SUPERIOR COURT.

Civil Term in Session.

The November term of Pitt Superior court, for the trial of civil cases, began this morning with Judge E. B. Jones presiding.

In calling the eighteen jurors for the first week only one failed to answer. Of the seventeen there were five with excuses. One who was sick and another who was running a public gin, which had to close during his absence, were excused for the term. Two clerks in town and one tobacco warehouseman were let off for the time being, the judge advising them they would be sent for when needed.

When the calling of cases set on the calendar for the first day began, it was found that one side or the other was not ready and it looked for a time that there would be little doing. Judge Jones advised the bar that he wanted them to give them something to do, and that after dinner he would regularly take up the calendar as arranged and the cases must be tried or the cost would be levied.

One case was non-suited because of failure of plaintiff to appear, judgment was entered in a railroad case that had been compromised, a divorce case occupied a few minutes more, and recess was taken until afternoon.

There is a very small attendance at court, civil terms not usually having much interest about them.

Wilmington Mutiny Trial On.

Wilmington, Nov. 4.—The trial of Arthur Adams and Robert Sawyer, two of the three negro seamen charged with mutiny and murder of Captain E. R. Rumill and four members of the crew of the schooner Harry A. Cerwind, off this coast early in October, began in the Federal court today. A true bill was returned this evening against Henry Scott, the third of the alleged mutineers, who was the principal witness today against his shipmates, charging each of them with the murder of one man and with firing simultaneously at the third and throwing all their bodies overboard. He confessed to the killing of one negro seaman himself, but claimed that it was in self-defense after the mutiny was over. The trial of Adams and Sawyer will be continued Monday, and Scott will be placed on trial Tuesday, counsel having been assigned by the court today.

The witness today, besides Scott, were Captain J. W. Taylor, master, and Mate Simmon, of the schooner Blanche H. King, which took the negroes off the schooner at sea, and Captain I. F. Hewett, of New Jersey, managing owner of the Berwind. The cases are being prosecuted by District Attorney Harry Skinner, while the prisoners on trial are being defended by Attorney George L. Hesclan, of Wilmington.

Negroes Bolt Party.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 4.—Developments today have confirmed the report of an organization among the negroes, the immediate result of which will be the practical elimination of the Republican negro vote from the State election next Tuesday. The organization is that of an independent negro party, the idea being for the members to absent themselves from the polls for the present as a rebuke to the white leaders of the Republican party in the State for ignoring the "brother in black." The white leaders say they are glad to get rid of the element represented in the new party, as their present effort is to build up a white Republican party in the State.

Don't Get Mad When You Are Dunned.

There is one class of people who should not ask for credit, who should never owe a red cent and that is the class that get mad when a statement of their account is sent to them. It is a very rare thing now that a man gets mad and chews the rag when a statement of account is sent him, but occasionally some fellow who has not paid his bill, and shows no inclination to pay it, paws sand and raises merry cain because he is "dunned." The modern business man sends at stated times statements to all who owe him and the business world acknowledges that as good business and no one but a back number or a fool is going to get mad when he receives such a statement. But if you transact business with a business man ask him to credit you and you do not pay him at the appointed time you are sure to get a dun. But ninety nine times out of a hundred the fellow who gets mad because his attention is called to his indebtedness never gets mad enough to pay the account promptly. He wants to pay in getting mad and playing the fool about it. SIGNS OF GOOD BREEDING.

Forms of Etiquette That All People Should Observe.

A bow should always be returned even though one may be mistaken for some one else, and to give the cut direct is a discourtesy of which no person of good breeding should be guilty. It is perfectly easy to acknowledge a salutation with such dignity but brevity of glance as to plainly show that one does not care to have anything but a very formal acquaintance with the person spoken to.

A man always raises his hat when presented to a woman or to another man. He should also raise it when meeting or taking leave of a woman, when she first speaks to him for whatever reason, when he offers his services in any way, even though she may be a stranger to him, such as when entering an elevator where women are present or in opening a door for a woman to pass through. In fact, a man cannot be too careful in showing this little act of courtesy whenever the least apology would be in order, says the Philadelphia Press.

A man always lifts his hat when a woman under his escort receives some courtesy from a stranger or if she bows to a person that he is not acquainted with. He also raises his hat upon recognizing an acquaintance who has a woman with him whom he does not know. A man should be as particular in bowing to his mother, father or sister when meeting them on the street or in taking leave of them as he would be with his friends or formal acquaintances.

Men shake hands with each other at introductions; women only when desiring to be especially cordial. A man, of course, always waits for the woman to offer her hand first, and if possible he should remove his glove before doing so if her hand is ungloved.

Women do not kiss each other when meeting and parting unless they are very close friends, and even then it is usually only done in private.

When acting as a woman's escort a man should pay all the fares and fees. When entering a street car or any vehicle he should allow the woman to precede him, assisting her as she does so. In leaving the car or cab he alights first, offering her assistance as she follows.

In all these forms of etiquette it is quite possible to at least lay the foundation for their correct observance when those under one's care are merely boys and girls. If they become accustomed to good form and good manners when young they will never dread the day when they must enter the more formal ways of society.

A Wonderful Tree.

In the basin of the Kongo river grows a species of tree of gigantic stature, called by the natives the moabi and belonging to the botanical family of the sapotaceae, which is very useful to man. The trunks of these trees at the height of a man's head above the ground are frequently eight or ten feet in diameter, and many of them rise from 80 to 115 feet before a branch puts out.
