To Retire Three Million Bales.

New Orleans, Nov. 15.—Following the arrival of President Harvie Jordan, the Southern Cotton Association today perfected plans for taking off the market 3,000,000 bales of cotton by means of a series of pledges which the farmers will sign themselves, stating their name and address and the amount of cotton they will thus hold. The cotton held will not be sold for less than 15 cents a pound, according to the pledges. A report of the association is to be sent into every one of the 817 cotton producing counties of the cotton belt at once. When the pledges are signed they will be sent to the central office of the association in Atlanta.

President Jordan says that half of the crop has already been sold at an average of 10 cents and the spinners must have all the remainder. He believes that 15 cents for the remainder is a fair price and it will only average the spinners 12 1/2 cents, while they have based all their calculations on 14 cent cotton.

Remarkable Jury.

The jury that served this week in the Superior court here was out of the ordinary. Of the eighteen men called on Monday, every man answered to his name and not one had a request to be excused. The first twelve were told to walk in the box, and for four days these same twelve set together on every case that came up, not one of the jurors being objected to and stood aside by either plaintiff or defendant.

The president has completed his message to congress and will give it a few weeks to cool before it is handed out to the public.

R. M. Phillips, editor of the late Raleigh Post, has been chosen secretary of the chamber of commerce of Raleigh. Phillips is good anywhere you put him.

We have not been troubling much about it, but as some people wanted to know the information has been sent out from official headquarters that the correct pronunciation of the president's name is in three syllables with one o silent. For instance, Roosevelt.

Miss Nora Burgess, of Texas, sometime ago instituted a breach of promise suit against G. F. Cannon Jr. of Concord, this state. Recently the young lady died, and it was thought her death would end the suit. The announcement is made by the administrator of her estate that he will continue to prosecute the suit.

There is a law in Ohio under which the owner of a building can be held responsible for money lost by gambling within the building. The Supreme Court of the United States has recently upheld this Ohio law in deciding a case. The case in question was one in which a wife sued a landlord for money lost by her husband in a gambling den operated on the landlord's premises, and the court decided in her favor. Wonder if it would make gambling less if every state had a law of that kind.

His Daughter Carried the Election.

J. E. Taylor, a leading farmer of Piedmont, Va., is one of the new Democratic Members in the House of Delegates. His election is due to the efforts and persuasive powers of his young daughter, Mrs. P. B. Moses, recently a bride.

Soon after announcing his candidacy Mr Taylor fell ill with typhoid fever, and was in delirium when the campaign was at its height. Mrs. Moses mounted her horse and rode from homestead to hotel, from man sion to store, and made a personal appeal to every white voter in the county.

She nursed her father by night and canvassed the voters by day. She galloped over hard mountain paths to obscure hollows in the Blue Ridge, and allowed no man to depart without the promise of his vote.

This is the first time a woman in Virginia ever made a personal political canvass. Her father led the ticket in his district.

Papers Can't Print Result of Euchre Parties.

Newspapers all over the state are in receipt of a circular letter from a Des Moines newspaper apprising them that the post-office authorities at Washington have held that reports of prize winners at euchre and whist parties will suffice under the anti lottery law to exclude any newspaper from the mails.

The newspaper in question states that its presses were stopped one day last week and thirty minutes' delay ensued in order to remove from its columns a statement that Mrs. Jones had won a cut-glass water pitcher and Mrs. Smith had won a chafing dish at Mrs. Johnson's card party.

The Des Moines postmaster, after carefully reading his instructions, decided that such reports should exclude a newspaper from the mails quite as much as the report of raffle, lottery or other gambling device. He telegraphed the department at Washington and was advised by it that his construction of the post-office rules were literally correct, but that the department had never seen fit to enforce the rule against reports of society card games. That left the question open, and the Iowa editors are asked to secure the intervention of their Congressman.—Sioux City Telegram.

To End Suicide.

Most men who commit suicide do so because they see no hope for them or they are insane. The day when suicide was the resort of a courageous man, as in Greece and Rome, has passed away forever. But in this fast-living age, when men see their hopes of getting rich fade away, the records show that suicide is growing more common. There is little room to doubt that sane men commit suicide who might be saved if a helping hand were extended at the critical moment. An Anti-Suicide Commission, with Mayor Tom Johnson at the head, has been organized at Cleveland, Ohio. It invites men in that city contemplating suicide to write a letter telling of their troubles, and it will undertake to obtain employment for men who have no situations, and to meet the needs of those looking for something to do. This is not, as some will imagine at first blush, a utopian scheme. Instead it is a very practical sort of way to save one's fellows in distress or disappointment. In most cases, if a man about to commit suicide could be diverted by a friendly and sympathetic hand, he would not take his life, would be saved to the world and become a useful citizen. Human sympathy and brotherly help towards your neighbors who are unsuccessful is the best way to keep the thought of suicide from their minds. Raleigh News and Observer.

