RAILROADS SHOULD KEEP THEIR OBLIGATIONS.

There are many actions brought against railroads on very flimsy grounds, people often entering suits upon the slightest pretext for a claim, which is very unjust. But if there is one thing the railroads should be compelled to do it is to live up to their obligations to the public. They should be required to do this or make good for the failure. Last week, for instance, the Atlantic Coast Line took money from people that was nothing less than an imposition. The railroad took advantage of the president's visit to Raleigh to run an excursion there. It used the fact of the president's being there as an inducement for people to go, advertising to put them in Raleigh at 10.30 o'clock, a. m., knowing that the president would leave that city at 1 o'clock, p. m. On the expectancy of getting there in time to see the president and hear him speak people paid their fare and went on the excursion train to Raleigh. Instead of keeping its obligation the railroad did not put these people in Raleigh until more than two hours later than the time advertised so they had no opportunity at all of seeing the president the purpose for which they went.

Now the point we make is that the railroad should be made to refund to each person the amount of fare paid to go on the excursion. The railroad advertised to do a special service for a certain price and failed to keep its obligation, and those who paid the price have a right to demand its return.

Not only in this instance, but in every instance where a railroad fails to keep its obligation in putting people at a given point at the time advertised, they should be required to refund every fare paid in good faith on this expectancy, if the failure worked to the inconvenience of the passenger. If this was done the railroads would have more regard for keeping the schedules advertised.

The president has no room for complaint at the cordial reception the South gave. He certainly ought to feel kindly toward this section of the country.

W. B. Smith, former president of the Western National Bank, of Louisville, Ky., has been indicted by the Federal grand jury on ten counts, charging him with embezzlement making false entries and the misappropriation of funds of the bank. The total defalcations charged in the indictments is \$198,013. Smith is said to be in Porto Rico, and it is alleged a cablegram has been received from him saying he will return to Louisville on October 29th.

Not Consistent.

The president is not quite consistent in defending the dismissal on the spot order he argues that no man fit to be in the cabinet would abuse the power conferred. But on the very next day he issued an order forbidding the cabinet officers to give news to newspaper correspondents, or to be seen consorting with them; hereafter all news of cabinet meetings will be given out by the faithful Loeb. That looks as if the president felt that he could not trust his cabinet officers to talk. We should think the presidents' muzzle would chafe some of the faces upon which it has been strapped.—New York Times.

Worst Exhibit Yet Made.

The fact that the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York has maintained a house at Albany for its legislative agent, with all the expenses thereof apparently paid by the company, is simply scandalous. There was no sort of need of thus wasting the money of the policy holders. It is the worst exhibit so far made of the way money was thrown away through a childish fear of hostile legislation. It looks more and more as if the overpaid officials of the great insurance companies were first of all bent on protecting their own graft. Such revelations regarding the great company which has claimed to be least open to attack are profoundly discouraging.—Springfield Republican.

To supply money to a man with whom she was in love, Maye Bolding of Buffalo, cashier of the New York branch of the Larkin Company of Buffalo, stated in a written confession in court in New York that she had been stealing from her employers for over two years. Her confession admitted thefts to the amount of at least \$7,000 but her manager E. M. May testified that he believed the amount stole was about \$8,000.

A BABOON HERO.

An Incident of a Stirring Monkey Hunt in Africa.

The German naturalist, Herr Brehm, tells this story of his adventure with baboons in Africa: "Our dogs, beautiful, slender greyhounds, accustomed to fight successfully with hyenas and other beasts of prey, rushed toward the baboons, which from a distance looked more like beasts of prey than like monkeys, and drove them hastily up the precipices to right and left. But only the females took flight. The males turned to face the dogs, growled, beat the ground with their hands, opened their mouths wide, showed their glittering teeth and looked at their adversaries so furiously and maliciously that the hounds, battle hardened and usually bold, shrank back discomfited and almost timidly sought safety beside us.

"Before we had succeeded in stirring them up to show fight the position of the monkeys had changed considerably, and when the dogs charged a second time nearly all the herd were in safety.

"But one little monkey, about half a year old, had been left behind. It shrieked loudly as the dogs rushed toward it, but succeeded in gaining the top of a rock before they had arrived. Our dogs placed themselves cleverly, so as to cut off its retreat, and then we thought that they would catch it.

"That was not to be. Proudly and with dignity, without hurrying in the least or paying any heed to us, an old male stepped down from the security of the rocks toward the hard pressed little one, walked toward the dogs without betraying the slightest fear, held them in check with glances, gestures and sounds that seemed almost like intelligible speech, slowly climbed the rock, picked up the baby monkey and retreated with it before we could reach the spot and without the slightest attempt to prevent him on the part of the dogs.

"While the patriarch of the troop performed this brave and unselfish deed the other members, densely crowded on the cliff, uttered sounds which I had never before heard from baboons. Old and young, males and females, roared, screeched, snarled and bellowed all together, so that one would have thought that they were struggling with leopards or other dangerous beasts.

"I learned later that this was the monkeys' battle cry. It was intended to intimidate us and the dogs; possibly also to encourage the brave old giant who was running into such evident danger before their eyes."—Youth's Companion.

Acids and Water.

Acids have a strong affinity for water, which they will even extract from any substance containing it with which they are brought in contact; hence when an acid comes in contact with the mucous membrane of the mouth and throat the watery secretion which keeps these parts moist and flexible is so far absorbed as to give rise to that dry, harsh and stringing sensation which is commonly spoken of as "drawing" the mouth, and so as a result a copious supply of fresh saliva is produced. Mineral acids, by their chemical action, not only draw the mouth and set the teeth on edge as they are taken, but also injure the enamel of the teeth, unless the precaution is taken to suck them in through a glass tube or quill.
