the question for the government not to exercise a supervisory and regulatory right over the railroads; for it is vital to the well-being of the public that they should be managed in a spirit of fairness and justice toward all the public.

"The effort to prohibit all restraint of competition, whether reasonable or unreasonable, is unwise. What we need is to have some administrative body with ample power to forbid combination that is hurtful to the public, and to prevent favoritism to one individual at the expense of another.

"But in my judgment the most important thing to do is to give to this administrative body power to make its findings effective, and this can be done only by giving it power, when complaint is made of a given rate as being unjust or unreasonable if it finds the complaint proper, then itself to fix a maximum rate which it regards as just and reasonable, this rate to go into effect practically at once, that is within a reasonable time, and to stay in effect, unless reversed by the courts.

"Nothing is more injurious from every standpoint than a law which is merely sound and fury, merely pretense, and not capable of working out tangible results."
