The New York Commercial undertakes to print the monthly fire losses in the United States and Canada. In its estimates for October the total loss is placed at \$12,974,387, in 1,560 fires. The loss in Charlotte is placed at \$90,000, Concord \$700, Gastonia \$2,000, Greensboro \$2,000, Greenville, N. C., \$2,000, Raleigh \$25,000, Statesville \$4,000, Wilmington \$20,000.—Charlotte Observer.

After studying the subject of cancer for seven years, several prominent British physicians, working with the aid of a fund started for the purpose by King Edward, have come to the conclusion that the disease is neither contagious nor hereditary, and that it is not due to bacillus or germ. It is the result of certain normal developments of cells in the wrong places. 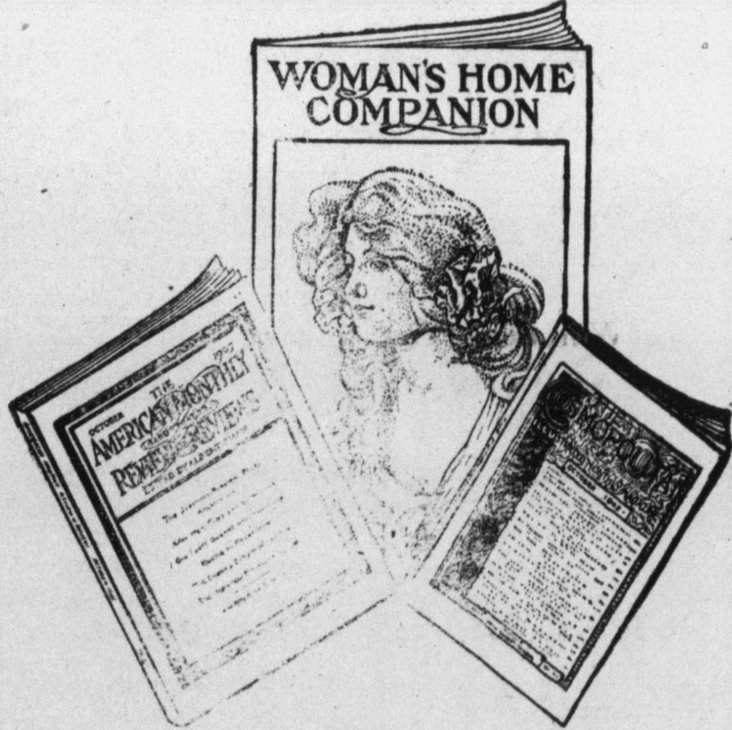
