A strong man has been added to the editorial fraternity of North Carolina in the person of R. W. Simpson, formerly of South Carolina, who has recently become editor of the Raleigh Times.

With such luck as the North Carolina University boys are having at football, we cannot see what they expect when they go to Norfolk on Thanksgiving Day, unless it is to give the Virginians a practice game.

Perhaps some day a North Carolina legislature may awake to the wisdom of so amending the jury system as not to require the unanimous agreement of twelve men to reach a verdict. Some provision ought to be made to prevent the stopping of a prolonged case where a member of the jury happens to be taken sick, and also to prevent mistrials when one juror holds out against all the others.

Distribution of Mulberry Trees.

The N. C. Department of Agriculture beginning November 15th, will distribute among the farmers of the state 20,000 seedling white mulberry trees.

This distribution is intended to encourage the growing of silk in North Carolina, but the trees will at the same time furnish shade and food for poultry and hogs. Every farm in the state should have a mulberry grove.

The trees should be planted 12x12 feet on dry soil and cared for like peach or plum trees.

These trees will be sent by mail, post paid, in packages of 50 and 100. Not less than 50 nor more than 100 trees will be sent to one address.

To cover cost of package and mailing applicants must enclose one cent for each tree. Postage stamps accepted.

This is probably the last distribution of mulberry trees that will be made by the Department. Those who want them should apply at once.

Those who have not tried silk growing should send for a copy of Bulletin 181.

Address applications for mulberry trees to the undersigned.

Thanksgiving Proclamation.

The President has issued his proclamation naming Thursday, Nov-30th, next, as a day for thanksgiving. The proclamation follows:

When nearly three centuries ago the first settlers came to the country which has now become this great republic, they fronted not only hardship but terrible risk to their lives. In those grim years the custom grew of setting apart one day in each year for special service of thanksgiving to the Almighty for preserving the people through the changing seasons. The custom has now become national and hallowed by immemorial usage. We live in easier and more plentiful times than our forefathers, the men who, with rugged strength, faced the rugged days; and yet the dangers to national life are quite as great now as at any previous time in our history. It is eminently fitting that once a year our people should set apart a day for praise and thanksgiving to the giver of good, and, at the same time, that they express their thankfulness for the abundant mercies received, should manfully acknowledge their shortcomings and pledge themselves solemnly and in good faith to strive to overcome them. During the past year we have been blessed with bountiful crops. Our business prosperity has been great. No other people has ever stood on as high a level of material well being as ours now stands. We are not threatened by foes from without. The foes from whom we should pray to be delivered are our own passions, appetites and follies; and against these there is always need that we should war.

Therefore, I now set apart Thursday, the 30th day of this November, as a day of thanksgiving for the past and of prayer for the future and on that day I ask that throughout the land the people gather in their homes and places of worship, and in rendering thanks unto the Most High for the manifold blessings of the past year, consecrate themselves to a life of cleanliness, honor and wisdom so that this nation may do its allotted work on the earth in a manner worthy of those who founded it and of those who preserved it.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington this second day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and five, and of the independence of the United States, the one hundred and thirtieth.

Among the Counties.

According to the reports received by the Commissioners of Labor and Printing, 66 counties produce cotton at \$30.63 per bale of 500 pounds; 83 produce wheat at 74 cents; 97 produce corn at 49 cents; 65 counties produce tobacco at \$7.41 per 100 pounds. Information indicates substantial profit on wheat, corn, cotton and tobacco. Ten counties report educational conditions good; 34 fair; 48 poor; 5 bad; 93 report improvement; 34 report financial conditions good; 49 fair; 19 poor; 88 report improvement; 82 counties favor compulsory education; 15 oppose it.
