THE N. C. CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

LAGRANGE, N. C., Oct. 24.

The forces of the North Carolina Missionary society met in annual convention today at LaGrange with a large number of delegates from all points in the state in attendance.

The first day being given over to the Christian Woman's Board of Missions the ladies convened at 9 a. m. in full session.

Praise service was led by Mrs. H. H. Moore, of Greenville, after which Mrs. T. R. Rouse delivered the address of welcome and was responded to by Miss Sallie Bishop, of Pantego.

The address of the president, Mrs. J. Boyd Jones, of Wilson, was both able and earnest, and was listened to with close attention.

The reports of the corresponding secretary and the treasurer showed the work at large to be in a flourishing condition.

Mrs. T. E. Hooker, of Greenville, sang "Beyond the Gates of Paradise," after which Mrs. Preston Bell Hall, of Kinston, read a most earnest and thoughtful paper on "The Universal Christ." This paper was followed by one read by Mrs. H. H. Moore, of Greenville, on "Mission Work Among Women." Both papers received close attention, and were instructive and helpful.

The afternoon session was opened with praise service by Mrs. J. B. Latham. Report of superintendent young people's department by Miss Alice Hines, of Tarboro, showed progress in this work. The banner for best showing (statistically) went to the Asheville Mission band.

Recitation by Miss Lillian Mason following a beautiful vocal selection by Miss Mary Moye, of Farmville.

The symposium on mission field of C. W. B. M. was conducted by Miss Rosa Loftin, of Kinston, on "Home Land," Mrs. H. D. Murrell, of Catherine Lake, on "Jamaica," Mrs. J. R. Tingle, of Belhaven, on "Mexico," Mrs. A. B. Cunningham, of Washington, (by proxy) on "Porto Rico."

This part of the program was especially entertaining and instructive as demonstrating the great work of our women, and their far reaching influence.

Mr. G. Minakuchi, of Asheville, our preacher there, and a native Japanese, was unable, on account of illness, to be present. He was to have delivered an address on "Home Life of the Women of the Orient." The convention was much disappointed at not being able to hear him.

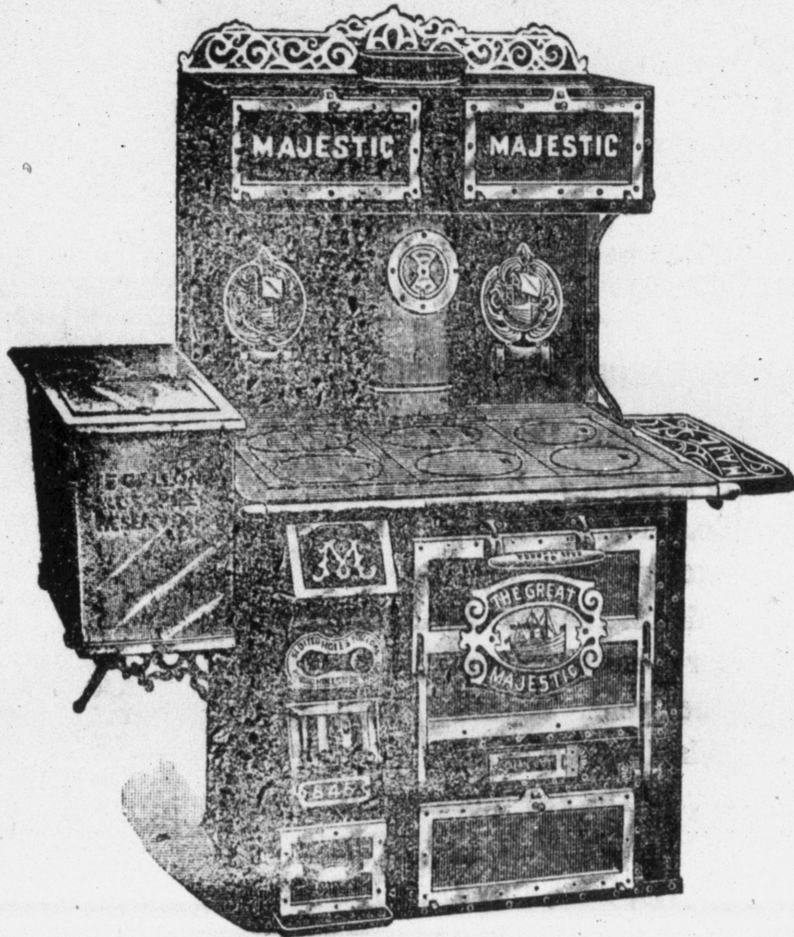
