THE CZAR DEFEATED

Despotism Comes to an End in Russia.

St. Petersburg Oct. 30.—Tonight the autocracy of the Romanoffs and the old order of things cease to exist in Russia. Emperor Nicholas has surrendered and Count Witte comes into power as minister-president with an imperial mandate which will enable him to convert the farcical national assembly into a legislative body elected by greatly extended suffrage and to confer upon the people fundamental civil liberties, including free speech.

These welcome tidings reached St. Petersburg shortly before 6 o'clock this evening. Count Witte had spent the day with the Emperor at Peterhof going over the final draft of the manifesto to which he insisted that certain minor modifications be made, and before taking the train for St. Petersburg he telephoned to a friend that the Emperor had affixed his signature and that the imperial mandate comprising the conditions upon which he had agreed to accept office was in his pocket.

These include freedom of the press, the right of assembly and the immunity of the person, including the right of habeas corpus.

Large Sale.

The Farmers Warehouse, operated by the Farmers' Consolidated Tobacco Company under the management of O. L. Joyner, had the best sale today ever seen on a warehouse floor on the Greenville market. There were about 75,000 pounds of tobacco in this one house and it is worthy of note that there was not a dissatisfied farmer among the large number represented on the sale. STATE NEWS.

The Roman Catholic orphanage at Nazareth, near Raleigh, was destroyed by fire Sunday. The loss is \$25,000 with only \$6,000 insurance. Two boys were fatally injured by jumping off the roof four stories high.

Greensboro is to build a water reservoir holding 20,000,000 gallons. It will cost \$40,000 and take nearly a year to build.

A negro attempted to criminally assault Mrs. L. T. Long, near Winston. She was in her kitchen at the time and a large butcher knife being handy she used it on the negro with good effect.

George W. Watts, of Durham, has made a donation of \$1,000 to the Southern Presbyterian College and Conservatory of Music on condition that the college raise \$6,000 more.

The Atlantic and North Carolina railroad is preparing to build a handsome new depot at Kinston.

GENERAL NEWS.

By the bursting of a water main in Chicago that flooded buildings nearby, three persons were drowned and \$150,000 damage was done to property.

A mob of three hundred men took a negro from the jail at Bainbridge, Ga., Sunday morning and lynched him. The negro had murdered a woman and shot the sheriff when the latter went to arrest him.

The academy of music in Danville was destroyed by fire Sunday night. One man lost his life in the building.

New Orleans is holding thanksgiving services over the abatement of yellow fever.

Cigaretts Ruin All.

Both classes have been tried in this shop and the difference is that the drinking man is no good periodically and the smoker is a nuisance all the time. An Irish Farmer's Experience Under the Land Law.

An actual case of purchase is as follows: A small farmer lived upon a tract of 16 1/2 acres of land in County Tipperary, a good agricultural section. For some years past he had been paying to landlord an annual rent of £6 12s., or about \$33. He wished to purchase the land, and it was offered to him by the landlord for £150, or about \$750. He made the necessary application to the authorities, borrowed the money from the government, and paid the landlord for the place, gaining from him a deed in fee simple. The government retained what might be termed a mortgage upon the place which is to be released at the expiration of forty yearly payments of £4 4s., or about \$21. In forty years from 1904 the purchaser will have paid to the government about \$840 for his farm.

He began also to pay taxes upon the place as soon as it was listed in his name. His first year's taxes amounted to 26s., or about \$6.50. This amount may be increased or diminished according to the valuation put upon the property and the rate of taxation adopted from year to year.—From "Rural Ireland as It Is To Day," by Plummer F. Jones, in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for November.

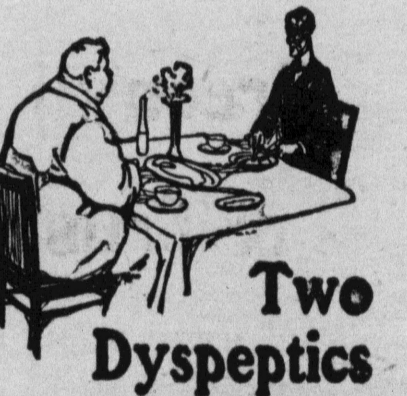

HORSE TORTURE.

Slitting the Nostrils is Not Yet a Wholly Obsolete Practice.

Slitting a horse's nostrils is still practiced in some parts of the world, as in Persia, Mongolia and even in northern Africa, and ponies with slit nostrils are often seen in the Himalayas and in Afghanistan. This mutilation is resorted to in the erroneous belief that the horse can inhale more air when going at a fast pace and also that it prevents neighing, a disqualification of much importance during war or when it is desirable to travel as silently as possible. It was practiced in Hungary not long ago, if we are to accept as evidence the copy of a finished sketch of a horse's head by the celebrated Zoffani, given in Colonel Hamilton's work on horses. It is rather surprising that the fashion was not renewed in England, for two or three centuries ago to prevent a horse neighing it was recommended to tie a woolen band around the tongue. Markham says:

"If either when you are in service in the wars and would not be discovered or when upon any other occasion you would not have your horse to neigh or make a noise you shall take a lyste (band) of woolen cloth and tie it fast in many folds about the middle of your horse's tongue, and believe it, so long as the tongue is so tied so long the horse can by no means neigh or make any extraordinary noise with his voice, as hath often been tried and approved of."

