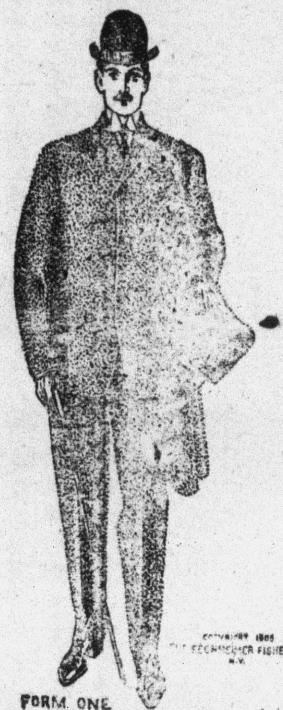

That there were over six thousand desertions from the United States army during the past year means that the men do not find soldier life such a picnic as they imagined at the time of enlistment.

On the same trains going into Greensboro this week were delegates to the Western N. C. Conference and witnesses in the Nick Williams case. All getting off the train together mixed up the conference reception committee and some amusement resulted in distinguishing them.

Ground has been broken for the monument to Jefferson Davis to be erected by the United Daughters of the Confederacy and to cost \$50,000. The unveiling ceremonies are fixed for 1907 and are expected to be highly elaborate, the whole South participating through prominent representatives. This monument is to be erected at Richmond.

Freight Rates The Slogan.

Freight rates should be the campaign slogan in North Carolina till these discriminations are abated—all other questions should be secondary. There isn't a single distributing point in North Carolina, and this fact alone proves that the freight paid by the people is greater than that paid in those sections favored by the railways. It is no secret that the railways entering North Carolina keep employed able and skilled counsel not for the purpose of defending actions against them, but solely "political" counsel, whose duties are to supervise elections in their various districts. It is a common expression that certain men with undoubted qualifications were defeated by the railroads. The control of political conventions by the railroads is known of all men in North Carolina. Isn't it time to go back to the people?—Merchant's Journal.

Payments Along The Line.

This is the season of the year when it is expected that people will settle their bills for the year. It would be much better if people could always pay cash for what they buy and not have to pay bills at the close of the year; but since the custom has become quite general, it is in order to think on it a little. The fact that many people wait until this season to pay means that many who do so are dependent in their ability to pay on some one else who has promised to pay them. Mr. A for instance, has told Mr. B that he'll pay what he owes about 1st, or 15th, of November. Mr. A is depending on Mr. C for the money which he proposes to pay Mr. B, although he may not have told Mr. B so. Mr. C in turn may be dependent on Mr. D for his money, and Mr. D may be dependent on some one else for his. And so the chain of dependence runs along through dozens of individuals, perhaps, and if the last man in the chain does not discharge his obligation to the man who depends on him, a long train of disappointments may be set up and a number of disagreements and hard results may follow. It is highly important that the first man discharge his obligations so that the next may do so, and the next, and the next—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

SPORT IN TUSCANY.

It includes Shooting Song Birds and Dining on Dat Pic. The olive trees around Lucca are not nearly so old or so gnarled looking as those around visitors on the Italian peninsula, owing to the proximity of the mountains, the climate in which they grow is more temperate. The earth in which they grow is a reddish gravelly soil. In fact, for olives the drier the earth the better, and they do not require much depth. It takes the fruit of five of the largest trees to make only one barrel of the pure oil containing thirty-six liters and a half—that is, about 110 pounds in weight. And even this amount cannot be reckoned upon often more than once in every two years. Moreover, an olive tree has to be planted and grafted four years before it will produce fruit at all.

There would be a great many beautiful singing birds in the groves and mountain sides around Lucca were it not for the passion which the Tuscan contadini have for la caccia—the chase. The sport they indulge in all day long is shooting at goldfinches and linnets and other little birds, all of which are sold and eaten. In the markets at Lucca I have seen jays for sale. Upon my expressing a doubt as to their succulency I was assured that they were excellent when boiled. Fancy boiled jay as a repast!

There is apparently no rule in Tuscany as to not shooting on the highroads. Indeed on every mile or two of roadway you will probably meet at least one cacciatore with a gun upon his shoulder. They will fire at anything, even a bat. I myself saw my friend's cook, Tito by name, shoot a bat on the highroad. He said if he could only get enough of them they would make a good pie. Ye gods! Bat pie and boiled jay—what a dinner!

I ascertained that there is some excellent trout fishing to be obtained not very far from Lucca, many of the trout being of good size. The trout are already in season in the month of February and rise very well in March and April to a fly.—Lieutenant Colonel Andrew Haggard, D. S. O., in Chambers' Journal.

Divorce in Burma. There is something to be said for Burma. If the Burmese husband and the Burmese wife come to the conclusion that they have injudiciously increased the marriage rate their procedure is simple and direct. The wife does not go to her solicitor, but to the tallow chandler. From him she obtains two little candles. 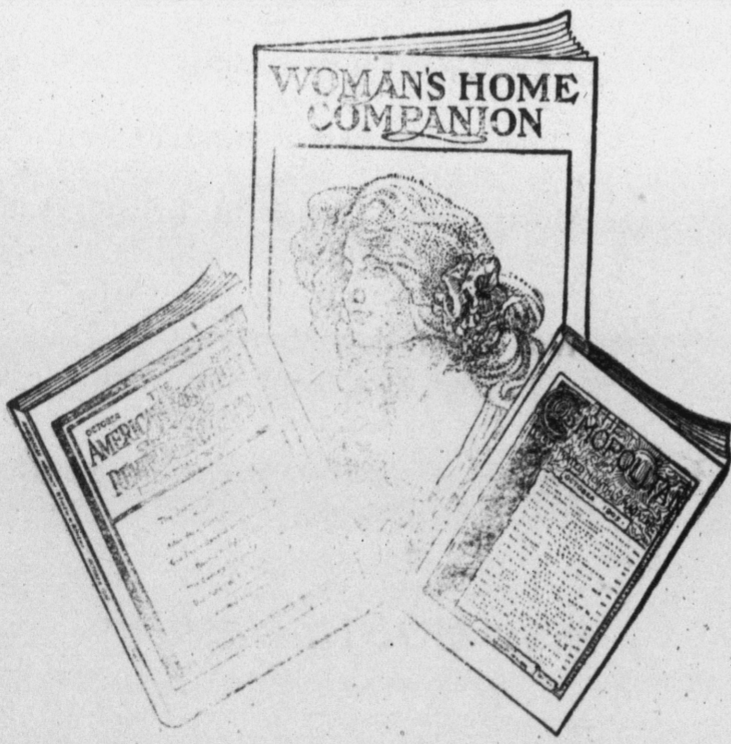
