FIRE IN COUNTRY.

H. A. Paramore's Store and Stock
Destroyed.

On Tuesday night a little past
10 o'clock, the store of H. A.
Paramore, at Galloway's Cross
Roads, about 8 miles from Green-
ville, was destroyed by fire. It is
not known how the fire originated,
as the roof of the wareroom was
was falling in when neighbors first
discovered it. The main store and
wareroom were only separated by
a partition, and the flames spread
so rapidly through the building
that nothing could be saved.

Mr. Paramore lives in Greenville
and was at his home here at the
time, and was advised by telephone
of the fire. He left about midnight
to go down there. He had a stock
of goods in the store valued at
\$8,000 and carried only \$5,000
insurance. The loss is a heavy one
on him and much sympathy is
expressed for him.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

Vehicles Collide on County Bridge.

seriously injured or thrown over
into the river. After getting by
the mules ran on across the bridge,
throwing the driver out of the
wagon.

County.

Pitt County in the Revolution.
Pitt County in the Revolutionary
Congresses of North Carolina.

Life and Services of John Simp-
son.

Pitt County Soldiers at the Bat-
tle of Alamance.

Pitt County in the War of 1812.

It will be seen that all of these
refer to Pitt county history and
are very timely and practical. I
trust that at least fifty boys and
girls will enter this contest this
year. I would ask the teachers
especially to see that their boys
and girls are encouraged to write
upon one or the other of these sub-
jects.

Mr. L. C. Arthur, a member of
the Board of Education, also offers
a gold medal for the best paper
upon this subject: "The Educa-
tional Progress of Pitt County for
the past five years." Let fifty
more write upon this subject.

The following conditions must
be observed by those who enter
this contest: First, they must be
a student of one of the schools of
this county during the present
term. Second, they must send
their names to me by the 15th of
December. Third, the paper must
be written by the contestants
themselves. Fourth, the papers
must be sent to me by the first day
of February 1906. You can enter
the contest for only one of these
medals.

A gold pen will also be given by
Mr. A. G. Cox, Chairman of the
Board of Education, for the second
best paper upon any of the sub-
jects suggested for the Gimes
medal.

The Durham Herald's paragraphs on the suspension of the Raleigh Post gives room for much reading between the lines.

Say what you please about Tom Johnson, but his plan to lessen the large number of suicides occurring in Cincinnati is a good one.

The Washington Gazette-Messenger has put in a type setting machine and new press and is taking the afternoon press dispatches. The paper is very much improved.

Congratulations to Goldsboro. That town held another election Tuesday on the question of prohibition and open saloons, and a large majority voted for the town to continue dry.

The Jews of America are with commendable zeal raising a fund to relieve their greatly persecuted brethren in Russia. It is proposed to raise a million dollars for this purpose.

An idea of how rapidly cotton was marketed when the price recently reached eleven cents can be had from the record of enormous receipts. On Tuesday the receipts reached nearly ninety-three thousand bales.

The recent report sent out from Norfolk, of a couple in Perquimans county being found dead in their room the next morning after marriage, is denied. People of that section say nothing can be learned about it, so the report must have been the work of a sensation maker.

President Harvie Jordan, of the Cotton Growers' Association is now advising farmers to hold the unsold portion of the crop for fifteen cents. This advice is based on the recent report of Secretary Wilson, of the Agricultural department, which indicates that the crop will not exceed ten million bales.

Hearst has got his nerve with him. He says if the courts do not decide the contest by January first he will take the oath as mayor of New York and demand possession of the office. McClellan will do the same thing, and if the contest is not settled in the meantime the new year will be showing some lively developments.

The Times, Raleigh's splendid afternoon paper, has made a great stride forward. Since taking over the plant of the Post it has increased in size, gives the full afternoon Associated Press service, and shows marked improvement along all lines. The aim of the Times is to be the leading afternoon paper between Washington and Atlanta and it bids fair to reach this distinction.

About the cleanest thing appearing in any newspaper since the battle of Tuesday is the many editorial statement in the New York World demanding fair play for Mr. Hearst. When it is remembered that Mr. Pulitzer and Mr. Hearst never speak as they pass by, and when it is known that they have fought each other with all the powers within them, the utterance of The World is comforting, showing, as it does, that it believes in the purity of the ballot however much an enemy and a rival might profit thereby. That thing alone puts The World out of the yellow class.—Raleigh Times.

