THE N. C. CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY CONVENTION

LAGRANGE, N. C., Oct. 26.

The Christian church building being too small to accommodate the increasing crowds the Baptist brethren tendered their commodious edifice for future meetings of the convention.

Wednesday night Mrs. Ida Harrison, state president of the Kentucky C. W. B. M., delivered an able address to a large and enthusiastic audience.

The Wednesday morning session opened with the usual address of welcome and response. A letter from the mayor of LaGrange was read welcoming the convention.

The address of the president, E. A. Moye, of Greenville, was a strong and helpful delivery, and a paper by Preston Bell Hill on the "Holy Spirit" was an unusually strong and able exposition of this profound subject. The discussion that followed was spirited and full of interest.

J. A. Hopkins, of Winston-Salem, addressed the convention on home missions.

The afternoon session was opened with a powerful address on "The Model Church by A. B. Cunningham, of Washington. This was discussed by Prof. J. P. Harper, president of the Atlantic Christian college, Wilson.

W. T. Cree, of Atlanta, Ga., addressed the convention on "Church Extension" for the unchurched congregations throughout the land.

The night service was given over to an address on "Foreign Missions" by Henry Pearce Atkins, pastor of the West End church, Richmond, Va.

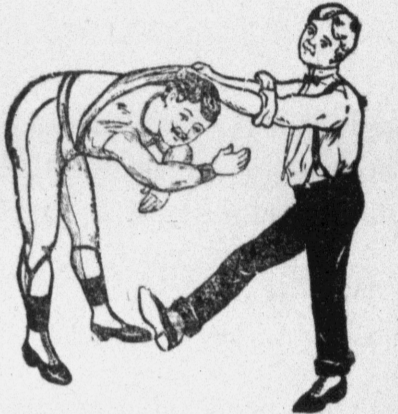

The New York man who lived and passed as a woman for thirty-four years without the deception being discovered, shows how easy it is to fool the public sometime.

The president of the University of California has come to his senses. He says football as it is played today will have to go. Heads of other colleges should fall in line with this sentiment.

Texas authorities on cotton estimates say that the recent ginners' report indicates a crop of less than ten millions bales, while New York speculators say it will reach eleven millions. We will know which is correct by and by. In the meantime farmers might continue to hold for eleven cents.

And now comes the claim that a wealthy Nebraskan has reduced the cost of living to a science. He says he lives on seven cents a day and clothes himself for \$7 a year. For breakfast each day he has coffee and crackers, for dinner a bowl of soup with bread, and for supper bread, butter and tea. This fare keeps him in excellent health.

"It is wonderful" remarked a gentleman to The Gazette yesterday, "how well some men have got along right here in Gaston county in face of great disadvantages." And then he went on to tell how that one farmer near Lowell had saved \$9,000 in 11 years. Another Gaston man he knew who not so many years ago was poor boy bound out. He is now worth \$12,000 or \$15,000—made it by hard licks and keeping everlastingly at it.—Gastonia Gazette.

The young man Cunliffe, an employe of the Adams Express Company, who took \$101,000 of the company's money the other day and went away, and was later captured, says he was getting only \$65 a month and that handling packages containing \$100,000 and \$250,000 proved too much for him; that five minutes after he took the money he was sorry, but it was too late for him to return back, etc. Many kind-hearted people will excuse Cunliffe and blame the express people for not giving him a larger salary—laying all the blame on that. That is not the point. Cunliffe showed greed. If he had been getting \$1,000 a month instead of \$65 he would still have desired to steal. If he had been thoroughly honest he would have stood firm no matter how small his salary. His excuse is no excuse at all.—Statesville Landmark.

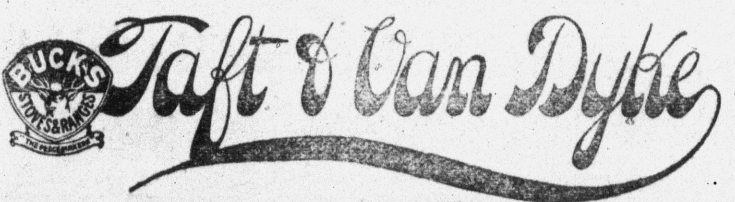

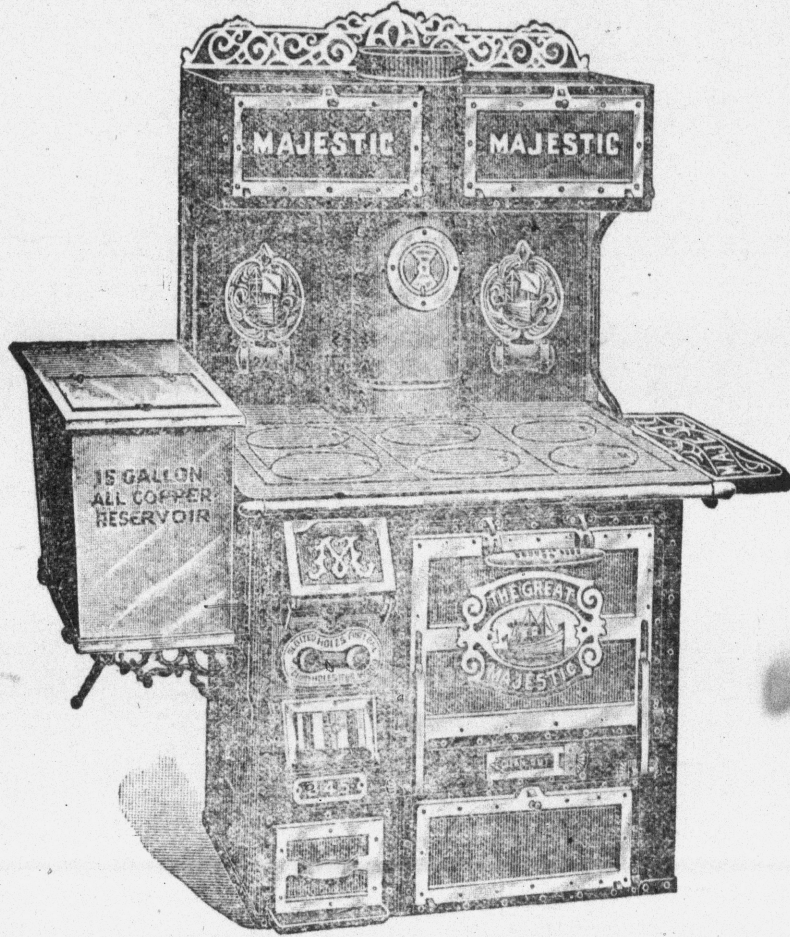

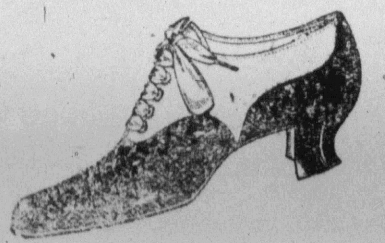
