If new evidence should arise the case will be reopened.

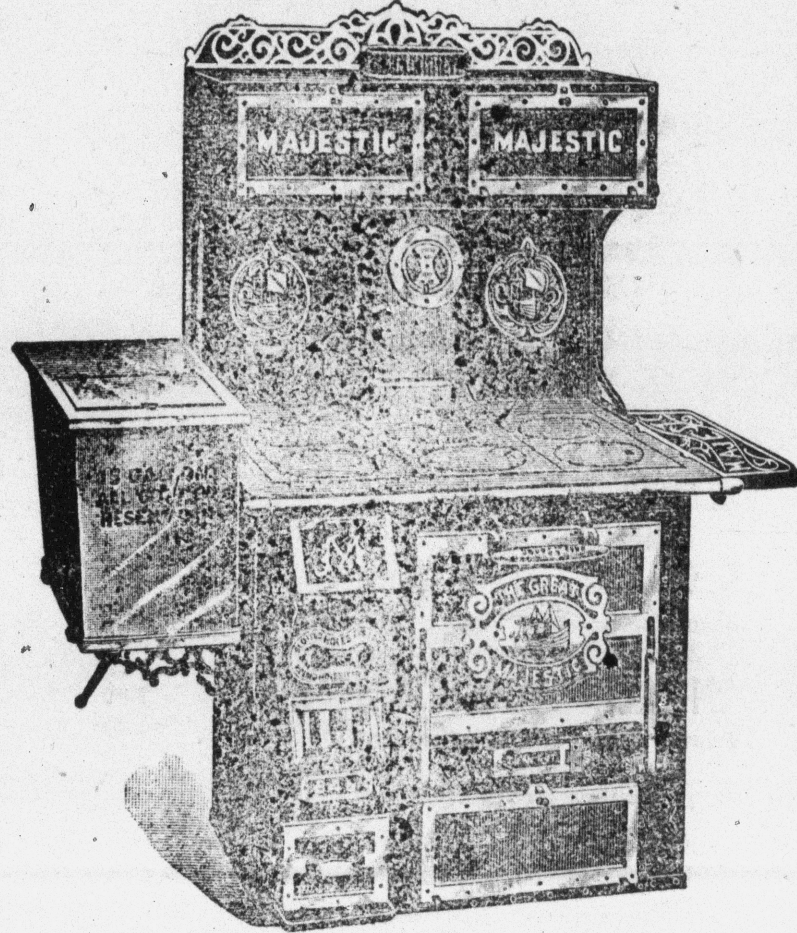

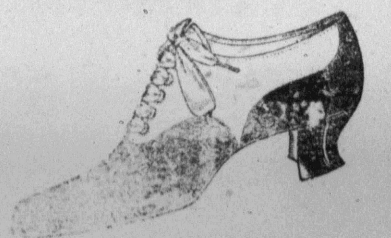
