Knocks Woman Down and Saves Her Life.

Williamsport, Pa., Oct. 27.—Mr. B. Frank Beeber, an aged gateman at a Pennsylvania railroad crossing, today saved the life of an old woman by knocking her down. She had slipped under the gate, and was in the path of an advancing locomotive when Beeber saw her. He leaped to the track, struck her a blow on the back that sent her clear of the rails, then clutched the flag—standard of the locomotive as it bore down upon the pilot.

His blow stunned the woman, but when she saw that it had saved her from an awful fate, she thanked her vigorous rescuer. She was stone dead and had not heard the locomotive.

Hester's Cotton Statistics.

New Orleans, Oct. 27.—Secretary Hester's weekly cotton statement of today shows for the 27 days of October a decrease under last year of 378,000 and an increase over the same period year before last of 69,000.

For the 17 days of the season that have elapsed the aggregate is behind the same days of last year 436,000 and ahead of the same days year before last 623,000.

The amount brought into sight during the past week has been 422,234 bales against 547,000 for the same 7 days last year, and 477,446 year before last.

The movement since September 1 shows receipts at all United States ports to be 2,231,507 against 2,587,105 last year. Overland across the Mississippi, Ohio and Potomac rivers to Northern mills and Canada 68,287 against 96,746 last year; interior docks in excess of those held at the close of the commercial year 309,624 against 386,814 last year; Southern mill takings 412,000 against 386,800 last year.

The total movement since September 1 is 3,021,820 against 3,457,525 last year.

President in Collision

U. S. Flagship 'Wes Virginia, via New Orleans, Oct. 27.—(By wireless.)—At 11 o'clock last evening through confusion of signals the fruit steamer E-parta collided with the lighthouse tender Magnolia which was conveying the president, Secretary Loeb and Dr. Rixey to the cruiser West Virginia. The rail and port bow of the Magnolia were damaged and two or three holes made in the hull below the water line. No one was hurt.

THE N. C. CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

LAGRANGE, N. C. Oct. 27.

The Thursday morning session of the convention was given over chiefly to reports and discussion of same, also symposium on state work.

The entire board was re-elected as follows: President, E. A. Moye, Greenville; vice president, C. W. Howard, Kinston; corresponding secretary, J. Boyd Jones, Wilson; recording secretary, L. O. Moseley, Kinston; treasurer, H. E. Moseley, Kinston.

At the afternoon session John R. Harper, president of Atlantic Christian college at Wilson, opened the educational discussions by reading the annual report of the work of that institution. During the year the enrollment has been doubled and the college is steadily growing in efficiency and in popular favor. The institution is a credit to Wilson and to the brotherhood throughout the state. The outlook is unusually promising.

Arrangements will be made to issue bonds to aid in the furtherance of this great educational work.

A large audience greeted A. B. Cunningham who spoke at the night service on "Christian Benevolence."

The next session will be held at Dunn in Oct. 1906.

He said: "Every year every local paper gives from 500 to 5,000 free lines for the benefit of the community in which it is located. No other agency can or will do this. The editor in proportion to his means does more for his own town than any other man."

He ought to be supported not because you happen to like him or admire his writing, but because a local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be crowded with great thought, but financially it is more benefit than both preacher and teacher. Today editors do more for less pay than any man on earth. Patronize your home paper, not as a charity, but as an investment.—Newspaperdom.

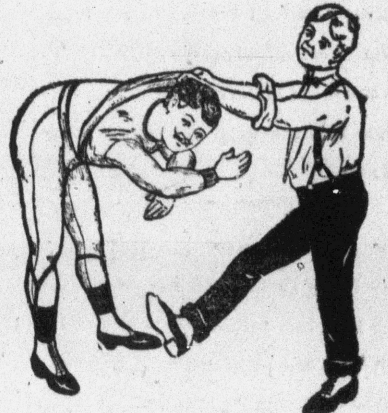

Price increased on Everything a Newspaper Office Uses.

