#### JAIL DELIVERY.

##### Three Prisoners Escape in Day Time.

Some time Sunday afternoon three prisoners, all colored, made their escape from jail. They cut through the brick wall near a window and by making a rope out of a blanket swung themselves to freedom. The escape was found out about 4 o'clock.

The three prisoners who escaped, with two others had the privilege of the corridor in the second story of the jail, where it is easy to cut a hole through the brick wall when tools can be had, and it is easy to get tools passed to the windows. The two other prisoners, one a white man and one a negro, would not go out with the three who escaped.

The jail is not safe, as is shown by the frequency of escapes, and the walls ought to be lined on the inside with a plate of steel that can not be cut through. In its present condition prisoners get out too easy.

#### Terrible Affair in Virginia.

Gloucester Courthouse, Va. Oct. 28.—When R. E. Gressett came out of his home in King and Queen county this morning about sunrise, he was shot with a rifle by W. D. Coker, who had been concealed under the high steps. When Gressett fell he begged Coker not to shoot again, and M. S. Gressett also ran out begged him not to shoot again. Coker came up close to Gressett and fired again, killing him instantly. Coker then sent word to officers to come to his home at Greenwood, as he had shot Gressett. Just as the officers drove up to W. D. Coker's house they heard a gun go off, and they found Coker dead. He had killed his wife and two little girls, one six and the other nine years old, and had laid them out. Coker came from South Carolina about eight years ago. The two men lived about two miles apart. No one knows of any ill feeling between the men prior to the tragedy.

Charlotte sees that there is money in it and has obtained a charter for a life insurance company.

President Roosevelt again declares there will not be any next term for him. That ought to settle it.

Governor Glenn thinks Murray is being given too many privileges in Durham jail. Murray ought to take the same medicine as others undergoing a sentence for crime.

The Charlotte Observer wants to know why, with cotton selling at ten cents and general prosperity rearing around, no big circus has been that way this season. Ask the Southern railroad, brother.

Now that President Roosevelt has emphasized it that he will not again be a candidate, the papers need not be afraid of having to take back anything said about his Southern trip when the next campaign comes.

North Carolina college football teams seem in for poor luck this season. Numerous defeats and few victories is the record of games played so far. The boys had better take to their books and let the game go.

It is somewhat remarkable that the president passed over all the journey by rail without the slightest mishap, but as soon as he got on a boat for the return trip home, got in an accident. It was fortunate that he escaped injury.

Asheville is raising much ado because a saloon keeper kicked a Salvation Army woman out of his place of business. Of course the man deserves all the pouncing he can get, but if Asheville people had not licensed his saloon the city would have been spared the disgraceful spectacle.

We hope Mr. Sully's prediction that cotton will bring twelve cents by the first of December and fifteen cents by March will come true, but it remains to be seen if it goes so high. In the meantime those farmers who are holding for eleven cents should not pin to much faith to the fifteen cent prediction. There is good money in it when the price reaches eleven cents.

The leather trust is preparing to make people wince over what they have to pay for shoes. The large tanneries of the country have formed a combination by which they can crush out the smaller concerns and have absolute control of the leather output. The New York American sees in this an advance of fully twenty-five per cent., in the price of shoes at an early day. As everybody must have shoes, the advance means a fortune to the trust.

One of the latest official orders of the Postoffice Department, Washington, conveys the refreshing information that all railroads failing to make connections with the United States Mails will be subject to fines for not doing so. The regularity of the northern noon mail to this city has been really suggestive, and even forboding of such an order, and it is so gratifying to get today's mail today.—Norfolk Dispatch.

We hope this order will be made to apply to the whole country and rigidly enforced.

### Much Brighter Prospects

Now that peace has come there are still more definite signs of new grouping of the powers, a grouping which it is hoped will make for lasting peace. With the strongest of the nations bound in solemn compacts to maintain the status quo, or to abide by an agreed policy in the regions where they have been in competition, the second peace conference will assemble with much brighter prospects of permanent results than was the case in 1899.—Philadelphia Ledger.

The indications are that Hearst, the Municipal Ownership candidate for mayor of New York, will get more votes than Wm. M. Ivins, the Republican nominee, and that McClellan, the Democratic candidate, will be re-elected by a large plurality. Flammer, the Republican candidate for district attorney, has withdrawn in favor of Jerome, independent, and it is reported that Hearst will soon advise his followers to vote for Jerome in order to defeat James W. Osborne, the Tammany representative. All this goes to show that the Republicans cut a tolerably poor figure in New York, never being able to win when disguised as independents or something of the kind.—Charlotte Observer.

