STATE NEWS.

The Catholic orphanage, near Raleigh, destroyed by fire Sunday, will be rebuilt at once.

R. S. Fitch, near Rocky Point, had one acre in strawberries that last spring netted him \$387.35. He planted the same acre in sweet potatoes and has housed 365 bu.

The noted Nick Williams distillery case at Greensboro has come to another mistrial. A sick juror was the cause this time.

An Asheville woman whose husband, an engineer on the Southern railway, was killed, has brought suit for \$75,000.

A mule on which was a \$15 mortgage and her name was Maud, was sold at auction at Greensboro and brought only \$2.50.

GENERAL NEWS.

Thirteen people were killed and 25 wounded in a wreck on the Atchison, Topka and Santa Fe railway near Kansas City.

There are now 8,066,672 people in New York state. The population of Greater New York is 4,014,304.

Proceedings have been started in the courts of Ohio to have receivers appointed for the Mutual Life and New York Life insurance companies.

The president has appointed Charles A. Stillings, of Boston, Mass., as public printer, to take effect November 1st. A. Stillings is manager of the Printing Board of Trade of New York City.

An engineer and a fireman were instantly killed in a head-on collision on the Norfolk & Western railroad near Roanoke, Va.

Tobacco Leaf reports the manufacture in this country during the year ended June 30, 1905, of 7,689,337,207 cigars, an increase of 185,020,437 over the output of the preceding year.

Unfavorable To Cotton.

Washington, Oct. 31st.—The weekly cotton region weather crop bulletin, issued by the Weather Bureau, says:

In districts where the proportion of ungathered cotton is greatest, the weather conditions of the week ending Oct. 30, were not favorable.

Wet weather over a large part of the central and western districts of the cotton belt during the fore part of the week delayed cotton picking and caused injury to open cotton in northern Texas, Oklahoma and Indian Territories, Arkansas, the northern portion of Mississippi and Alabama and western Tennessee. As a whole the week was cool. Frosts occurred in the central and western districts, causing considerable damage in Tennessee, northern Mississippi and Oklahoma and Indian Territories, but practically none in Texas.

In the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida the weather conditions were favorable. Picking is from half to two-thirds completed in Oklahoma and Indian Territories, Arkansas and northwestern Mississippi; a much larger proportion of the crop has been gathered in other sections, picking being practically completed in the more southerly districts.

The Cotton Crop.

Atlanta, Ga. Oct. 31.—The Southern Cotton Association today issued a statement compiled from the reports of 17,000 correspondents throughout the cotton belt, estimating the present crop at 9,444,314 bales. The statement estimates that 61.3 per cent of the crop had been picked and that 54.7 per cent ginned October 21.

HALLOWE'EN PARTY.

It Was Amusing and a Success

The Halloween party given by the ladies of the Baptist church in Perkins' opera house, Tuesday night, attracted a large number of people and proved quite a success. The drill by sixteen girls dressed as ghosts was a good feature and generously applauded. The Gypsy tent and witch's cabin also afforded much amusement. The cotton candy machine exhibited by the two gentlemen from New York afforded much interest and was a real novelty.

The ladies were very much gratified at the financial results of the party, the only regret about this being that they did not prepare for so large a crowd as was present. Everything they had was sold at an early hour and all who wanted to buy could not be supplied.

Town Wiped Out.

Pine Grove, W. Va., Tuesday, 31.—Fire which started shortly after one o'clock this morning in the Pine Grove hotel from a natural gas explosion, has destroyed practically the whole town. The buildings destroyed are the Pine Grove Hotel, Commercial Hotel, Pine Grove Bank, Methodist church, Morgan's business block, seven stores and ten dwellings. Dynamite is being used to stop the further progress of the flames. It is reported that several persons lost their lives in the hotel, but in the excitement it cannot be verified.

Roosevelt Throws Coal Under Boiler.

Washington, Oct. 31.—President Roosevelt regards his Southern trip, just ended, as a most enjoyable and profitable experience. Particularly did he enjoy the sea voyage. The President expressed himself in the most enthusiastic terms regarding the ships, officers and men of the squadron.

