Rust Is Red Spider.

The Department of Agriculture in a report just issued says the red spider is a rust that has been quite prevalent in some sections of the cotton growing area of this country during the past two years. The spider is a minute yellowish red mite which feeds on the cotton plant, principally under the sides of the leaf, but at times attacking all parts of the plant. The report says the pest is very probably distributed throughout the entire cotton growing area of the South, although during late years its occurrence in injurious numbers had not been reported until the summer of 1903, when it caused considerable damage to cotton in South Carolina and Georgia.
