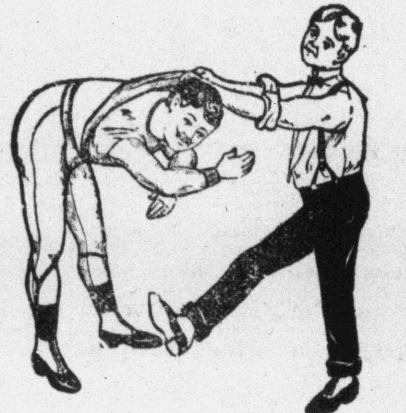

This week, just for the accommodation of a few people, chiefly in one county, to attend a little county fair, a single passenger train is required to do excursion work and the trains on three branch roads are held up two or three hours each day waiting for it. The railroad has plenty of special trains that could do this work to accommodate the few fair goers, without so seriously inconveniencing the thousands of people in the towns along the branch lines by delaying their mail and traffic several hours. It is an example of picayune stinginess on the part of the railroad that the patrons who suffer by it should not tolerate.
