### TEACHERS MEETING.

Interest Increases.

Saturday morning, Nov. 11, a large number of teachers and visitors gathered in the auditorium of the Greenville graded school building to hold their second teachers' meeting for the schoolastic year 1905-1906. The fine weather must have imparted hope and good cheer to the audience, for each one seemed to be in good spirits.

The exercises began with the soul stirring hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name!", after which Rev. Mr. Viehe read the one hundred and fourth Psalm and lead in prayer. The minutes of the last meeting were then read and the roll was called, about one hundred teachers answering to their names.

The first subject discussed was: "Difficulties Encountered in Rural School Work." On this subject Miss Delia Smith read a very interesting paper, in which was drawn in an original and amusing style a very pathetic, but true, picture of some of the trials of a public school teacher. Miss Florence Felton and Miss Nancy Coward read on the same subject papers which revealed thought and earnestness. Prof. G. E. Lineberry, Prof. W. H. Ragsdale and Prof. G. W. Prescott then made interesting and helpful talks on "How These Difficulties may be Overcome." No thoughtless school teacher could have heard these talks and not have been benefited by them.

Five minute papers on "Difficulties encountered in Graded School Work" were read by Miss Ada Tyson, Miss Dora Hornady, Miss Olivia Cox and Miss Neva Rodgers. These papers brought to view a number of perplexing difficulties that a graded school teacher must face, and showed clearly that the instructor in the rural district is not the only one who must endure "trials and tribulations." However, the rough places were made smooth by Prof. T. C. Candler, Prof. W. B. Dove, and Prof. J. M. McIver, who discussed fully and forcibly "How These Difficulties may be Overcome."

Prof. Ragsdale then told of the offer of a medal from Hon. J. Bryan Grimes for the boy or girl in Pitt county who will write the best historical paper on either of four subjects he had named, each subject bearing on Pitt county history, also of the offer of a prize from L. C. Arthur, a member of the county board of education

At a quarter past one o'clock, the association adjourned, to meet again December 2nd 1905.

Prof. Ragsdale is full of zeal on the great educational question, and he aids greatly in making the Teachers' Association of Pitt county the inspiring and beneficial institution that it is. No doubt the association is accomplishing great things—may the good work go on, and may Pitt county soon become in educational lines the foremost county in the "good old North State."

As Prince Louis has told it right out where our weakest spot is, the other nations will know where to strike in case they get mad with us.

The Charlotte Ministerial Association and the Mecklenburg Fair Association are doing some resolving pro and con. The subject of the query is fakirs at the fairs.

Prince Louis thinks New York would be as easy to break up as an egg shell in case of a war between the other nations and this country. New York's defencelessness impressed him more than anything else in this country, and he says war would be disastrous to that city.

The Charlotte Observer thinks the increase in our naval equipment should be vigorously pushed, in order to police the seas at either end of the Panama canal. If that is the only reason for pushing to secure a larger navy, there is time enough yet, as our present ships will likely be worn out with old age by the time the canal is completed.

The wisdom of Greenville having a good system of water works was well exemplified Saturday morning. The tallest building in the tobacco section—or in the town as to that—caught fire on the roof, and by the convenience of a hydrant and fire hose it was put out before the fire department could get half way to the scene from down town. It would not have taken long for fire in a building like the one in question with its contents to have been beyond control, and judging by losses that have occurred by fire in the tobacco district of the town, enough property was saved in this one instance to cover the cost of the entire water plant. Being able to act quickly is what counts most when a fire occurs. Greenville has made a good investment in her water plant.

A Family Journeys by Wagon from Mississippi to North Carolina.

About 11 o'clock, yesterday morning a travel stained man and woman approached Policeman Hunter, on South Tryon street, near the square and asked if he could direct them to the wagon road to Albemarle. The couple were so tired and forlorn looking that they attracted attention as they went about the streets. The couple were on their way from Mississippi to Franklin county, this State, where the man, Mr. J. M. Pippin, was born and lived until 25 years ago when he moved West. They had a wagon, a team of horses and several colts, as well as a number of children. The woman's clothes were so soiled and thin that she was pitiful to behold. She shivered while she talked. The desired information gained Mr. and Mrs. Pippin and their train moved on, going from here to Albemarle, thence to Troy and to Raleigh. Mr. Pippin intends to settle at the old home place.—Charlotte Observer.

Our Jury System.

Perhaps some day a North Carolina Legislature may awake to the wisdom of so amending the jury system as not to require the unanimous agreement of twelve men to reach a verdict. Some provision ought to be made to prevent the stopping of a prolonged case where a member of the jury happens to be taken sick, and also to prevent mistrials when one juror holds out against all the others.—Greenville REFLECTOR.

