FUNERAL REFORM.

The pastors of the several churches in High Point came together in an association and adopted resolutions looking to reform in conducting funerals. It is evident that some reforms are needed on such occasions, but whether the suggestions of the High Point pastors meet popular approval remains to be seen. Their resolutions read as follows:

"Believing that there should be a uniformity in the manner of conducting funerals and further believing that some of the customs now followed are unnecessarily taxing to the family and friends of the deceased by exposure to the weather, etc., we are agreed to the following suggestion which we hope all will conform to as early as possible.

"First—That we recommend that as far as practicable all should avoid arranging for funerals to be conducted on Sundays.

"Second—That we discourage the use of black as an emblem of mourning.

"Third—That the funeral director be encouraged to take charge of arrangements and relieve the ministers of this duty, either at the church or elsewhere.

"Fourth—That excessive expense be carefully avoided.

"Fifth—That the casket be not opened after leaving the residence only in very exceptional cases, but that all who desire to view the remains go to the residence and that as far as possible the family should be alone when taking final view of the remains.

"Sixth—That the funeral services not be prolonged by unnecessary eulogies of the dead or by long discourse on immortality.

"Seventh—That if the weather is inclement men should not be expected to move their hats during the reading of the burial service.

"Eight—At the grave when the casket is lowered and the burial services has been read, the congregation shall be dismissed by the benediction or prayer, leaving the filling of the grave to the sexton, who by taking his own time can do it much better—thus saving the exposure to the weather, also the family and friends the very severe strain of hearing the rumbling of the clods which are to be covering of the dead."

Friday Unlucky?

The following paragraph was printed in the news column of the Standard many years ago.

The whaleship Hillman, which arrived here on Friday, seems to disprove the old superstition that Friday is an unlucky day most materially. We learn from the first officer of the vessel that the Hillman sailed from this port on Friday, that she took the first blackfish on Friday, her first whale on Friday, made her first port out on Friday and finally arrived here on Friday, with 3,500 barrels of whale, 2,180 barrels of sperm oil and 61,000 pounds of bone on board and sent home. Is Friday unlucky? The owners of the Hillman, we presume, are inclined to the opinion that it is not.

DEEP SEA DIVERS.

Some Daring Feats Performed by the Workers Under Water.

At what depth can a diver carry out his functions? How long can he remain under the surface? What is the effect of high air pressures on the human system? One well known firm of submarine engineers limits the depth of descent to twenty-five fathoms, or, say, 150 feet. But operations have been carried out at greater depths than this, and perhaps the greatest distance below the surface at which a diver has succeeded in working is thirty-four fathoms, or 204 feet. This was accomplished by James Hooper, who descended to the ship Cape Horn, sunk off Pichidanque, South America, and sustained a pressure of eighty-eight and a half pounds on every square inch of his body.

Another remarkable feat was that of Alexander Lambert, who recovered £70,000 in gold coin from the steamship Alphonso XII, sunk off Point Gando, Grand Canary, in nearly thirty fathoms of water, the actual depth of the treasure room being 262-3 fathoms, or 160 feet. This man also performed the daring feat of stopping the flooding of the Severn tunnel when a door in the drainage tunnel had been left open. The door was situated a quarter of a mile distant from the shaft, but equipped in his diving dress he crept that distance through a narrow passage full of water and closed the door. This plucky act enabled the pumps to overcome the volume of water which was flooding the working and allowed the completion of the tunnel to be carried out.

A further interesting case of deep diving is that of Angel Erostarbe, who succeeded in recovering silver bars valued at £9,000 from the steamer Skyro, sunk off Cape Finistere in over thirty fathoms. In this case the diver had to blow away portions of the vessel with dynamite before he could reach the treasure chamber. Three dives per diem were frequent, and as many as five descents were made in one day. The maximum period under water was twenty minutes.

The effect of high pressure on the constitution is not found injurious when the work is carried out under ordinary precautions. A French scientist has gone so far as to claim that breathing compressed air is a remedy for asthma and emphysema. It is also said to excite digestion, owing to the great quantity of oxygen carried into the blood. It has been found that a period of two hours should elapse between a meal and a descent. In descending the movement should be slow, and if the pressure causes pains in the head this can be remedied by rising gently a few feet, when the descent can be recommenced. In ascending divers are recommended not to exceed a speed of two feet per second.—Pall Mall Gazette.

The Dean's Accent.

There are no difficulties of language to a man as tactful as a certain lord mayor of London, of whom St. James' Budget tells.

The eminent Dean Pigou was once invited to conduct a service in French at the chapel of the Hospital For Huguenots, South Hackney.

Previous to the day the dean wrote out in English a sermon on the "Revocation of the Edict of Nantes." Then with the aid of Mrs. Pigou, a sound French scholar, he translated the whole into French and preached on the day in that language.

Among the distinguished persons present was the lord mayor, who hastened to thank the dean at the close of service, adding:

"Though, sir, I do not know one word of French, I understood you perfectly."

No Time Wasted.

Farmer Cy Whipple was said to have had more religion than any other man in Mendocino county. He boasted that, for more than forty years, he had never missed a meal or neglected to say grace. It was said that Cy's religion and his appetite merged so closely that it was hard to tell where the one left off and the other began. When the dinner bell summoned the family and the help to the dining room, Cy always led the charge. While the others were seating themselves at the table the old man would start in:

"O Lord, we thank thee for havin' given us such a beautiful day. Sanctify this food to our souls' good. Amen. Pass the meat."—San Francisco Call.