**TIME.**

**The Divisibility and its Relation to the Speed of the Planet.** Napoleon, who knew the value of time, remarked that it was the greater hours that won battles. The value of minutes has been often recognized, and any person watching a railway clerk handing out tickets and change during the last few minutes available must have been struck with how much could be done in those short portions of time.

At the appointed hour the train starts and by and by is carrying passengers at the rate of sixty miles an hour. In a second you are carried twenty-nine yards. In one twenty-ninth of a second you pass over one yard. Now, one yard is quite an appreciable distance, but one twenty-ninth of a second is a period which cannot be appreciated.

Yet it is when we come to planetary and stellar motions that the notion of the infinite divisibility of time dawns upon us in a new light. It would seem that no portion of time, however microscopic, is unavailable. Nature can perform prodigies not certainly in less than a minute, but in portions of it so minute as to be altogether inconceivable. The earth revolves on her axis in twenty-four hours. At the equator her circumference is 25,000 miles; hence in that part of the earth a person is being carried eastward at the rate of 509 yards per second—that is, he is moving over a yard, whose length is conceivable in the period of one five-hundred-and-ninth part of a second, of which we can have no conception at all.

But more, the orbital motion of the earth around the sun causes the former to perform a revolution of nearly 600,000,000 miles in a year, or somewhat less than 70,000 miles an hour, which is more than 1,000 miles a minute. Here, then, our second carries us the long distance of about nineteen miles. The mighty ball thus flies about a mile in the nineteenth part of a second.

**The Story of Napoleon's Bees.** Napoleon I., wishing to have an imperial emblem more ancient than the fleur-de-lis, adopted the bee under the following circumstances: When the tomb of Childeric, father of Clovis, was opened in 1653 there were found more than 300 of what the French heralds mistook for bees, "of the purest gold, their wings being inlaid with a red stone like carnelian." These were, in truth, what are in French called fleurons, ornaments supposed to have been sprinkled on the harness of a war horse. These "bees" were sent to Louis XIV., but it was Napoleon who had them sewn over his imperial robes, as emblematic of the activity and enterprise of his dynasty. It has been held in modern days that the French fleur-de-lis is really derived from a bee with "outspread wings, and if this is so the royal and the imperial emblems originate in a similar source.

**Why the Judge Objected.** The following story is told of Judge G. W. Green, who for many years was judge of the probate court at St. Albans, Vt.: At the annual town meeting the purchase of a new town house had been voted and a committee appointed to canvass the townspeople for subscriptions. One of the committee thought it would be an excellent plan to have the judge's name at the head of this list and to that end approached him. The judge absolutely refused to make a contribution and when questioned as to the reason said, "Why should I subscribe toward a new house when I haven't ridden in the old one yet?"

"I think, sor," replied the worthy Mr. O'Brien, "a half dozen bricks and a lump of paving stone." "Two policemen, sor," was the laconic reply. "Drunk, I suppose?" queried the magistrate. "Yes, sor," said Pat, "both as them."

The right eye is also as a rule higher than the left. Only one person in fifteen has perfect eyes, the largest percentage of defects prevailing among fair haired people. **THE COW TREE.**

**A Vegetable Fresh Found in Mountain Regions of Venezuela.**

The mountain region of Venezuela is the home of one of the most remarkable botanical freaks known to grow upon the American continent. It is a tree which flourishes only upon the mountain sides and always at the height of about 8,000 feet above sea level. It is lofty and slender for its height and has broad, stiff leaves of a dusty white color, which give it the appearance of being almost dead. What is queer about this tree with the tall, slender trunk and dead looking leaves and branches? It is odd enough, sure, for, although it is a very stupid looking forest growth, it is known the world over as the "milk" or "cow tree"—the famous "palo de vaca," which Humboldt so glowingly describes. It is an evergreen variety, and those who have used its "milk" pronounce it "perfectly delicious." When the traveler, hunter or native of the Venezuelan mountains is tired, hungry or thirsty he needs but to cut the bark of the cow tree in order to be rewarded with a copious flow of this milky sap, which is said to be even sweeter and richer than the milk of the best high grade Jersey. If collected in vessels and allowed to stand for some little time, say from eight to twelve hours, it grows thick and yellow, and the "cream" goes through the process of "rising to the top," just as it does in ordinary milk.

At about the time of sunrise, according to scientists, is the hour chosen by those acquainted with the tree's peculiarities for tapping the bark. At that time the milk is believed to be more palatable and nutritious than if taken after the sun has been acting for some hours upon the leaves. Attempts have been made to cultivate the cow tree both in Mexico and in the smaller Central American republics, but so far all such innovations have been failures. As soon as it is removed from the mountain sides, even in its native land, where the natives have tried to grow it in the valleys, it withers and dies.