There is no doubt that there should be some changes made in our present system of trial by jury. Except in the qualification of jurors and the method of their selection the system is today just what it was several hundred years ago, when conditions were so different from what they are now. There have been changes for the better and to suit the altered conditions in all the other branches of the practice and administration of the law, but the people stick with surprising and incomprehensible tenacity to the old-time rules of trial by jury. The trial by jury is theoretically the best that could be devised. It would be a great blow to the liberties and to the maintenance of the rights of the people to do away with this system. Still there are some features of the present mode of conducting these trials which should be done away with. One of these is the requirement of a unanimous verdict of the twelve men composing that body and another is the rule which requires a mistrial when one of the jurors becomes incapacitated to serve by reason of sickness or some other cause occurring after the jury has been empaneled. Time and again of late years the effort has been made to amend the law regarding jurors in these respects, but such effort has always met with defeat. There should certainly be a law which would prevent one man from balking the action of the other eleven on the jury with him. We do not think that the majority rule should be adopted, especially in trials for serious criminal offences; but we wish to see the day come when a case can be proceeded with, notwithstanding one of the jurors becomes incapacitated and when it does not take the consent of all twelve men on the jury to decide a civil suit or a criminal case of minor magnitude. We believe public sentiment is being led in that direction and that the time is not long distant when the people who now stand so jealously by the old rules will see that it is to their interest and to the good of the general public that these strict rules are relaxed. This would be no greater innovation than many other changes which have been made in the practice before courts inaugurated for the greater dispatch of business and for the benefit of litigants and of the general public.—Wilmington Messenger.

**THE QUEEN'S BATH.**

Odd Ceremony at the Malagasy Annual National Festival.

The following is an account of the strange ceremony practiced at the Malagasy national festival every year, as related by nearly all the travelers that have visited the land of the Hovas. The "Pandroana," or royal bath, was first instituted by King Rataibo and is held annually by royal proclamation from the 22d of November to the 10th of January. During this time no business is allowed to proceed. The people of the kingdom meet the queen in the silver palace on the first day of the festival, and a red cock is then brought by the head priest or sacrificer of the court. Its neck is wrung, and the blood being caught in a banana leaf is carried to the sovereign, who touches with it her forehead, neck, stomach, arm-pit, finger nails and toe nails, the rest of the assembly following the example.

Next day the people assemble again for the royal bath in the great palace. The queen takes in one of the sacred corners of the hall, in a silver bath, being screened from view by "lambag" held by her attendants.

Amid the firing of cannon and the joyous shouts of her humble subjects her majesty then passes along the balcony, and from a horn in her hand sprinkles the crowd with water she has just been using for her ablutions, exclaiming at the same time, "Masina, aho!" (I am purified.) This sprinkling is said to typify the abundance of rain during the coming year.

To be absent from the ceremony would be to incur the royal displeasure. Every wife, also, must be with her husband at that time, or it is considered that she is as good as divorced. The new year is then supposed to have begun, and for several weeks there is a great deal of visiting and feasting.

**Calf's Foot Jelly and Glue.**

Calf's foot jelly or gelatin, which appears on the table in the form of various delicate soups and desserts, is made by exactly the same process as glue and from exactly the same materials. Greater care is taken, however, in selecting the parts of the animal to be used, and they are also cleaned much more carefully. After coming from the cooling room gelatin is spread much thinner on the wire netting than glue, and when it is dry girls cut it up with scissors into pieces about six inches long by three inches broad, and it is in this form that it often appears in the market. Some manufacturers, however, break it up into fine pieces and sell it in small packages. Gelatin is much more expensive than glue. Isinglass, or fish glue, is another product of the glue factory and is much prized as a gum for the sealing of letters and the pasting of scrap-books. It is also used in the making of confectionery.

**The Robber Robbed.**

"I remember a long time ago," said a burglar, "going late one night into a room in which there was one man sleeping. His clothes were on a chair near the head of the bed. I was bending over these clothes and about to take them out to the hall when the man suddenly woke up. Without a moment's hesitation he threw his arms around me. I was young then and strong, but this man was four times as strong as I was. I think he could have crushed me to a jelly if he had wanted. As it was he put me out of the house with the greatest ease. But before he did that he carried me over to the table and lit a light. As he looked at me my watch chain caught his eye, and, do you know, that man took my watch and chain and kept them!"—London Tit-Bits.

They have the curious habit of leaving the water in the evening and spending the entire night hunting the nocturnal insects which inhabit the muddy flats near tidewater. A similar species of New Zealand are called "running fishes" by the natives.

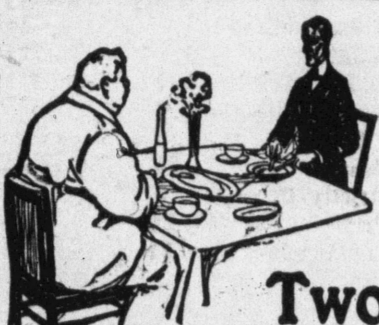