While at sea on Sunday the President made a speech to officers and men of the West Virginia. He had just completed an inspection of the entire ship. In the boilerroom a profusely decorated shovel was put into his hand, and he was asked to throw a shovel of coal in a particular boiler. He threw in two, and the boiler was immediately christened "The Roosevelt Boiler." The shovel was passed around that every stoker might shovel with it. It was then broken into bits, each piece being retained as a souvenir.

At the conclusion of the speech the President was given three rousing cheers by the officers and men.

Rioters Storm Rurria's Capital.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.—Up to 6 o'clock to night no serious collisions had taken place as a result of the demonstrations over the Tsar's manifesto, although there seemed to be momentary danger of great disorders.

The workmen all over the city left their work during the afternoon and drifted to the center of the city, massing before the Kazan Cathedral. Fully 100,000 persons gathered in the great square, completely filling the space between the spreading colonnades of the cathedral, whole wings like St. Peter's at Rome, stretch out like arms on either side.

The spectacle was impressive. In the gathering gloom the red banners, massed behind speakers on the cathedral steps, seemed like slashes of blood against the grey, cold, imposing edifice. The orators were mostly students and workmen. Their appeals kindled the wildest enthusiasm in the crowds, which included hundreds of women and girl students. The oratory continued for hours, and while it was in progress a procession was formed with students at its head bearing red flags.

The South Carolina editor who had to go into bankruptcy because of the failure of oil and trust companies in which he was largely interested, is another evidence that editors had better stick to their papers and keep clear of speculations.

Just note the difference A Chicago man is suing for divorce because his wife insisted on making pies for him, while Editor Joe King, of the Durham Herald, is said to eat pies for breakfast, dinner and supper, and grows fat on them.

James Bryce says that no country can hope to gain anything from a war with the United States. Spain doesn't exactly agree with Mr. Bryce, remembering that \$20,000,000 that she got from us for the Philippine islands.—Atlanta Journal.

The money paid for insurance premiums makes one of the largest movements of money in the world. That paid by Southern policy-holders has heretofore moved from the South to the North, and hence the congestion of capital in the insurance centers of the North. The new insurance companies now organizing in the South will not only, in all probability, give us cheaper insurance, but all the premium money will accumulate in home banks.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Elections will be held, Tuesday November 7th, in seven States and six of the largest cities. In Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Virginia and Ohio, a Governor and other State officers are to be chosen; and in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Nebraska minor State officers, judges or regents of the State University. In New York, Indianapolis, Louisville, Salt Lake and San Francisco, a mayor and other city officers and in Chicago sanitary trustees and judges are to be voted for.

Tar Heels to Entertain Them.

The North Carolina Society of Norfolk has decided to entertain Governor Glenn, of North Carolina, and the University of North Carolina football eleven on the night of November 29, before the big Thanksgiving Day game. The Governor of Virginia and the University of Virginia eleven will be guests of honor at the entertainment. Invitations for the reception are to be extended immediately and later committees are to be appointed to make all necessary arrangements for the function.—Norfolk Dispatch.

Expenses of Insurance Management.

The real question is: "What does a company get for the money it spends? If a company spends 25 per cent. of its income in a year and gets in return a large, well selected business, done under reasonable contracts with agents, it has done well, it is growing—growing both in strength and usefulness. If a company spends 18 per cent of its income annually and gets a very small business, done under extravagant contracts and haphazard management, it has not done well—it is not growing either in strength or usefulness. If a company spends only 10 per cent. of its income annually, that fact alone is almost conclusive proof that it is passing into a condition of inanition and relative uselessness. The little business that such a company does is likely to be done at a heavier cost than the business done by a company with virile organization. Sound organization generally means economy; success breeds success. A just study of expenses must include a consideration of what expenditure brings. In the great companies, it has brought enormous development, the widest usefulness, the vigor of an almost immeasurable strength, and returns to the insured which with proper allowance for the cost of indemnity surpass the returns realized during the same time on conservative investments. The ratio under discussion is higher here than abroad because of the larger relative volume of business done here. It is higher now than it was thirty years ago, chiefly because of the greater activities of the companies, their rapid growth and increasing usefulness through the acquisition of new business.—From "The Driving Power of Life Insurance," by D. P. Kingsley, in the American Monthly Review of Reviews for November.