HEADACHES.

They Are Caused by Nerves, Eye Strain and Blood Poisons.

A physician writes: "There are three main causes of headache, and the first of these has to do with the nervous system. A headache is, everybody will acknowledge, a very natural result of nerve strain. In the hurry and bustle and strain and stress of life today our poor nervous systems have no chance, no moment of rest and inaction from the time we arise in the morning till we go to bed at night. The pursuit of pleasure, the scurrying ceaselessly from one place to another in search of amusement, the fact that a certain class of people find life a bore unless they are in a whirl of excitement will often account for the fashionable headache, the headache of the 'overworked' society woman. Work, properly so called, will never produce a headache. It is one of the best preventives of headache. Anxiety and incessant worrying over trifles will certainly cause the headache of overstrain, as any harassed, anxious and 'worried' household head of a large family will testify to. The headache of anaemia, common enough among young girls of low vitality, is due to a nervous system ill nourished, with impoverished blood. Many obscure neuralgias have thus a very simple explanation.

"The second great cause of headache is eye strain. Many a man who is suffering from eye strain assures his doctor that his eyes are certainly not at fault, as he has 'splendid sight.' It is not his nerves of sight which are affected, but the nerve and minute muscle of accommodation which he is constantly and unconsciously fatiguing in order to make his sight as good as he believes it to be. The error is in the shape of the eye, which requires continual muscular strain to rectify, and proper glasses would immediately remove the need for this continual strain. This form of headache follows close eye work, such as reading, writing or sewing. It is worse at night and is practically absent in the morning, differing from other forms of headache. It may be taken for granted that headache present in the morning is not due entirely if at all to eye strain. All sufferers from headache should have their eyes examined by an oculist.

"A very large number of headaches come under the third category—namely, headaches due to poisons in the blood. The 'throbbing headache' is often caused by what medical men call over blood pressure or too high blood pressure due to impurities or toxins circulating in the blood. They generally arise from disorders of digestion in the stomach and bowels from improper diet, the overeating of meat and rich dishes, imperfect mastication, foul teeth and lack of exercise. Relief will not be permanent so long as new toxins are being produced—that is, so long as we persist in overeating rich dishes and neglecting the rules of health."

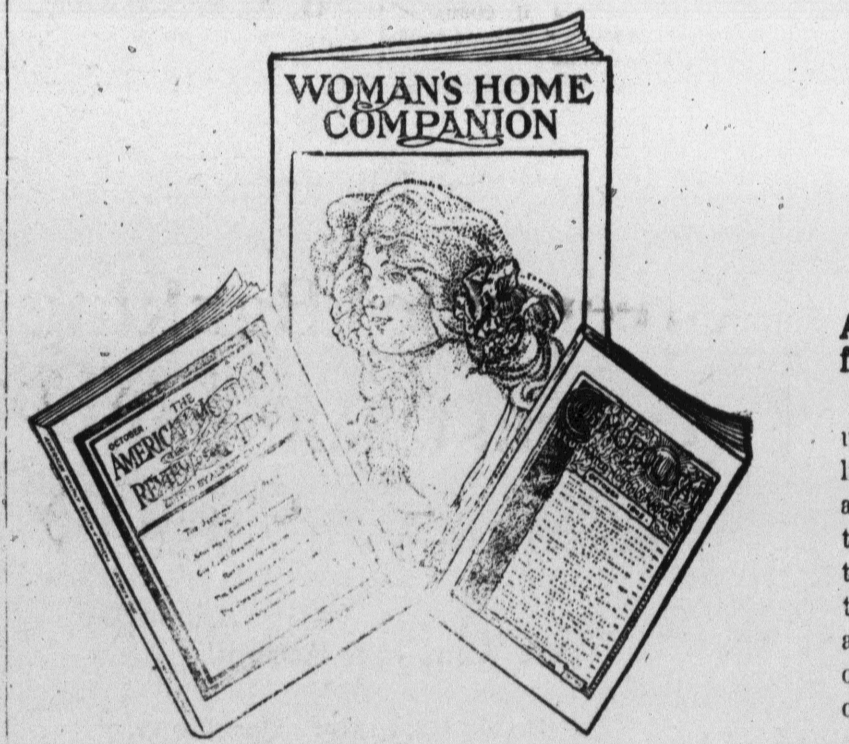