A very barbarous and useless operation for the prevention of stumbling in horses was fashionable toward the end of the seventeenth and beginning of the eighteenth centuries. This was the exposure of the tendon of a muscle that assists in dilating the nostrils and twisting it around two or three times when it was divided. "In doing this you shall see the horse bring his hinder legs to his fore legs almost when you have thus pulled and turned the sinew two or three times." Such a statement will give some idea of the pain the animal experienced during the senseless operation. — London Standard.

Plant Growth in Winter.

Plant life is not dormant during the winter when the thermometer is below freezing point, as any observer of vegetation in winter may note for himself. The flowering buds of the red maple, the dogwoods, willows and many other plants, scarcely discernible in the axils at the fall of the leaf, become so large by spring as to be ready to burst on "a moment's notice," and this though the thermometer may have been continuously near zero. Observers in the Alpine regions of Europe have noted that gentians and similar plants will grow and even flower under the snow which has enveloped them the whole winter through, thawing out by their own internal heat little chambers in the protecting snow. And the same is recorded of the American snow plant, the Sierra Nevada's Sarcocodes sanguinea. It is often found in full bloom when the snow melts away from it and indeed derives its common name from this fact.

Cinchona.

Cinchona was originally called "countess powder," from the fact that it was said to have been introduced into Europe by the Countess of Cinchona, wife of the viceroy of Peru. It was also called Peruvian bark and Jesuits' bark, from the country where it was originally discovered and from the Jesuit fathers who used it in medical practice. It was first used in the cure of intermittent fevers about 1640. The tree from which the bark is procured grows in Peru, Bolivia, Venezuela, New Granada and many other parts of South America and has been planted with success in India and Ceylon. There are said to be over a dozen varieties of the cinchona producing plant, all of which yield bark of different quality. Quinine, or quina, an alkaloid contained in the bark, was discovered by Pelletier and Caventon in 1820. It is believed to be a probable constituent of all the yellow cinchona barks.

"Very true, you may be quite right as to that," said Lord Mansfield, "for I am afraid even an act of parliament could not give you discretion."

THE REAL SAHARA.

How the Vast Desert Appears to the Caravan Traveller.

The Sahara is not at all as popular belief pictures it, a vast plain of moving sand. Setted here and there with fertile oases, somewhat like a leopard's skin. From Tunis westward it is a vast depression of sand and clay not much above sea level, in some parts perfectly level, in others hilly, with low depressions containing water saltier than the sea, which generally evaporates, leaving a coating of brilliant crystals which appear like snow in the distance. The rivers from the Atlas mountains on the north serve to irrigate the oases of the Ziban. Sometimes they flow above the surface, but often below it. There is a fascination about the desert that is indescribable and that none can understand unless they have spent several weeks with a caravan. At times the heat is very great, but, being perfectly dry, it does not enervate as our humid atmosphere does at a temperature 40 degrees lower. Near midday the desert appears to be a molten sea of dazzling, vibrating light. Now and then the mirage appears, and the tired eyes of the stranger are refreshed with visions of beautiful lakes near the horizon, even sometimes of trees and moving caravans. Alas! This is a case where seeing is not believing. After many disappointments of this kind the camels suddenly raise their heads and snuff the air through their curiously formed nostrils and move at a quicker pace, instinct telling them that water is near. In the far distance a low black line indicated palm trees, and in a few hours the oasis of Sidi Okba appeared, distinctly relieving the doubts of those who feared it was only a mirage. Our dragoon kicked off his slippers and climbed very nimbly up a fine palm to get some of the luscious fruit growing at the top.—D. F. Elmendorf in Scribner's.

"You've come here to admire works of art. Very well, feast your eyes on that work of nature!" pointing to his own figure reflected in the glass. "Look at it, there's a picture for you!"

"Yes," said Jerrold, regarding it intently, "very fine indeed! Wants hanging, though!"

The Chinese Way.

In China the entire family is held responsible for the acts of any of its members, and for certain offenses, such as an attempt on the life of the emperor, all are executed, even to the babe in arms. The teapoom or dean of the village, elected by universal suffrage, is responsible for the conduct of the families of his domain. The subprefect, prefect, governor and viceroy are all responsible in different degrees. An inundation and a famine are laid at the door of the governor or the viceroy, who are "father and mother to the people." A number of years ago a mandarin was murdered by soldiers. As a result thirty-three functionaries—prefect, subprefects and superintendents—were declared responsible and beheaded and the governor and treasurer of the province were exiled.

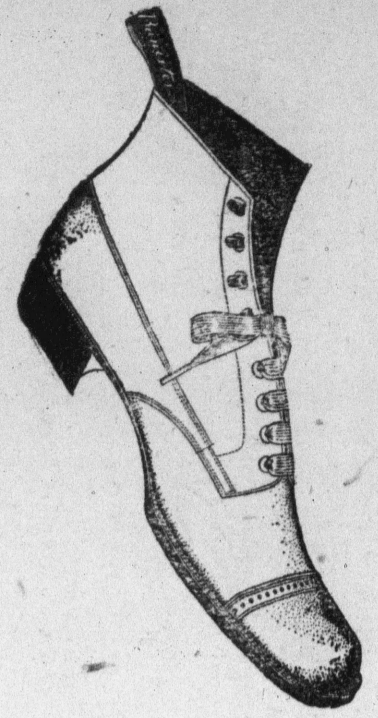