O'Connell's famous parody of Dryden, in ridicule of three members of Parliament—Colonels Sibthorp, Percival and Verner—which produced a roar of laughter, has rarely been surpassed:

"Three colonels, in three distant counties born,

Tobacco Tag Packages.

The tobacco tag premium fad has made lots of trouble for the post office people. Everybody knows that packages of merchandise are available at a much cheaper rate than first class or letter mail matter and that first class mail matter enclosed in a package of the lower class, makes the whole mail at the higher rate. But many people do not apply their knowledge in this respect to their actions when they go to mail a package and either for the sake of convenience or to save postage, they bundle up a written letter and the merchandise all together and put it in the postoffice. Just now the Post office Department has inaugurated a systematic effort to put an end to the evil and has its own means of finding out when the law is violated. Yesterday one patron of the Wilmington office was fined \$10 by Postmaster Wallace and others are said to be on "the anxious seat." This notice should be a warning to those who have packages to mail in the future.—Wilmington Star.

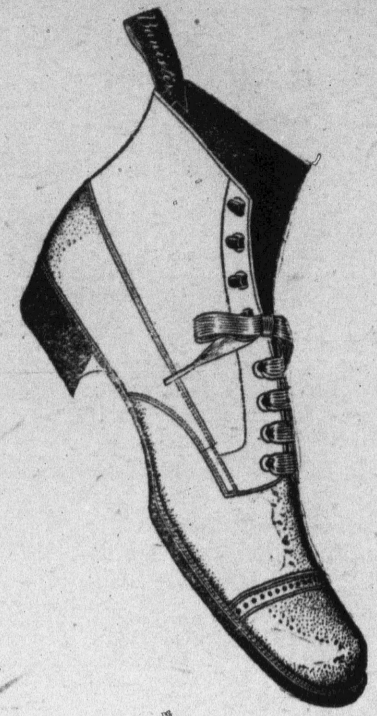

ALONE IN A CROWD.

One Phase of Apartment House Life in the Great Cities.

There are perhaps 100 people in our apartment house, 1,000 or it may be 2,000 or 3,000 in our block. They live in small, comfortably furnished and very convenient apartments, but they live alone. No one ever sees any exchange of courtesies between them. They are not interested in the progress of the lives of the people about them. You might live there a year or ten years, and I doubt if your next door neighbor would even so much as know of your existence. He is too busy. Your business might fail, your children perish. You might suffer every calamity from heartache to literal physical destruction, and I doubt whether he would ever hear of it. Marriage, birth, death, any and all of the other homely and really essential happenings of life are all trivial under the new dispensation. Neither you nor your wife nor children nor your children's children have any interest for him. It is all as if you really did not exist.

The pathos of all this is that these people never quite realize until some of the real calamities of life overtake them what they have been ignoring and casting aside. Until they are old, until they are stricken with illness, until they stand bereft of fortune or until they are visited by death—then and then only do they become aware of the importance of the individual relationship. It matters not in such an hour what the prime importance of the world may be. It will not avail them to know that the world still goes on and that the principal thoroughfares of the great cities are alive with a spectacle forever fascinating and forever new. Life in the abstract cannot aid them then. They are alone, left longing for a personal relationship, with an aching and, too often, a breaking heart. Friendship, affection, tenderness, how they loom large in the hour of despair!—Theodore Dreiser in Tom Watson's Magazine.

How to Walk Upstairs.
"There are but few persons who know how to walk upstairs properly," said a well known physician. "Usually a person will tread on the ball of his foot in taking each step, springing himself up to the next step. This is very tiresome and wearing on the muscles, as it throws the entire suspended weight of the body on the muscles of the legs and feet. You should in walking or climbing stairs seek for the most equal distribution of the body's weight possible. In walking up stairs your feet should be placed squarely down on the step, heel and all, and then the work should be performed slowly and deliberately. In this way there is no strain upon any particular muscle, but each one is doing its duty in a natural manner. The man who goes upstairs with a springing step you may be sure is no philosopher, or at least his reasoning has not been directed to that subject."