The following from the Marshville Home tells a big truth in but few words. Everything in the newspaper itself, and printers are completely at the mercy of trusts. The Home says: Printing establishments that are handicapped by labor trusts, type trusts, machinery trusts, ink trusts, paper trusts, etc., know what it is to be "pulled" for all they are worth. Last week we ordered a lot of new type to meet the demands of our work and when the bill came it was put down at 74 cents a pound! And it doesn't take but half a handful to weigh a pound. The trust could make money at 25 cents a pound, but they like 74 cents better, and the publishers have to grin and bear it. A year or two ago we bought from an independent type concern two hundred pounds of new type that is as good as anybody's type, at 21 cents a pound, but we can't get it that way now. It's the same old tale—the independent concern sold out to the trust and quit business. —Concord Times.

THESE BE GOOD TIMES.

Without a doubt this is the greatest era of prosperity and plenty this country has ever known. Never before in our history have the tillers of the soil—farmers been so independent. Mortgages and liens are fewer today than ever before. It is nothing if not, a very common thing to find scores of farmers with snug bank accounts, or money out at interest. The time accounts are fewer and smaller, the "fleece staple," cotton, is bringing good prices, and promises to be better.—Greenville REFLECTOR.

Times are flush in North Carolina and have been so for several years. Pitt county is riding on the high tide of prosperity, as we judge from the foregoing, and also from similar observations in THE REFLECTOR lately. The other day our contemporary quoted a citizen who asked why land in Pitt is much higher now than it was ten years ago, and gave this answer. "Ten years ago the farmers were in debt, and many of them had to let their land go to pay what they owed, while now the farmers as a class are practically out of debt, 90 per cent. of them have money ahead, and many, instead of having to sell land, are trying to buy more."

It will be observed that the answer does not tell the wherefore, although it gives some interesting details of the high state of prosperity in the county of Pitt. Perhaps it is not an easy matter to answer the question, but we are reminded that ten years ago the nation had a Democratic president, under whose administration the country was plunged into an abyss of financial depression and industrial paralysis. We are not going to say that the contrast in the condition of the country ten years ago and today finds its cause in the politics of the national administration then and now; but we merely mention the fact as a fact, and leave the reader to think for himself.—Greensboro Industrial News.

While not saying it in so many words, it is inferred from the above that the Industrial News means to intimate that the Republican party is entitled to the credit for the good times that exist. Coming from a Republican source this is hardly more than expected, but it is about as absurd to claim that the Republican party is entitled to such credit as it is to say that while the Democrats were in power it did not rain and while the Republicans were in power it did.

We had hoped for better logic from the Industrial News. It was heralded all over the state that this new born Republican paper was to be decent and able. We were therefore not prepared to see it so soon take up and rehash this old, worn out, illogical, Republican absurdity.

The merest child in industrious knowledge knows that the present prosperity in Pitt county is due to no political influence or party principle, but is the outgrowth of energy and economy on the part of an industrious people.

CLAIMANTS TO DIVINITY.

Attempts to Impose Upon the Fanatic and Credulous.

There have been many attempts made in the history of the world by claimants to divinity to impose upon the fanatic and credulous. Perhaps the movement of this kind which attracted the greatest attention was that initiated by Joanna Southcott at the latter end of the eighteenth century. This extraordinary woman was a domestic servant in the early part of her career; but, becoming probably the victim of religious mania, she announced herself as a prophetess, and very soon, by dint of her extraordinary claims and writings, she obtained no fewer than 100,000 followers.

Joanna announced in all seriousness that she was about to become the mother of the divine Shiloh and named Oct. 19, 1814, as the date upon which the event would take place. As showing the perfect faith her followers had in her claims, it may be mentioned that they subscribed for and bought a silver cradle which cost \$1,000 and that \$500 was spent in pap spoons. As the date approached she shut herself up in a house specially bought for the interesting event, and the fever of excitement which reigned may be better imagined than described, for Joanna was over sixty years of age. Instead, however, of the divine child appearing the venerable prophetess herself died on the 29th of October, or ten days after the date she had herself fixed for the birth of the Messiah.

