MINISTER ORDAINED.

And Installed as Pastor of Church.

The commission appointed by Albemarle Presbytery—Rev. R. W. Alexander, of Tarboro, Dr. W. D. Morton, of Rocky Mount, Dr. Isaac Campbell, of Kingston and Elder W. B. Dove, of Greenville—to ordain and install Licentiate F. D. Viehe as pastor at Greenville, met in the Presbyterian church here at 7 o'clock on Wednesday evening, and was constituted with prayer by the chairman, Dr. W. D. Morton.

Rev. Mr. Viehe delivered his trial sermon before the commission from Rom. 8:28. He was examined and sustained on the following subjects: Experimental Religion, Philosophy, Theology, Ecclesiastical History, Greek and Hebrew languages, Sacraments, Church Government.

The ordination sermon was preached by Dr. Isaac Campbell from John 4:19, his theme being "God's Love."

The usual constitutional questions were propounded to the pastor elect and church by Dr. Morton, after which Mr. Viehe was ordained and installed by the laying on of hands of the Presbytery, the candidate kneeling and Dr. Morton leading in prayer.

The charge to the pastor was delivered by Dr. Morton and to the church by Dr. Alexander. Both of these charges were beautiful in word and earnest in expression and made a profound impression on the large congregation. The entire public service was most interesting.

Rev. Mr. Viehe has only been in Greenville a short while, but has gained a strong hold on the esteem and affection of the people of the community. He is a young man of scholarly attainments and pleasant address and excellent Christian character. The church here is fortunate in securing him as pastor.