Orphanage Work.

More distinctively each year Thanksgiving Day is growing to be "Orphans Day" in North Carolina. A grateful, liberal people, greatly blessed of God, make, at this season, special offerings which materially aid in maintaining the Orphans' Homes of the State. These institutions merit our most generous, hearty support. They are performing an important, a necessary service for the homeless orphan children of North Carolina. They are a means of blessing to many boys and girls and their influence is being multiplied through these children. Who can calculate the beneficent results from the work of a well-conducted Orphans' Home? We have in North Carolina and in other States many useful, Christian citizens, who, without the benefits of such an institution, would probably be burdens upon and menaces to the commonwealth. An orphanage has been one of the means employed by God in rescuing their lives from ruin, in forming their characters, in saving and equipping them for service to Him and the world.

The increased interest in this cause and the enlarged support to it will help to improve these institutions and to extend their usefulness.

God's approval of this work and His blessings upon it are clearly seen.

As He has prospered us and as He prompts us, let us, a responsive, thankful people, cheerfully and generously give to aid our Orphanages.

Surely a gift for these little ones, prompted by gratitude, will be accepted by the Father of the fatherless.

Many things can be cited to show the value of macadam roads, but in no one thing is the value of a good public highway so quickly shown as in the increased value of land lying along it. Land along the Mocksville road east of town has greatly increased in value and there has been an active demand for it solely because the land is on a macadam road. As soon as it was known that the county commissioners had decided to macadamize the Wilkesboro road land out that way began to increase in value. One instance: Mr. W. M. Cooper has a farm for which he paid \$1,000 several years ago. He has been offered \$3,000 for it and isn't going to take that.—Statesville Landmark.

THE QUEER FILE FISH.

Apparently Dead, but a Very Wide Awake, Hungry Bivalve.

Perhaps the most extraordinary light giving shellfish is the pholas, or file fish. It is a bivalve; that is to say, it has two shells, which are open at both ends, and at each end is a cover which fits over the opening. The fish stays always in one place, apparently without any life or movement, but it is really a wide awake, hungry creature. By means of the covers to its shells it can open and close them just when it wants to, and out of either opening it thrusts twelve long, crooked hairy arms in search of its prey. Eight smaller arms are generally tucked away inside the shell.

The pholas is found in all sorts of situations—sometimes at the bottom of the sea, sometimes hidden away in lumps of earth, sometimes lodged, shell and all, in the heart of the hardest marble, for the boring powers of the fish are truly marvelous.

If you take the pholas out of its shell it looks like a soft, round pudding, with no instrument for boring into even the softest substances. Its two teeth are so placed as to be useless for the purpose; so are the covers to its shells. The implement which it uses is a broad, fleshy foot, which issues from one end or other of its shell, and its method of boring suggested to the great engineer, Brunel, in 1814, the way to make the Thames tunnel, and served as a model for the machines used in boring the Mont Cenis tunnel.

The pholas works thus: Fixing itself firmly by its powerful foot, it uses it as a center bit, around which it makes the shell revolve; the soft edges of the shell begin the perforation which is afterward enlarged by the rasplike action of the rough interior. Though constantly worn down, it is replaced by a new formation from the animal, so that it is always kept in good condition for boring.

Irish Types.

Three types at least are observable in the south of Ireland—first, the dark Italian looking Celt, also found in Devon; secondly, the tall, yellow haired Danish type, and, thirdly, the aboriginal Aryan of the Volga, with red or auburn hair and blue or green eyes, who may also be found in Cornwall.

The dark aquiline type of Wales differs considerably from that of the Irish, and the Irish language is nearer akin to Cornish than to Welsh. The traditional Irishman of caricatures is not often seen in the south, though this type is not unknown even among the upper classes.

The soft features and bright eyes of the modest peasant women present many varieties of beauty, and the mingled race of Cork and Kerry—fairer, as a rule, than that of the far west—is as vigorous as any in Scotland or in Yorkshire.—Blackwood's Magazine.

All went well until the train suddenly dashed into a tunnel. Bang went the old man's fist on his son's nose as he cried: "I told you something would happen, you young villain! I'm struck blind!"—London Mail.