But Joanna is by no means the only example of a human being arrogating divine powers to himself or herself.

When George III. was king one Richard Brothers, a master's mate in the royal navy, suddenly announced that he was "prince of Heavens and ruler of the world," and that therefore King George should give up the crown in his favor. His claim met with scant courtesy. He was promptly imprisoned as a criminal lunatic—though he could not have been madder than the poor old king—and kept in captivity for eleven years.

The navy seems to have been a happy hunting ground for this class of impostor at this period, for the next to appear was "Zion" Ward, an ex-shoemaker, who had served in the navy. In 1828 he had the impudence to announce himself as the divine Shiloh, who had been expected by Joanna Southcott. People were credulous then, as they are now, and "Zion" got quite a respectable following and died a wealthy man some years after.—London Answers.

WHEN STAGS FIGHT.

They Always Maneuver to Get Their Opponents Downhill.

"There are certain spots known to and recognized by the deer in most forests called 'soiling pools,'" says an English writer. "They are usually peaty pools, to which the stags resort often at night to wallow and have a good time generally. Here I have occasionally seen them rolling on their backs, though more often black bubbles bursting sluggishly on the surface of the water have told me that I have come just in time to miss their late occupants. I was spying a distant hillside one day last September when some bright object flashing in the sun caught my eye, and, looking through the glass, I saw it was a stag. He was standing shaking himself by the edge of one of these pools, the water flying off him in all directions. It was the sun flashing on this which had attracted my attention. The pools are much used in the fall of the year, beginning approximately on Sept. 20, known in Gaelic as 'the day of the roaring,' though, of course, the exact date varies very much according to the season. I have heard stags roar as early as Sept. 10, though this is rather unusual. It is more of a bellow than a roar and is quite awe inspiring at close quarters, more especially if the roarer is himself hidden.

"The end of the season is always the most exciting time for stalkers. Stags then are all on the move, and great fights take place. I have never had the luck to witness a real big pitched battle between two champions. I doubt whether they often fight to the death, but the numbers of stags with broken and damaged horns which are met with after the autumn season is over show that pretty severe contests do occur. Stags always maneuver when fighting to get their opponent down hill. They have tremendous power in their hindquarters and in this position can use it to the best advantage. Deer do not fight only with their horns, as both sexes will rise erect on their hind legs and strike savagely with their forefeet, the sharp edges of the latter making a very nasty wound.

"A rather curious fact with regard to the fights between red deer, illustrating the toughness and elasticity of their skins, was told to me by a Dorsetshire agent. There was a big park full of red deer on the estate, and a large number of stags had been killed owing to fights. On skinning the dead ones he found that, though in many cases the lungs and flesh were pierced through and through, the skins themselves were comparatively uninjured."

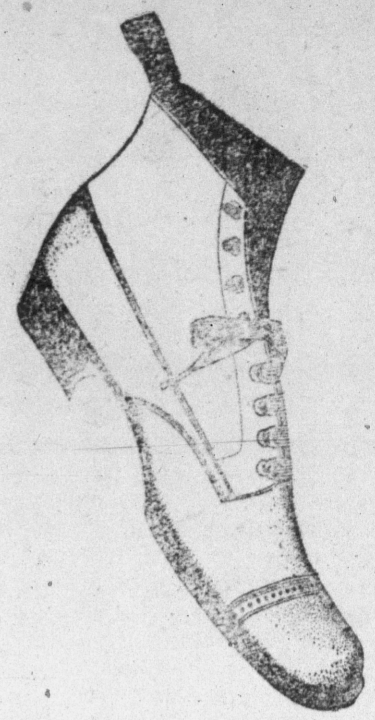
